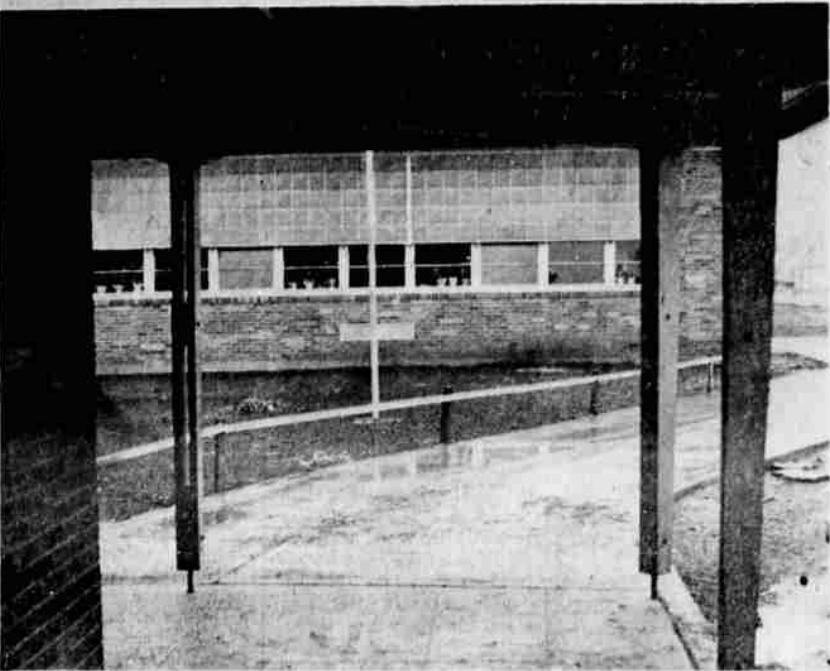
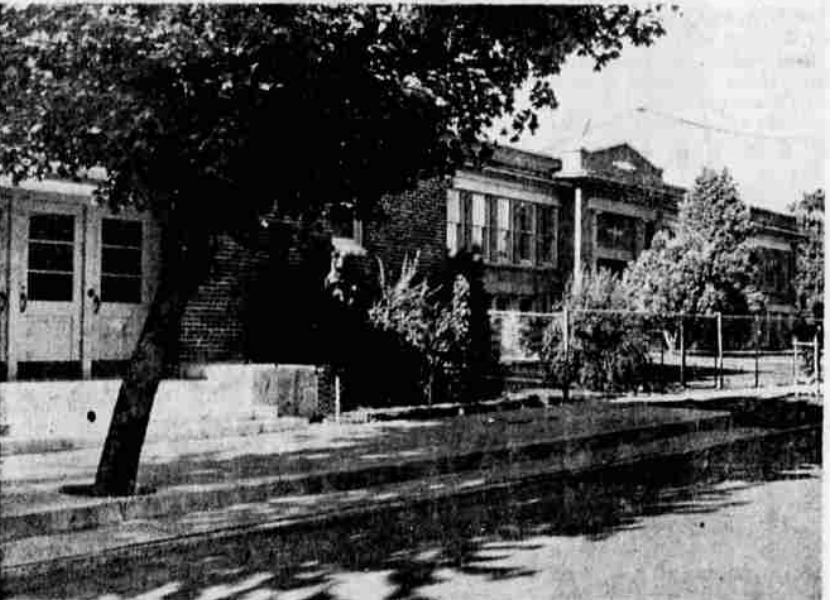

Two Instructors Needed To Complete Full Staff For Lake County Faculty

LAKEVIEW—Two vacancies remain on the local staff of teachers for the coming year, but otherwise the faculty is complete for the four Lakeview schools, according to report of H. B. Ferrin, superintendent.

The vacancies include a sixth grade in the A. D. Hay building and the position of high school science instructor.

Berge A. Borrevik Jr., a University of Oregon graduate, who has been teaching at Mid-Pacific Institute in Honolulu the past two years, has been selected for junior high school science teacher and he will also be head basketball coach and assistant in other sports.

While at Oregon Borrevik was on both the freshman and varsity basketball teams and for one year coached the freshman team. In Hawaii his team won 19 games out of 25 and was the winner of the Punahou Invitational Tournament.

On graduation he received the outstanding graduate award for scholarship and all-round ability in the school of physical education and health at the University of Oregon. He and his wife will arrive in Lakeview about August 15 and will reside at 427 South H Street.

Three other high school teachers have been employed. Mrs. Fern B. Walton, a graduate of Lewis and Clark college, with five years of training, will teach English. She will also have charge of dramatics. Mrs. Blanche E. Boulden will be the new girls' physical education and health teacher. She is a graduate of Eastern Oregon College. She will also supervise the GAA activities.

Mrs. Albert H. Leuthauser has accepted the position of junior high school homeroom teacher a half day and classes in high school English for a half day. She is a graduate of Simpson College in Iowa, and has done graduate work at the University of Oregon.

A new man added to the A. D. Hay School faculty, Charles M. Wark, is a graduate of Eastern Montana College, and will be one of the sixth grade teachers. He will also assist with coaching.

Mrs. Mabel Harris Johnson, who has been teaching in the New Idaho District of the county schools, has been signed as fifth or sixth grade teacher. She is a graduate of Western Washington College of Education at Bellingham and did graduate work at the University of Oregon and Oregon College of Education.

