Record first half sales and earnings for Permanente Cement are

reported by president Wallace A. Marsh at Oakland. . . sales of \$37,446,000 for the six months ended June 30 were up approximately 34 per cent from the corresponding period in 1958. . . net earnings for the period totaled \$5,312,000, equivalent to 93 cents a share, up 47 per cent from the first half of 1958 when earnings were 63 cents a share. . . sales from the newly acquired Olympic Portland Cement Division of Bellingham, Wash., and the new Portland Division of Glacier Sand & Gravel were incorporated in the first-half figures for the first time. . . Permanente is building a \$13 million cement plant in Hawaii.

'White House' Idea Excites Gettysburg

GETTYSBURG, Pa. (AP) — Gettysburg, long accustomed to taking President Eisenhower's comings and goings in stride, is a bit excited because it is going to be, for all practical purposes, the base of White House operations for a week or so. . . The Gettysburg Times, which usually reports the President's weekend visits to his farm near here in a few paragraphs, gave top play to its story that the White House is going to set up shop here for an indefinite period. . . "So again Gettysburg becomes the center of world attraction," the Times said. "The President of the world's greatest nation will make his headquarters here for at least a week."

Because of overcast skies, Eisenhower abandoned Friday plans to fly here by helicopter. Instead, he came from Washington by automobile. . . Eisenhower plans to play golf and relax until Monday, when he returns to the capital to keep appointments. He will meet with Republican congressional leaders there on Tuesday. . . Then he returns here for what press secretary James C. Hagerty has described as the nearest thing to a vacation the President will get before beginning a series of international conferences later this month.
