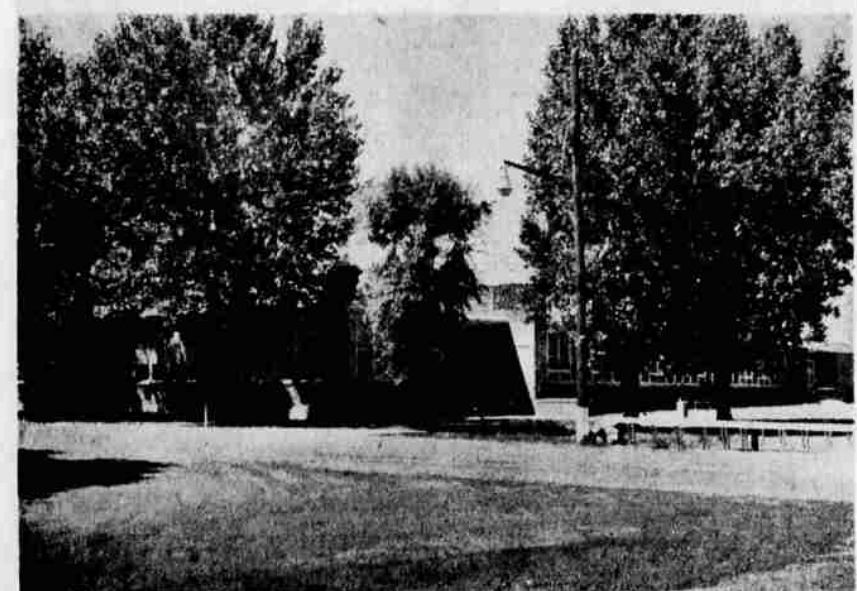


Etna Board Lists Rules Governing School Buses

ETNA — The governing board has established the following rules relating to pupil conduct based upon the "Regulation of Pupil Transportation" as set forth in the State Department of Education and the California Highway Patrol laws of all who ride school buses, governing the operation of school buses.



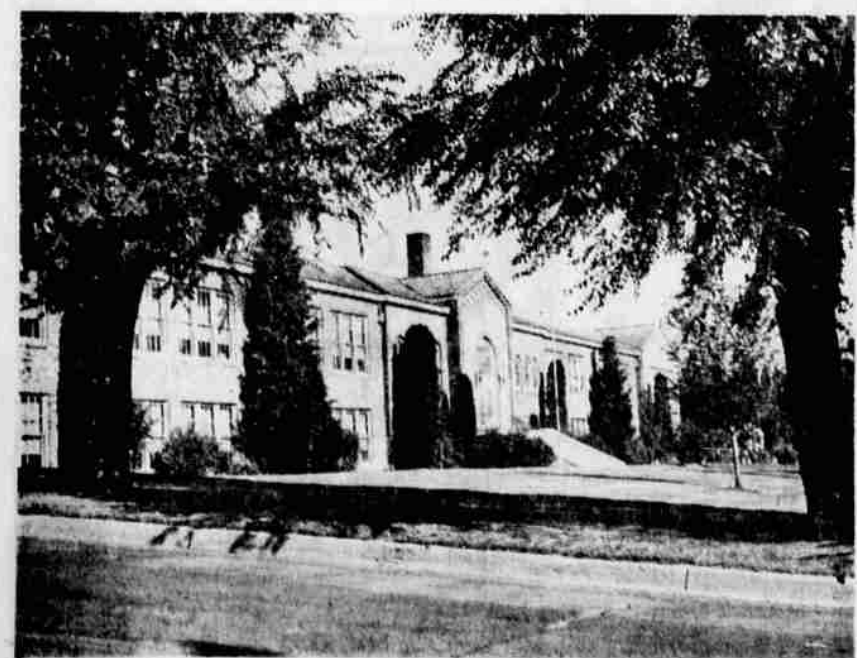
KENO ELEMENTARY SCHOOL is gearing for an enrollment of 100 students from grades one through eight, Fred Taylor, principal, said. These youngsters will attend Henley High School when they are graduated. Buses pick them up from as far as 12 miles away in the Worden and Copco Big Bend Dam areas.



MERRILL ELEMENTARY SCHOOL probably will have an enrollment of 275 students when it opens September 9. Two classrooms have been added to accommodate the increase. An additional first grade is planned. Cafeteria will serve lunches at 25 cents apiece. School will close June 3.



ALTAMONT ELEMENTARY SCHOOL'S principal is Stan Severik. His school contains grades one through six. It employs 12 teachers, and enrollment is expected to reach about 325 students. The school is a part of the county system. First graders will use a quonset structure temporarily this year to alleviate crowded conditions at Altamont Junior High, Severik says. Three persons staff the cafeteria. They cook for about 250 students daily.



THE NEWEST ADDITION to Roosevelt School is a hot water well to be used in the heating system. Officials of the school hope that this will lower heating costs in the 30-year-old building. This year the school's expected enrollment will be 401, making it one of the larger city schools. It has a faculty of 17 full-time and one part-time teacher, plus the principal, Gerald Clemens, 1975 Painter Street. Roosevelt has students from grades one through seven who live on the east side of Kit Carson Way.

1,200 Students Expected In Yreka Elementaries

YREKA — Robert Reynolds, superintendent of elementary schools and principal of Yreka Elementary Schools, anticipates an enrollment of approximately 1,200 students for the coming term, which will start on September 10, the students to be distributed between the Jackson Street and Gold Street schools.

Both the Jackson Street and Gold Street schools are modern buildings built within the last six years. The Jackson Street School has 23 classrooms and a big multipurpose room, which serves as a cafeteria, and is also used for sports and other activities.

The Gold Street School has 11 regular classrooms, but because of a shortage of classrooms to handle the large influx of new pupils, the multipurpose room of the school is being converted into three class-

rooms, which will eliminate the use of kitchen and cafeteria service.

Reynolds stated that his faculty is not quite complete as yet, but new teachers, who are already signed up will include Richard Woodruff of Covina, fourth grade; Richard Simmons of Etna, and Harold McNamara of Grenada, sixth grade; Clifford Smith of Covelo, fifth grade, and Dorothy Taylor of Yreka, primary classes.

The remainder of the faculty for the two schools, those who taught last year, are Ruth Hurley, Shirley Fleishman, Mary Hebard, Blanche Steele, Isabel Plenne, all first grades; Leona Bryan, Minerva Starritt, and Marjorie O'Roke, second grades; Marie Purinton, Maxine Hurley, and Margaret Dunham, third grades; Mary Sloan, June Giebner, and Edith Elliott, fourth grades; Valeria Lange, Elizabeth Doyle and Louise Cottar, fifth grades.

Audrey Prothero, William Mar-

tin and Courtney Smith, sixth grades. Seventh and eighth teachers will include Vernon Muschel, Dorothy Johnson, Robert Jefferson, Frank Pavlik, Vernon Warren, Freda Johnson and Bernice Herfindahl.

Kindergarten teachers are Alice Newton, Josephine Caldwell, Rosemary Corwin and Fern Meamber. Warren Behnke will teach band, Danile Soares, a new member of the faculty, will teach music and glee club.
