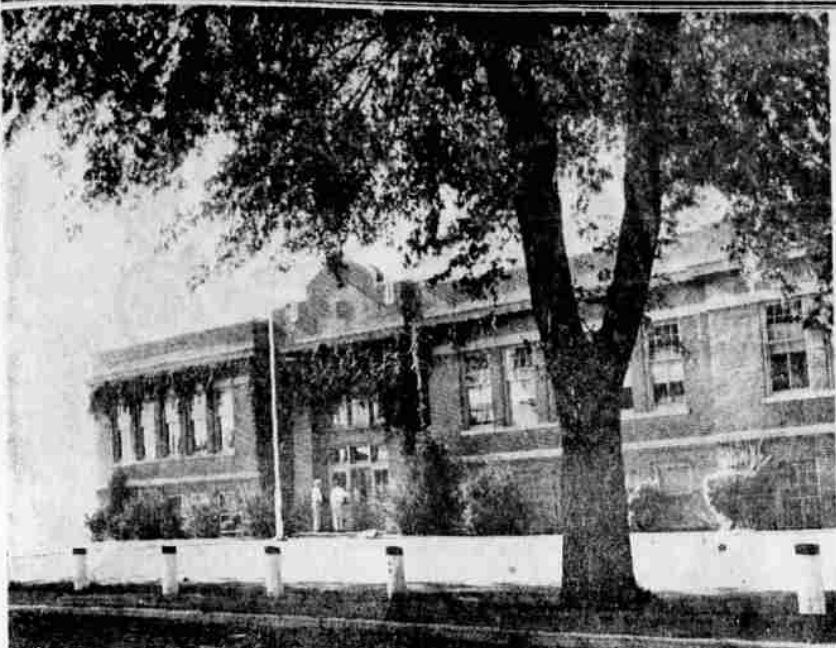
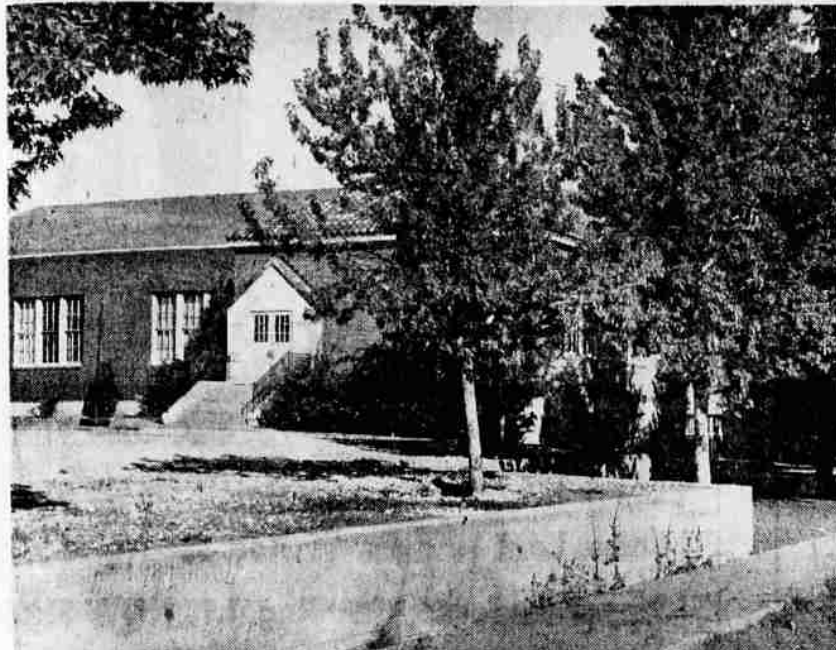
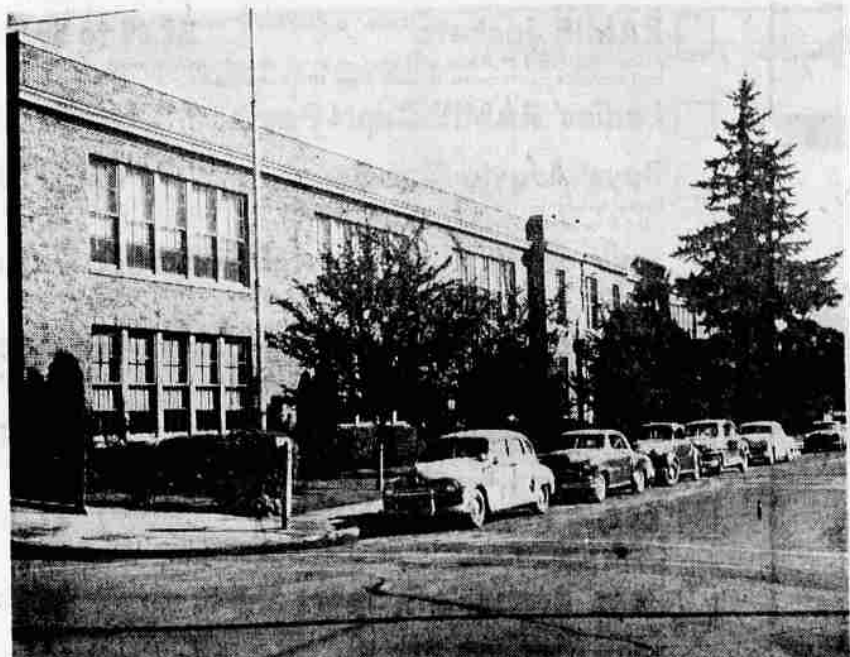




