Golding, who is married, graduated and received his masters degree at Columbia University.

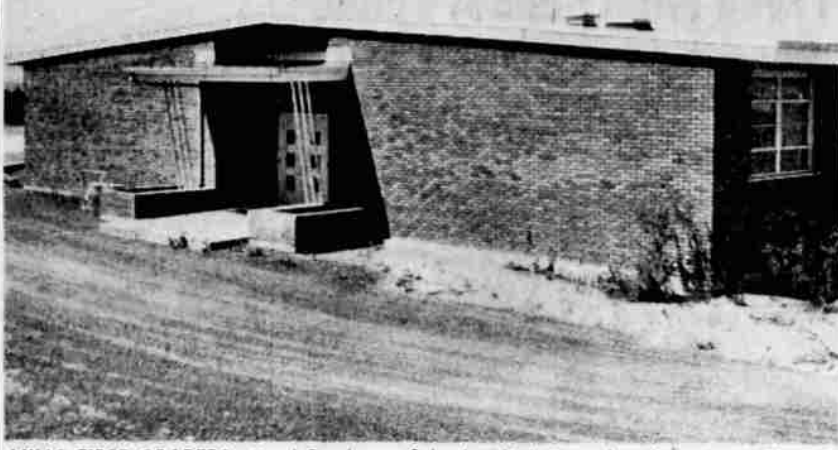
Callahan School Opens August 31

CALLAHAN — Callahan School doors will open for the 85th time, August 31. In continuous use since it was built in 1874, until recently all eight elementary grades were taught. Seventh and eighth grade students now attend Etna Junior High School.

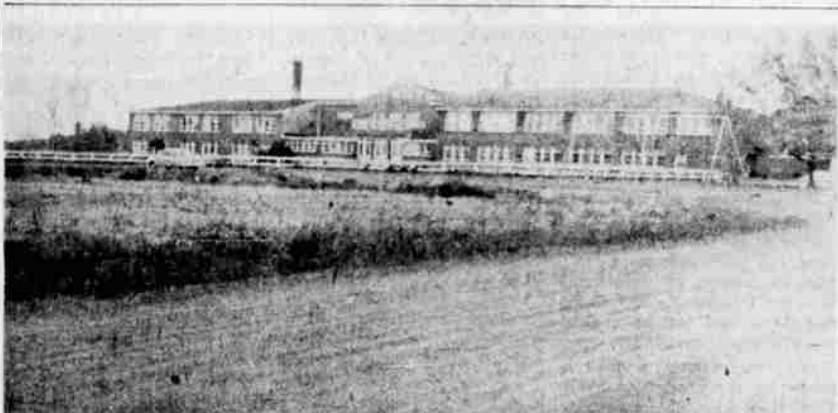
A Miss Rosalea Barnum was the school's first teacher and R. M. Hayden its first trustee.

MILLS FIRST GRADERS attend Ponderosa School, which is under the principalship of James Scott. Its expected enrollment is 114 students from Mills Addition and encircling areas. Ponderosa, one of the newer schools in the system, will probably change grades with the completion of the Lucile O'Neill school in 1960.



BONANZA SCHOOL is another in the county system that accommodates grades one through 12. Its principal is Charles Steber. The elementary section contained 234 students and the high school 88 when school ended in June. The school was built recently.

Lake Enrollment Holds Steady

LAKEVIEW — Enrollment in schools of Lakeview and Lake County is not expected to fluctuate much from last year's figures, according to local administrators.

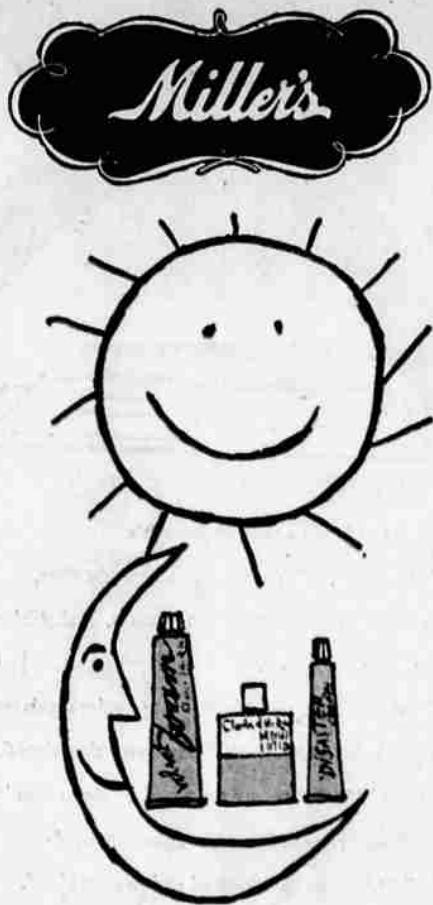
There may be a slight increase in high school enrollment this year, H. B. Ferrin, superintendent, anticipates. Last year's figure was 382.

In the elementary schools last year there were 918 pupils, which was 16 per cent over the previous year. Kindergarten classes are limited to 120 students, but there were 133 students accommodated over the last year period because of the moving of families.

One additional section has been arranged for this year for the seventh grade, which makes a total of four. There will be three eighth grade sections, five for first grades, five for second and five for third.

Mrs. Anne Sprague, county school superintendent, feels that nothing seems to indicate a change in last year's county district school enrollment of 348 pupils. This includes 38 in the high school at Paisley.

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
