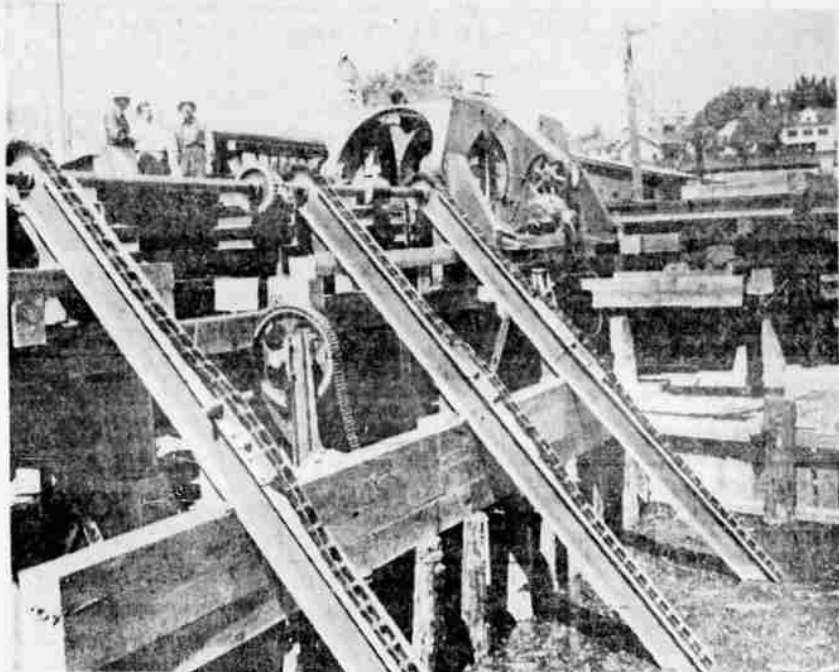
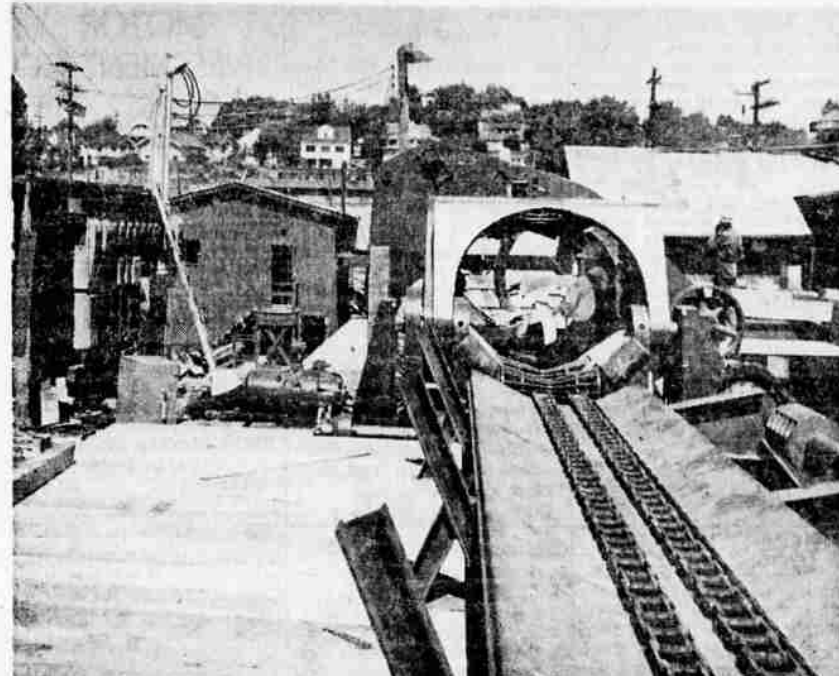
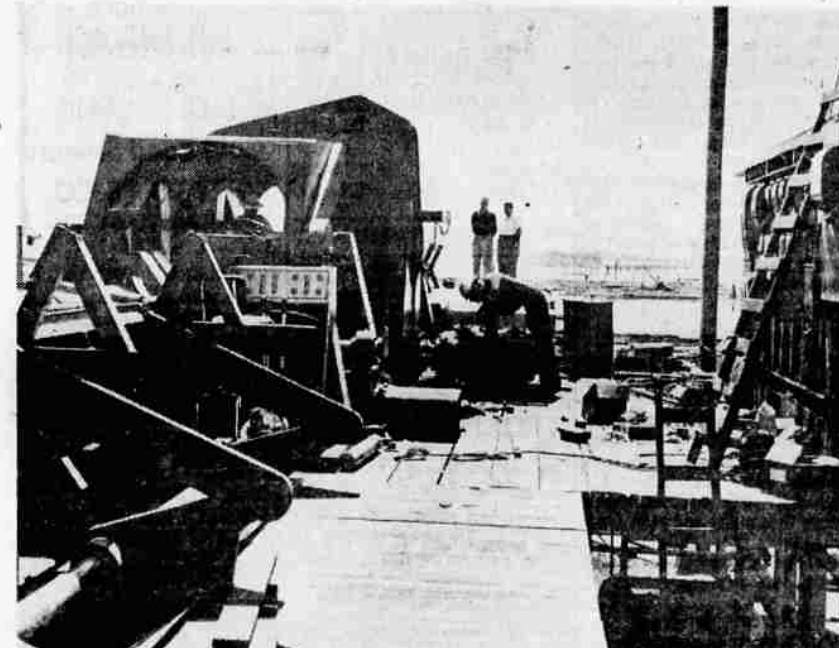

