WALL STREET
NEW YORK (AP) — Aircraft took some fairly sharp losses while oils remained slightly ahead in a slowly declining stock market late this afternoon.

Volume for the day was estimated at 2,500,000 shares compared with 2,410,000 Monday.

Losses of most key stocks went from fractions to about a point. A scattering of secondary issues made wider moves.

North American Aviation dropped about 2. Losses of more than a point were taken by Douglas Aircraft and Martin Co. Lockheed, United Aircraft and General Dynamics were down about a point each.

Brokers said that belated recognition of the possibility that the Eisenhower - Khrushchev visits may ease cold war tensions combined with unfavorable aspects of the aircraft business to bring in some selling.

Polaroid scampered ahead more than 3. American Machine & Foundry gained more than a point. General Tire dropped more than 3.

Pan American World Airways was active and down more than a point as were Radio Corp. and Philco.

Texas Instruments fell about 2. Motors rose a bit after early indifference. Steels were narrowly mixed.

DA Dismisses Charges Filed By Basin Rancher

A charge brought by Felisberto Laurence that he was robbed and assaulted Saturday by a massively-built young man was dismissed Monday after thorough investigation by the district attorney.

Rather than Laurence being threatened with a knife, as the Merrill rancher had maintained, it was the youth who was threatened by Laurence, District Attorney Arthur Beddoe said today.

This Laurence reluctantly admitted Monday afternoon when Beddoe brought Laurence and his accused assailant face-to-face in his office, the district attorney said.

"There was no crime, and absolutely no basis for prosecution as far as the boy was concerned," Beddoe said.

The district attorney gave this account of the weekend's interesting events.

The youth, 20 years old, 6 feet 4 inches tall and weighing about 225 pounds, arrived in town Friday with a 1937 pickup that needed repair.

"The boy didn't have a dime. He got his pickup fixed and in running order, but he didn't have \$3 to pay the bill," Beddoe said.

So the youth went to the employment agency, didn't find a job, and wound up Saturday at the Pastime Tavern where Laurence offered him a job on the ranch.

On the way out, Beddoe said, Laurence bought \$1.87 worth of groceries at Low Cost Super Market, which bill he paid by check.

At Laurence's ranch the two fell into a personal argument and the youth asked to be driven into Klamath Falls. Laurence refused, and asked the youth to spend the night at his place. The guest refused, and walked four miles into Merrill. It was late Saturday night by that time, but the youth looked up Constable Dal Reed and related his troubles.

Reed advised against any reprisals. But the youth, still furious, walked back to Laurence's ranch. He was angry, but he also had left personal papers at the ranch, Beddoe said.

Laurence and the youth soon argued again. Laurence pulled a knife, and the boy knocked Laurence into the canal. And he fell in after him.

From there, Beddoe said, the youth walked to grain elevators on the way to Merrill, clothed himself in newspapers in a boxcar while he hung his clothing out to dry, and the next day walked all the way to Klamath Falls.

Laurence had come into the district attorney's office and signed an information of felony against the youth. Laurence claimed he had been assaulted with a knife and robbed of \$23.

Ten minutes after the information was signed and a warrant issued, the youth was brought into custody. Beddoe demanded to see him immediately, and from that interview learned the other side of the story, he said.

"There was no money involved," Beddoe said. "Laurence didn't even have any money on him. As for the argument and fight, Beddoe said, 'there was no question in my mind what it was.'"

The charge was dismissed and the youth was released.

Oregon Fires All Controlled

Oregon's forest and range fires were quiet this morning and supervisors directing crews against them said things looked reasonably good despite still-dangerous conditions.

The two biggest fires, both in Baker County, were controlled Monday and mop-up work started today.

A 1500-acre blaze on Bureau of Land Management range and scrub timber remained potentially dangerous, said John L. Hunt, BLM fire control officer, but was believed to be fairly safe. Lines were put around it by hand crews working in rough terrain Monday.

Today tank trucks were to spray water on the head of the fire to enable crews to get at the embers.

A 2300-acre fire fought by U.S. Forest Service crews in the Dark Canyon area of Baker County also was in the mop-up stage and some 75 of the crew of 250 men were released.

A fire on state land near La Grande was also being mopped up.

The Weather Bureau said fire danger remained high except along the coast and in northwest Oregon where there were clouds that carried a hint of rain. The coast got a morning drizzle.

Labor Mulls Time Change

SEASIDE, Ore. (AP) — Four resolutions favoring daylight saving time were submitted to the Oregon AFL-CIO convention here today.

The resolutions were offered by the Oregon State Building and Construction Trades Council, the Office Employees Local No. 11 of Portland, the Meatcutters Local 143 of Portland and the Civil Service Section of the Multnomah County Public Employees.

This is the largest group of unions ever to support daylight saving time at an Oregon labor convention. In previous conventions, resolutions favoring fast time have gone down to defeat.

Backers of daylight saving say they are encouraged by support this year from the Building Trades Council which has reversed its stand of previous years.

All four of the resolutions were referred to the Committee on Law and Legislation. The committee is expected to act on them Thursday and bring at least one to the floor on Thursday or Friday.

The fast time resolutions are among more than 50 which were read to the convention this morning and then referred to committees.

The delegates, numbering about 350, are expected to attend a picnic tonight at Seaside Park.

Delegates got down to business today after hearing a policy address Monday by J. D. McDonald, state president, and a plea by Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass) for support for his labor control bill.

Botulism Hits Tule Refuge

TULELAKE—Botulism poisoning, which afflicts waterfowl, has made its appearance on the Tule Lake Refuge. One hundred dead and 30 sick ducks were picked up July 28. The sick birds were taken to the duck hospital at refuge headquarters where they will be treated with antitoxin and cared for.

Hospital treatment proved quite successful in overcoming the effects of botulism poisoning ducks in 1958. Approximately 90 per cent of the ducks hospitalized last year survived the poisoning and were subsequently released into the wild.

The extended period of hot weather coupled with the low water levels of the Tule Lake Sump has apparently aggravated the botulism situation.

No botulism has developed on the Lower Klamath Refuge, according to Robert F. Russell, refuge manager.

Heart Attack Proves Fatal

Mrs. L. A. (Letha) Murphy, 53, identified for all of her adult life with both educational and political civic service, and social activities in Klamath Falls, died Monday night, August 3, at Hillside hospital. Mrs. Murphy was stricken with a heart attack at the family home July 31 and failed to rally. She had not been previously ill.

She was born in Glenburn, Shasta County, California, July 26, 1904, and came to Klamath Falls two years later.

Mrs. Murphy attended the First Methodist Church, this city; served on the Klamath Falls Elementary School Board from 1953 to 1958 and as chairman during the last year, declining to run for reelection at expiration of her term.

She was serving on the budget committee of that board at the time of her death and also was serving on the committee for reorganization of city and county schools.

She was an active member for many years in PTA and Parents and Patrons; was a member of the Klamath Falls Library Club, Zulema Temple, No. 13, Daughter of the Nile, Zulema Nile Club, was past matron of Aloha Chapter, No. 61, Order of the Eastern Star, and member of Aloha Past Matrons Club; was a past Grand Martha of the Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star of Oregon, member of the Endowment Fund Committee of the Grand
