Weed School To Open In New Plant

WEED—After 41 years on a hill-top site, classes of the Weed High School will open in new quarters now nearing completion.

Located downhill approximately one-fourth mile southeast of old site and across the road from the present Legion Field, the \$305,000 plant has been under construction by the A. J. McMurray Company of Yreka. It was designed by Howard Perrin, Klamath Falls, architect.

Two additional rooms of the new plant costing approximately \$40,000 are under construction by the Souza Construction Company of Redding.

Two well known athletic personalities, Mort Kaer Sr., former All American USC football star and a 1924 Olympic decathlon winner, and George Matios, an Olympic team pole vaulter, return to the faculty roster.

Kaer will return for his fourteenth year at WHS teaching lower math and as head athletic coach. He announced the first Cougar football game would be October 2 with Fall River, a new league game. Practice will begin August 31 at Legion Field.

Matios is music instructor for WHS and the Weed Union Elementary School returning for his third term. He entered with the U.S. team in the 1927 Olympic events in Australia and plans Olympic competition in 1960. He will ready the WHS band early for a performance at the University of California homecoming game at Berkeley in November.

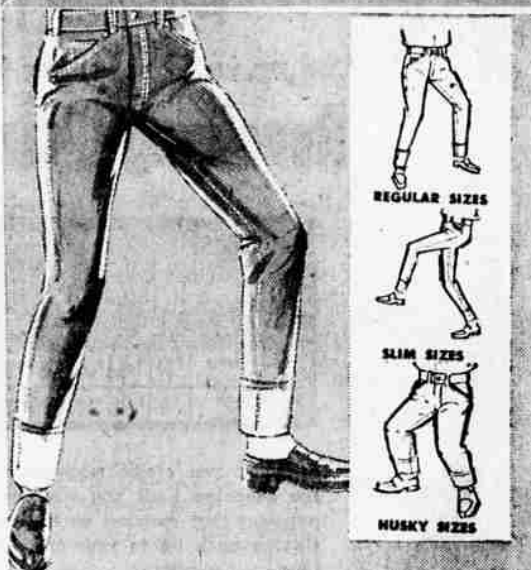

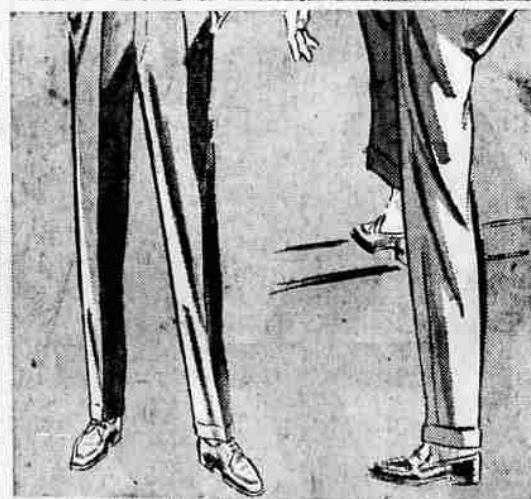