Modoc Lumber Installs Barker, Chipper Here

More jobs and more profits will accrue to the community with the installation of a barker and chipper at Modoc Lumber Company. The output of the new equipment which comes from debarked whole logs will be sold to Weyerhaeuser Timber Company's Klamath Falls operation for the manufacture of hardboard.

"The chipper means better utilization of raw material," explained Laurence Shaw, president of the Modoc Lumber Company, "because many types of defects found in logs, while tending to downgrade lumber, has no detrimental effect on chips."

Hardboard, manufactured and sold by Weyerhaeuser under the name of Weytex, is produced in sheets of pressed wood fiber and is used for a variety of purposes, including furniture making and upholstery backing in automobiles.

The accompanying pictures show the various stages in the installation of the new equipment at the Ewauna Lake millsite. First logs are slated to roll through the barker and chipper some time this week.

Theme of the week-long services is "Try Jesus."

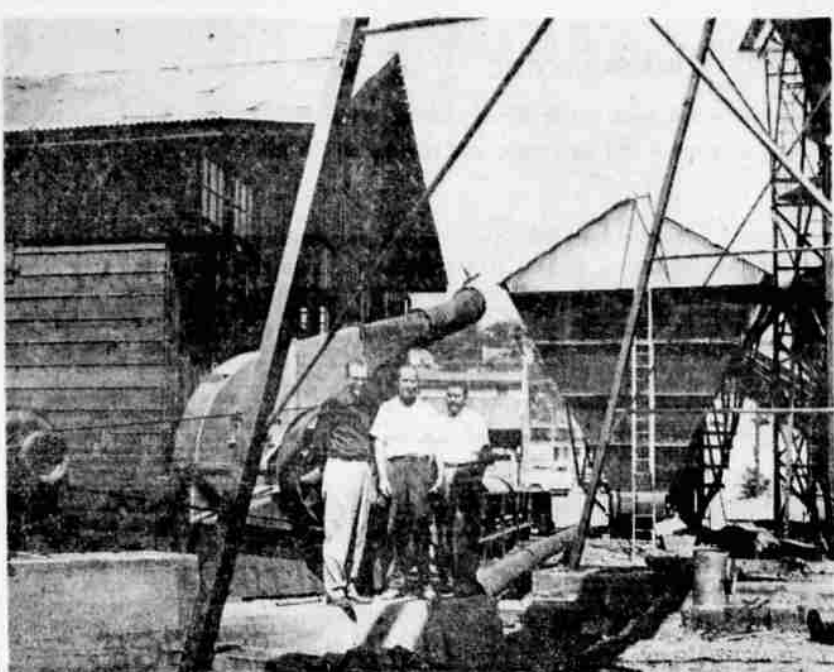
Young people of the church, with Gary Nichols as visitation chairman, are planning fellowships and

conferences, providing music during services and guiding other activities during the week.

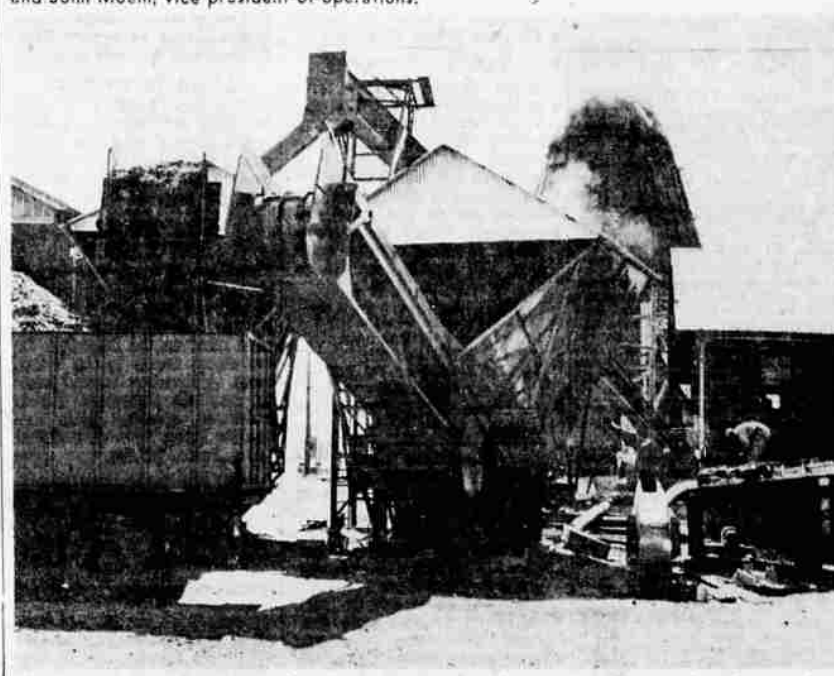
All services are open to the public. Those who wish to visit are meeting in various homes throughout the city. Fellowships are scheduled following the Wednesday, Friday and Sunday night services.