Two additional teachers have been employed for increased enrollment in primary grades. Mrs. Elizabeth Baker, formerly of Redmond, will have a third grade at Fremont School. Mrs. Virginia M. McPherson, a substitute teacher last year, will take a regular job, also with the third grade at Fremont. Mrs. Josephine Goss, formerly with the Union School, is taking additional work in education at Southern Oregon College this summer in preparation for work with the second grade at Fremont.

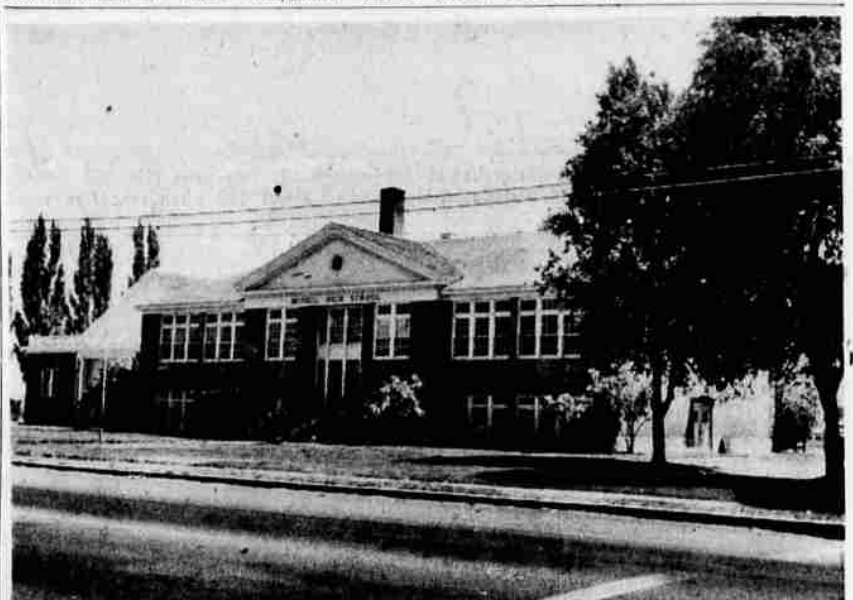

Mills School Tops System

An expected enrollment of 625 students this fall will make Mills Elementary School, grades two through seven, the largest grade school in the city. Its companion school, Ponderosa, will handle Mills first graders, except 110 youngsters on the opening day, Tuesday, September 8.

Principal for the two schools is James Scott, a 15-year resident of Klamath Falls and a veteran teacher. Before accepting the principalship last year, he was the director of Conger for three years and the dean of boys at Fremont Junior High for seven years.

Scott, who received his master's degree from Montana State University, reports that there are several faculty changes this year in the 27 teachers at Mills and the five at Ponderosa.

There will be no new Mills' classrooms added to either Mills' 24 or Ponderosa's four. However, the latter school has one extra room for special primary cases from all the schools in town. The teacher in charge will give aid to children who are having difficulty in school subjects or adjusting to various problems.

Mills' crowded classroom problem will be eased when the new Lucile O'Neill School is completed in the fall of 1960.

Lake Orientation Course Planned

LAKEVIEW — A day of orientation for all new teachers in the Lake County School system has been planned by administrators for Friday, August 28, in the high school building beginning at 9 a.m.

The day will afford an opportunity for faculty members to learn about policies and practices from principals and supervisors. This meeting has proven of much value in the past two years for those new in the system, officials say.

A Lake County teachers' workshop in the field of guidance and audio-visual aids is being arranged by Mrs. Anne Sprague, county school superintendent, with the aid of a teacher planning committee.

The workshop will have its first session Monday, August 31, at 9 a.m., in Lakeview High School Auditorium and will carry on through Tuesday.

Dr. F. R. Zeran, dean of the School of Education at Oregon State College, an expert in the field of guidance, will be guest leader. The program has been arranged to include general and sectional sessions, a breakfast catered by the men, and special luncheons.

Lake County Schools Plan Continuous Growth System

LAKEVIEW — After a year's study by a committee of primary teachers under the chairmanship of Richard Lorenzen, principal of Fremont School in Lakeview, a "continuous growth" program, or ungraded primary grades, will be instituted in the two primary schools this year.

This development has been reached in a search for improvement over the present system and the fact that it has proved successful in many school systems.

The school board has approved the initiation of the plan this year which eliminates actual grades assigned at the end of each school year.

Instead, the grades will be broken down into four levels each, and parents will be notified when children complete a level of work. If normal progress is made, a student will complete four levels each year.

Under this program it is felt that there are few advantages or disadvantages over the present system for the average pupil, but for the faster and slower students there will be decided advantages.

The school work covered in the program is the same as normally would be included in the first three grades. Through the use of a finer breakdown of achievement than grades, the teacher can prepare more thoroughly because she is teaching a group with a smaller range of ability in reading. The child moves from one level or work to another when he has completed the work of the first level. He does this in successive steps, never failing or repeating, but always progressing.

Because progress is tailored to a child's individual ability and work habits, it may take him four years to complete the first three years. It is also important that no child "skip" since each level of this program is necessary for continuous mental growth.

Lakeview Plans Study Changes

LAKEVIEW — Changes in high school courses of study in Lakeview this year will be in the field of physical education, health and mathematics, superintendent H. B. Ferrin announced.

Physical education and health will be required only in freshman and sophomore years. They will be optional in junior and senior years. Heretofore, these subjects were required of all the students.

In mathematics, four years will be offered, including one-half year of trigonometry and a half year of advanced senior mathematics.

In the science field, physics, biology and general science will be offered and chemistry the following year.

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
