Polio Cases On Increase Despite Vaccine Supply

 WASHINGTON (NEA)—Despite the plentiful supplies of Salk vaccine available throughout the country and the enormous amount of publicity promoting its use, the number of paralytic polio cases is rising.

U.S. Public Health Service officials blame the public's false sense of complacency for the disease upswing. They believe that many people have misinterpreted reports about the vaccine's effectiveness to mean that polio is licked.

Thus millions of Americans either have failed to complete the minimum of three shots required for adequate protection or have not been vaccinated at all. Recently the PHS recommended a fourth shot as extra protection for everyone under 40.

Health experts illustrate the results of vaccination apathy with these statistics:

In 1955, the year that the Salk vaccine was judged safe and effective, there were 16,000 paralytic polio cases. In 1957, there were 8,000, and in 1957, 2,200.

In 1958, however, polio paralytic cases increased to 3,100 persons, an increase of roughly 44 per cent over the previous year. So far this year the disease has claimed more than 500 victims. This is almost twice the number of persons afflicted during the same period in 1958.

And peak polio months are just beginning. PHS experts have investigated 204 of this year's cases and found that 243 had not received the required three shots.

Among children under five, who accounted for 103 of the victims, only eight had been fully vaccinated. It's estimated that the total number of children under five who have not received at least three shots is about 12 million.

U.S. Surgeon General Leroy Burney declares: "It is a tragic circumstance that hundreds of children and young adults will be spending the balance of their lives in wheel chairs or on crutches because of a failure to be vaccinated."

In an effort to reduce the number of these tragedies, Burney has called on local health officials to conduct a door-to-door campaign in neighborhoods where there is a large group of unvaccinated persons. It's believed this personal touch will help spark the needed motivation. A nationwide vaccination campaign, which is making use of the press, radio, TV and motion pictures, is being conducted by the Advertising Council.

PHS studies show that people have reasons other than apathy for not getting polio shots. These include fear of the needle, the cost of the shots and inconvenience involved in going to a hospital clinic or doctor's office.

Doctors believe the door-to-door campaigns will be useful in convincing people that the slight discomfort of getting stuck by a needle is minor compared to being paralyzed for life. Many cities are tackling the economic factor by providing shots for as little as one or two dollars and free vaccine for persons who can't afford to pay anything. Most private physicians charge from \$2 to \$5 per shot.

In the past year, however, many communities' offers of free vaccine have gone begging and valuable vaccines expired unused. To eliminate the inconvenience factor, cities are using mobile vaccination clinics that travel to each neighborhood.

Dr. Burney explains that the Salk vaccine has proved to be 75 to 90 per cent effective in guarding people against polio. He expects the fourth shot to extend the period of immunity.

Tests are still going on to determine the safety and effectiveness of the new oral vaccine. These are the vaccines composed of live polio viruses that have been stripped of their ability to do harm. The Salk vaccine is made from killed viruses.

In recent months the oral vaccine has been used extensively overseas. It is reported to have been extremely effective. PHS officials, however, say that the vaccine must undergo additional tests here and abroad before they can okay its use in the U.S. They say that the tests will last for an indefinite period.

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
