

Senators, Killebrew Baffled

WASHINGTON (AP) — For a few giddy weeks earlier in the season the Washington Senators were eyeing a first division finish in the American League. And a stocky young slugger was being hailed as another Babe Ruth.

Now the Senators are threatening to break through the bottom of the league as they near baseball's longest losing streak. And Harmon Killebrew is waving one of the league's most ineffective bats.

The two collapses are closely tied together. When Killebrew was clouting home runs at a rate that put him ahead of Ruth's record-setting pace of 1927, the Senators were astounding their long-suffering fans by rising to the dizzy heights of fifth place, a spot they occupied as recently as two weeks ago.

Killebrew had 32 home runs then and led the league in runs batted in with 80. But since July 19 the Senators have lost 17 straight games and Killebrew has hit exactly one home run and the equivalent minimum in runs batted in—one.

His 33 homers and 81 RBI are still tops for the league, but it's safe to say they won't be long, at his present rate of production. It is axiomatic that nobody looks good on a club that has lost 17 straight games. Except for Jim Lemon, nobody is hitting. The pitching has been inadequate and the fielding atrocious.

But the present performance of the club is not unprecedented. The 1948 Senators lost 18 in a row, and the club hasn't finished higher than seventh since 1954, when it soared to sixth.

Killebrew's muscular performance in the first half of the season was mainly responsible for the feeling that things were going to be different this year. Even the understandably conservative manager, Cookie Lavagetto, was heard to say: "This team is going to finish in the first division. It's got the feeling of winning and like it."

Lavagetto isn't saying much nowadays. He isn't blaming Killebrew, and he has no intention of benching the 23-year-old third baseman.

Killebrew isn't saying anything, either. But then, the Idaho youngster is not the talkative type. It was his bat that was making such a noise in the land. It seems apparent that nothing much is going to be heard from Washington until it starts sounding off again.

Siskiyou '9' Makes History

YREKA — The Siskiyou County Babe Ruth All-Star squad will be making history Thursday morning when they depart for the BR State finals at Berkeley. The venture will mark the initial try by any Northern California BR team to the state tournament.

Coch Charles Page's 15-man squad is paired with the District 1 representative Friday afternoon at 4:30 in their first tourney test. The classic will run through Sunday with the finals being held during the afternoon.

All of the tournament games will be played at Edwards Field on the University of California campus while the Siskiyou stars will be housed at Alameda Air Force base during their stay.

The squad, which is made up of players chosen from teams in Grenada-Gazelle, Dunsmuir, Yreka and Mount Shasta, gained the tourney berth with four straight wins over three other All-Star nines from the area, all by one-run margins.

Pitchers Bill Marske and Frank Ramey combined to boost the Siskiyou squad past Yuba City, 8-7, on August 1 in a 10-inning contest to clinch the berth. Anderson and Susanville were earlier victims, the Anderson nine falling 6-5 and Susanville being toppled twice by identical scores of 6-5.

Ol' Case Answers Frank Lane Charge

NEW YORK (UPI) — Casey Stengel counted slowly to 10 today to hold his temper and then answered point-by-point Frank Lane's bitter charges that he had pulled "a damned dirty trick" the way he used his pitchers in Monday's All-Star game.

"I don't care what he says," said Stengel when advised of the verbal broadside launched at him by General Manager Lane of the Cleveland Indians.

But then, obviously caring quite a bit but refusing to lose his good humor, Stengel pitched into Lane's charge that there was something sinister in his use of three Baltimore Orioles pitchers and also in using tired Cal McLish of the Indians instead of tired Ryne Duren of the Yankees.

Stengel's answer, boiled down, is that everybody was tired. "All the managers must have forgot to mark down the All-Star game on their calendars," said Stengel, "because they used six of the All-Star pitchers on Sunday. Why, in order to get a man to start the game I had to pick a guy who wasn't even on the squad."

Stengel was referring to his selection of rookie pitcher Jerry Walker on Sunday as replacement for injured catcher Gus Triandos of the Orioles on the All-Star squad. In the same breath Stengel picked Walker on the squad and named him to start the game in Los Angeles. Walker emerged the winning pitcher.

As for using McLish instead of Duren to relieve in the eighth inning, Stengel said, "Duren would have pitched if he had shown anything at all when he warmed up."

Lane denounced Stengel Tuesday in Chicago, saying, "I challenge Stengel to explain why he used a dog-tired Cal McLish and three Baltimore pitchers when his own Ryne Duren never left the bullpen."

Earlier Tuesday, manager Paul Richards of the Orioles stated that Stengel's use of three Oriole pitchers on Monday (Walker, Billy O'Dell, and Hoyt Wilhelm) had "messed up" his pitching plans for the week.

Stengel took notice of that, too, when he observed, "I couldn't have messed up the Orioles too much—I see by the scoreboard that somebody down there beat Chicago last night."

Stengel summed up his pitching problems in the All-Star game this way: "They all warmed up, and if they didn't feel good they didn't have to play. They all wanted to pitch."

He outdid himself at Vancouver Tuesday night. With the first-place Sacramento Solons trying to beat back the challenging Mounties, this script writer gives them a split in a doubleheader. But he was just warming up at that point.

The first game was just about as close as a six-bit shave, with Vancouver winning 1-0... and each team got only a single hit apiece.

Sacramento won the second game 4-3, with a pinchhit, two-run homer in the ninth the winning blow.

The script was a pretty good one at Portland too, with San Diego's Johnny Briggs pitching another one-hitter in bringing the Padres a 2-0 victory over the hometown Beavers.

