

All-Star Count: One Apiece

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The crowd all square at one apiece for the 1959 All-Star classics between the American and National League today. And back to the formal pennant races went the ballplayers.

Manager Casey Stengel's American Leaguers pinned a 5-3 defeat on Fred Haney's Nationals as a paid attendance of 54,982, fourth highest in the game's history, sat through the game in sun-baked Memorial Coliseum Monday.

The victory avenged a 5-4 setback absorbed by the Stengel men in the first All-Star game July 7 at Pittsburgh.

The game grossed \$283,120 and netted, after taxes, \$262,336.47.

The Pittsburgh game grossed \$229,636 and netted \$194,303.46.

Individual honors went to catcher Yogi Berra of the Yankees, whose two-run blast off Dodger pitcher Don Drysdale put the Americans in front, 3-1, in the third inning for a lead they never relinquished.

Oddly enough, this was Yogi's 11th All-Star appearance but the first time he had hit for extra bases.

Collective honors went to the

American League pitchers who trotted such sluggers as Hank Aaron, Ernie Banks, and Willie Mays.

The winning pitcher was Jerry Walker of Baltimore, 20, who just a year ago was laboring for Knox-

ville, Tenn. in the Class A Sally League.

Walker, inserted into the squad the afternoon before, yielded but one run and two hits in the three innings he worked.

The loser was strikeout artist Don Drysdale of the Dodgers. Don served up home run balls to

Frank Malzone of the Red Sox and Berra.

"This was a great day for the Italians," said Yogi, referring to the homerun by Rocky Colavito

of Cleveland in the eighth inning and Malzone's four bagger.

Sharing pitching honors with Walker were Early Wynn, Hoyt Wilhelm, Billy O'Dell and Cal McLish.

For the Nationals, Dodger Jim Gilliam and Frank Robinson of Cincinnati smacked homeruns. The contest, which lasted 2 hours and 42 minutes, had its moments.

One came with the introduction of the All-Stars. It was hard to say which, if either, drew the biggest hand — big Ted Williams or Stan Musial.

Of course, such Los Angeles idols as Gilliam, Wally Moon, Drysdale and Charlie Neal drew hearty applause. But Williams, in his 16th All-Star game, and Musial in his record 17th, were the sentimental heroes.

Malzone's homer came in the second inning, which tied the score at 1-1 after Johnny Temple had doubled in the first and scored later on Aaron's sacrifice fly.

In the third, Nellie Fox singled and scored on Berra's homer. From there on it was a homer duel, with the Americans leading the way.

One man who didn't even play got a tremendous welcome. A fellow sitting in a box back of third base, name of Ty Cobb.

Berra's Reaction Realistic

Editor's Note: Yogi Berra of the Yankees banged out a two-run homer in the third inning to lead the American League All-Stars to a 5-3 victory over the National League and to win the Most Valuable Player Award. In the following dispatch, he gives his views on his part in the game.

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Where the hell's the beer?

I guess that was the first thing I said when I came into the American League dressing room.

But I felt pretty good anyhow after hitting that homer. It was a fast ball, chest-high and the first one Don Drysdale threw to me.

When I caught it I knew it was a good one and gone.

It was the first extra base hit I've made in the 11 All-Star games I've played in. Nellie Fox was on base, and we went ahead, 3-1. It went over the right field fence, but I wasn't trying to hit it there, I was just trying to hit the ball anywhere.

A ball's hard to see here — damn hard. The clothing and the big black spots in the Coliseum made it very difficult to follow the ball. And that guy Drysdale throws fast.

Sometimes there's luck in this sort of thing. There may have been some luck here — I don't know for sure.

I don't know about how I'd feel if I had to bat against Drysdale all the time. He throws hard enough — I know that. I'd have to get used to him.

Sometimes you hit a ball, and you know you hit it good. Today I knew I'd hit one, and it felt mighty good.

KF Babe Ruthers Practice For Acid Test On Thursday

For the fourth straight year Klamath Falls will be represented in the State Babe Ruth League Tournament, this time by the American League All-Stars, headed by coaches John Paxton and Dick Adreon.

Thursday night at 9 o'clock the squad takes the diamond against the Tualatin Nationals in the final game of the opening day's play. Thursday action will see two games in the afternoon followed by two in the evening. Friday the same pattern will be followed, the consolation round set for two in the afternoon followed by the championship games in the evening.

The American Stars are working daily at 9 a.m. in pre-tourney practices at Gem Stadium. Fans are welcome to attend the practice sessions.

The winner of the three-day state meet qualifies to represent Oregon in the regional finals slated for Victoria, B.C., next week.

The contest, in addition to serving as a practice for the All-Stars, should provide the fans an interesting evening, according to tournament director, Jack Kemnitzer.
