## Bureau Marshals Defense For Hurricane Protection

WASHINGTON (NEA)—The U.S. Weather Bureau is marshaling new defenses against hurricanes. They promise to give greater protection this year from the killer storms than ever before.

Special storm tracking equipment, faster warning systems and improved disaster preparedness plans for coastal communities are being used for the five-month hurricane season which started June 15.

When the season ends in November, new high powered radar installations will have been established in 11 cities on the Atlantic and Gulf Coasts, if construction goes according to schedule. These cities are Miami, Washington, New York, Brownsville, Tex., Wilmington, N.C., Atlantic City, Charleston, S.C., Daytona Beach, Fla., Apalachicola, Fla., Key West, and Tampa.

The new radar is known as the WSR-57 and is the first unit designed exclusively for tracking storms. The initials stand for Weather Search Radar. The number "57" designates the year it was invented.

The Miami unit, which was com-

pleted the middle of June, is already in operation. Twenty-eight more will be installed throughout the country by next summer.

Until this year, weather forecasters have had to rely on converted aircraft detection radars to locate and track hurricanes from the ground. These units often proved too weak to do a thorough job.

The only ground radar sets considered powerful enough have been three Navy installations on the Atlantic Coast. This number, however, hasn't been sufficient to provide adequate coverage for the hundreds of communities extending from the Florida Keys to the top of Maine and along the Gulf Coast.

But by next summer, WSR-57s will be strategically placed the entire length of the Atlantic and Gulf Coasts so that meteorologists can constantly track all hurricanes in that area. Others will be erected in Western and Midwestern states to locate cyclones, tornadoes and other types of storms.

The WSR-57 has a range of about 250 miles. It is powerful enough to enable meteorologists to plot the exact size of a hurricane. It may cover from 25 to 500 square miles.

The new radar also reveals where, within the storm area, the heaviest rains are located. Forecasters are thus able to estimate which communities will be in danger of flooding rains when the storm reaches land.

Norman Matson, chief of the Weather Bureau's Emergency Warning Section, explains that WSR-57s will not eliminate the need for hurricane reconnaissance aircraft in tracking the deadly winds.

"You can't afford to put all your eggs in one basket," he declares. "A hurricane's danger to life and property is so great that we must use all available sources of observation to make the best possible forecast."

He explains that the major benefit of ground radar units is to enable meteorologists to keep a constant check on storms. Planes can't provide this steady check since they must return to their bases for refueling.

But Matson adds: "The aircraft obtain additional information that radar can't give. This includes the strength and distribution of the winds and the value of the low pressure in the center of the storm. This data is necessary for forecasting and warning."

Gathering information is just half the job of tracking hurricanes. A forecaster must also know how to use the data properly in order to predict accurately where the storm will strike.

To help insure that predictions are correct, forecasters will use three different mathematical systems this year to analyze the data. In past years, they have used only two.

## Mexico Not Miser's Eden As Middle Class Emerges

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Foreign residents find Mexico exotic, colorful, different. But it is no longer a penny pincher's paradise.

Prices have tripled in the last few years. A major reason is the emergence of a middle class. Another is the country's blossoming prosperity.

Pepe Romero, Mexico's best known English-language columnist, quotes his wife Del to the point.

"When I came here as a blushing bride in 1951, a servant earned 100 pesos — \$8 — a month," she said. She now gets 300 up, and a halfway decent cook gets 500.

"Rents have skyrocketed accordingly. Meats, fruits, and vegetables to mismo (the same)."

"But the biggest change I've noticed is the emergence of a middle class. Not too long ago one servant in 10 was literate. Today most girls under 20 can read and

write reasonably well." The good old days for foreigners have become the good new days for Mexico's poor, emerging into a middle class.

"One scarcely recognizes the skyline any more," Pepe commented. "For example, look at all the new hotels, the 44-story skyscraper on San Juan de Letran and Madero, the scores of exciting, ultra-modern buildings."

"Gone are the cargadores—men who carried on their back, everything from furniture to freshly butchered bulls—always so much a part of this city. Street vendors are almost no more. The old markets, picturesque and dirty, such as La Merced and La Lagunilla, have been replaced by new, sanitary and unimaginative, strictly functional market stalls. The city, like an octopus, has spread its tentacles—out to Pedregal to the south, past Barrilaco to the west, with new real estate developments such as Satellite City. Modern speedways and viaducts crisscross one end of the city to the other. And the old cactus plants along main glorietas, or circles, and boulevards have been replaced by myriads of multicolored flowers and gushing fountains."

Mexico City has mushroomed into one of the world's largest cities, with a population estimated at some five million.

It is as modern as Manhattan in many ways. But a few miles outside the city limits Mexicans still live in adobe huts with dirt floors, dress in the old rebozos, live on tortillas, beans. During the transition Mexico is truly a country of contrasts.

## India Plans Milk Project

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—With foreign help, the Indian government is completing a project to provide New Delhi with its first dependably pure fresh milk.

Milk is a luxury in India. Those who can afford it usually get milk from emaciated, sickly cows, diluted with impure water.

But to a devout Hindu, milk is nectar. It is one of the prime offerings to a deity. Nothing is said to please a departing soul more than a few spoonfuls of milk.

The government is building a big milk processing plant in the heart of New Delhi's industrial suburb. A system of cattle colonies is being established within a 50-mile radius of the city.

Sacred cows will continue to wander in Delhi's streets, but small, unsanitary private farms will be banned from the city.

Five countries are supplying money, experts, and equipment for the first milk plant of its kind in India. More than half of the funds for the four-million-dollar project came from New Zealand, through the Colombo Plan. Ten experts and machinery have come from Britain, West Germany, Sweden and Denmark.

The plant will turn out 100,000 gallons of milk a day. It will also produce ice cream, butter, and the first powdered milk made in India.