In other league action, Salt Lake City's Bees drubbed the Seattle Rainiers 5-1 and the skidding Spokane Indians dropped a 5-3 decision to the Phoenix Giants.

Carl Greene of the Solons, who walked two while striking out nine, and the Mounties' young Wes Stock, who struck out three and walked one, were the mound foes at Vancouver. Ray Barker won the game for Vancouver in the last inning of the abbreviated contest with a single that scored Marv Breeding, who had walked and moved up on a sacrifice. The lone hit off Stock was Al Heist's solid single to left in the sixth frame.

Bill Queen, who came to Sacramento from Houston Tuesday afternoon, hit the pinchhit homer in the nightcap. It was a line drive over the left-center field fence at the 360-foot mark. Buddy Peterson, who had singled, scored ahead of Queen. Barker got a solo homer for the Mounties in the eighth.

Eugene's Bob Bolin won his 14th with a two-hitter in the opener against the Chiefs, while his teammates scored eight runs in the fifth on five hits and four walks. Singles by Chuck Hiller, Terry Maddox and John Orsino provided the victory margin in the nightcap. Maddox was four for four, including a solo homer.

Salem had 18 hits, three home runs and a pair of four-run innings. Joe Wilson hit his 25th homer of the season and Hank Bivens and Don Gaffney each got one in the seventh. The Bears also had three homers, by Pete Gongola, Herm Lewis and Cal Henry. Wilson and Gaffney each went four for five and between them drove in nine runs.

Bob Nelson doubled twice and scored each time for Tri-City and then was doubled in by Harry Dunlop with the winning run with two out in the ninth. Jerry Clifford and Danny Holden also doubled and scored for the Braves. Brance Karl Heron stole three bases, including home once.

Cardinals, Argonauts Slate Mix-Match Gridiron Contest

The pro football whirl, climaxed so brilliantly with Baltimore's overtime National Football League championship victory last December, gets started tonight with an offering of a different nature.

The NFL Chicago Cardinals will play the Toronto Argonauts of the Canadian Big Four Football Union in an exhibition game featuring the rules of both leagues.

This is not the first time NFL and Canadian teams have matched styles of play, but it will offer good comparisons for the rule makers and football style devotees.

When the Cards have the ball, each team will have 11 men on the field in a la American style of play. Also the U.S. rule of unlimited interference will be in effect when either team is on the offensive.

The teams will be allowed 12 men when the Argos are on offense. But the big excitement in Toronto is the unlimited blocking rule, directly opposed to the Canadian rule that says a ball carrier is on his own once he hits the secondary.

Card Coach Frank (Pop) Ivy, who was a successful Canadian professional coach before taking over the Cards last season, may have Tom Catlin, veteran center whom the Cards obtained Tuesday from the Cleveland Browns. They gave up a draft choice for the former Oklahoma star.

Injuries were the talk of some of the other NFL training camps. In Los Angeles' Redland, Calif., camp, halfback Jon Arnett's hand injury will keep him sidelined only two weeks, instead of six to eight as originally feared.

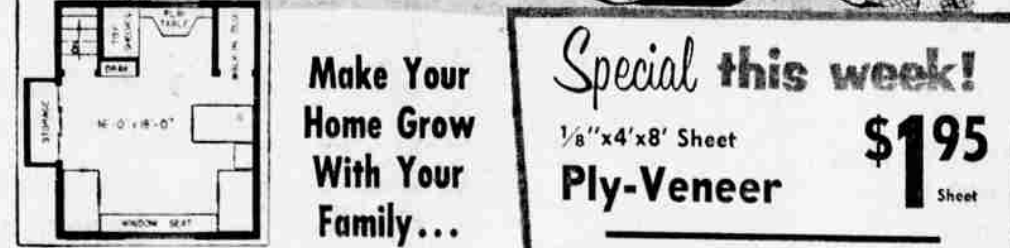
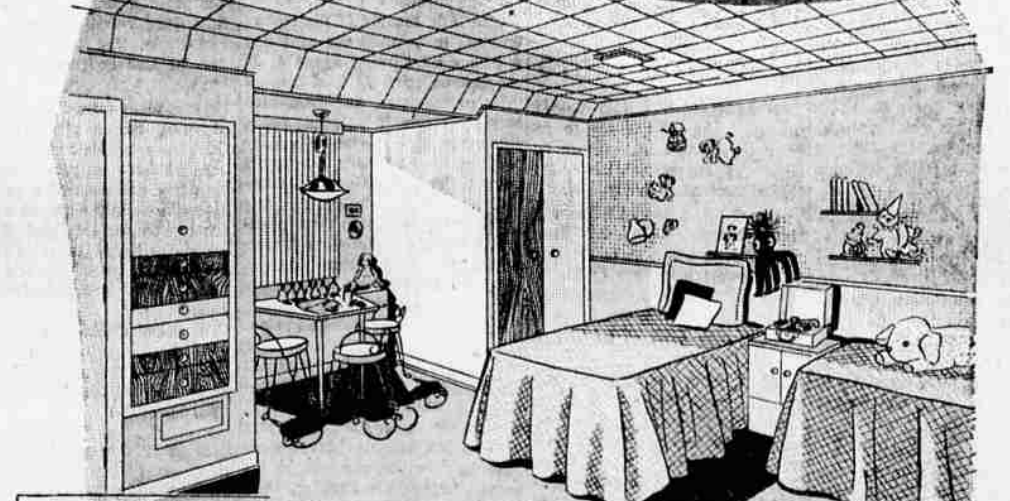
In the Colts camp, veteran