PELICAN SCHOOL was built to accommodate the youngsters of the many families who had moved to a promising lumber site, which became the once thriving area of Pelican City. Now, years later, the activity has greatly lessened, but Pelican School still carries an expected enrollment this year of 341 and has students from Wocus, Shady Pine and Algoma. There are seven grades of two classes each, with 14 regular teachers and several traveling instructors in such fields as music and art. New principal at the school is Jack Kemaizer.



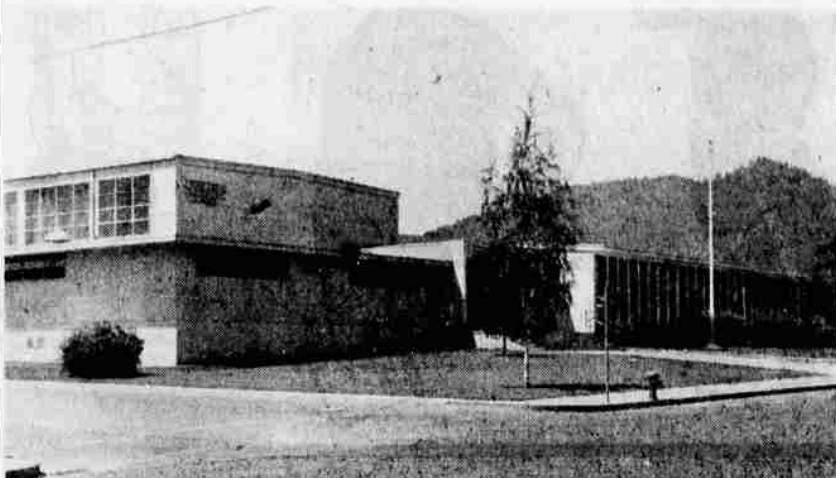
THE JOSEPH CONGER SCHOOL, better known locally as Conger School, carries the name of the man who donated the land which the building now rests upon. This ground was part of his ranch. Conger is now used by approximately 215 students of grades one through seven. It employs nine full-time teachers and two part-time instructors. Near the original structure is the site of the new Conger Park which is being developed in cooperation with the City Recreation Department. James W. Young, 45 Pine Street, is the principal.



BEST KNOWN as a junior high school, although it contains grades one, two and three, is Fremont. This building primarily handles the eighth grade students from the various city elementary schools. This year officials expect 375 students to attend opening day. Principal is Lowell Kaup, 2455 Reclamation Street.



MONTAGUE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL "A" annex contains new classrooms and a multipurpose room containing gymnasium, cafeteria and activities space combined. More than 200 attend.

Bly To Hire New Tutors

About 200 students are expected to enter Bly School when it opens its doors to grades one through 12 September 9 at 8:45 a.m.

William Pohl, principal, says the school will employ two new teachers this year. They haven't been hired yet, but applications are being studied.

The school has a separate cafeteria building. Hot lunches are served to nearly all the students and teachers. Mrs. Martin Melness will be in charge of the cafeteria this year. Mrs. John Chronister, last year's cafeteria manager, retired.

Ellis Gross, Herbert Hadley and Jim Briley serve on the local school board. Fred Murphy is custodian. Murphy is working on a new heating system. The present furnace is being converted to oil. Previously, the furnace burned coal—about 80 tons of it during winter.

All grades attend classes in the same building. It is about 25 years old. Its ancestors were a log schoolhouse back of the Sycan Building, and a second, larger plant, later destroyed by fire. The present building replaced it.

The gym is a popular place for students and townspeople. The bleachers accommodate large crowds that attend local basketball games, community functions and gatherings. A trampoline has been added this year.

500 Expected At Ferguson

Twyla Ferguson School on Homedale Road was built four years ago by the County School District to help meet educational needs of the South Suburban Area of Klamath Falls.

It contained 10 classrooms at first. That number increased to 16 the following year.

About 500 students are expected by Principal A. C. Olson to attend this fall.