Klamath-Lake Loan Group Says Long Term Credit Up

Bryant Williams, secretary-treasurer of the Klamath-Lake National Farm Loan Association at Klamath Falls, reports that farm and ranch operators used the services of the association to provide themselves with \$1,149,000 of credit during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959. The association serves Klamath and Lake counties.

Refinancing of indebtedness, purchase of land and livestock improvements to land and buildings and general farm operations were the major purposes for which money was borrowed, according to Williams.

The association's loan account on June 30 stood at \$983,869 which compares with \$266,231 on the same date in 1958.

Williams also said the association now owns \$197,740 of capital stock in the Federal Land Bank of Spokane, the institution for which it makes and services loans.

This association and 64 other NFILA's in Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington own all of the bank's capital. During the last fiscal year the Klamath-Lake NFILA shared in a \$353,165 dividend declared by the bank.

During the year ended June 30, 1959, farm and ranch operators in Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington used the facilities of their cooperatively owned national farm loan associations and the Federal Land Bank of Spokane to provide themselves with more than 47 million dollars of long-term credit.

This 47 million dollars was 18 million dollars or approximately 38 per cent, ahead of the credit used in the preceding fiscal year, and was the highest amount of credit extended by the Spokane bank in any one year since it opened for business 42 years ago, according to Fred A. Knutsen, president.

During the year the bank paid a \$353,165 dividend to the associations, most of which was passed on to their members who are the bank's borrowers.

RESOLUTION NO. 983 A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON, TO PAVE AND IMPROVE ALANDALE STREET FROM THE SOUTHERLY LINE OF OLD ORCHARD MANOR TO THE SOUTHERLY LINE OF DARROW AVENUE AND RECLAMATION AVENUE FROM THE EASTERLY LINE OF WASHBURN WAY TO THE EASTERLY LINE OF ALANDALE STREET.

WHEREAS, the City Engineer, of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, pursuant to a resolution of the Common Council of said City, heretofore adopted, having filed plans, specifications and estimates for the cost of improvement of said street, and the same are hereby approved;

That the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, hereby declares its intention to improve said portion of said street in accordance with the plans, specifications and estimates as follows:

This project consists of paving Alandale Street from the south line of Old Orchard Manor to the south line of Darrow Avenue and paving Reclamation Avenue from the east line of Washburn Way to the east line of Alandale Street.

The project will consist of 3" of asphaltic concrete or 6" of portland cement concrete and will be 38 feet in width, including concrete curbs and gutters.

Included in the project are necessary grading, clearing of road-way, storm drainage, and other necessary miscellaneous items as set forth in the plans and specifications.

No sidewalks are to be constructed. An intersection is included. Asphaltic concrete driveways will be constructed to the property line where required.

The estimated cost of all classes of improvement embracing all work and materials for the complete improvement of said project for such type of pavement being as follows:

Asphaltic concrete pavement 3" thick \$4,968.34
Portland cement concrete pavement 6" thick \$40,389.34

Section 2. That the property lying within the boundaries hereinafter described be and the same is hereby declared to be benefited by the said improvement, to-wit:

BEGINNING AT the northwest corner of lot 16, Old Orchard Manor, a platted subdivision in the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon; thence southerly parallel to and 100 feet distant westerly from the westerly line of Alandale Street 271.0 feet, more or less, to a point 31.6 feet northerly from the southeast corner of said lot 11; thence westerly parallel to and 31.6 feet distant westerly from the southerly line of said lot 11 to the easterly line of Washburn Way 625.5 feet, more or less, to a point on the west line of lot 1, said Old Orchard Manor, said point being 34.9 feet southerly from the northwest corner of said lot 1; thence easterly parallel to and 34.9 feet distant southerly from the northerly lines of lots 1, 30 and 31, said Old Orchard Manor, 365.0 feet, more or less, to the east line of said lot 31; thence northerly parallel to and 100 feet distant easterly from the southerly line of Darrow Avenue; thence westerly along the south line of Darrow Avenue 380 feet, more or less, to the point of beginning.

Section 3. That all the property included in the aforesaid boundaries above described be and the same is hereby declared to be benefited by said improvement and assessed for the expense thereof.

CHURCH BOND ISSUE
NEW YORK (AP) — For the first time, the United Lutheran Church in America has entered the commercial money market. It is making a public issue of notes this summer, at interest rates up to 5 1/2 per cent, to raise \$1,500,000 as part of a three-year, 24 million dollar program to provide loans for new church buildings and acquisition of church sites.
