Mid-Columbians Capture BR Crown In First Year Of Play

The Mid-Columbians, The Dalles (District No. 3), representative in the Oregon State Babe Ruth League Baseball tournament concluded in Gem Stadium Saturday night earned the right to represent Oregon in the Babe Ruth Regionals by virtue of a 10-5 victory over runnerup Madison.

The Dalles nine will travel to Victoria BC this week and prepare for its opening game against the British Columbia representative.

The Regionals, a single elimination tourney, begins Thursday and ends Sunday, August 16.

The Mid-Columbians entered the Klamath Falls tournament, completely unheralded. The group is barely completing its first year in Babe Ruth competition, having formed their leagues at the start of the 1959 season.

The team was forced to enter the tournament without the services of manager Noel Aronson. Aronson was stricken with a virus infection on the eve of his intended departure for Klamath Falls. He arrived in time to watch his team, from the stands, win the Oregon State Championship.

In his absence coaches Cliff Piland and Henry Sanders shared the responsibility of guiding the club through the meet.

The runnerup Madison squad, which upset the pre-tourney favored Cleveland nine in the opening round, whipped Wilson in the semis, came within two runs of winning the title when they entered the bottom of the last inning in the championship game on the short end of a 10-4 score. They managed four scores but their rally finally died out.

The winners dropped Northeast in the opener, and Klamath Falls

in the semis.

The number three spot went to Klamath Falls. The KF nine humbled Wilson 17-3 in the finals, lost 15-5 to The Dalles in the semis, after waxing Tualatin 15-6 in the opener.

The eight-team tournament, under the direction of Joe Kind, tournament director, and Jack Kennitzer, got off to a good start despite an auto accident that marred the occasion and resulted in a broken wrist for Cleveland player Jim Leahy.

The Clevelanders, however, after a shaky start, losing to Madison, roared back for two straight and the consolation championship. They defeated Fernhill, then Northeast in the finals.

Cowboy Bill Stead Rides Hydro Home

SEATTLE (AP) — Cowboy Bill Stead rode the unruly Maverick of Lake Mead, Nev., to victory Sunday in the Gold Cup speedboat race and his churning wake left Seattle drenched in sorrow.

Only one other time in 10 years has this hydroplane-happy city lost the Gold Cup—in 1956, when it moved to Detroit. The winner designates the site for the next race and William Waggoner of Phoenix, who owns the Maverick, is expected to set the defense for Lake Mead, where he bases the boat.

Stead's margin of victory over a local favorite—Bill Muncey in Miss Thriftway—was so small the unlimited hydroplane race was over for two hours before officials came up with the decision. Most of the crowd, estimated at more than 250,000, waited for the announcement.

At the end of 99 miles of racing Stead and Muncey were tied in points, each with 1325. Maverick

was given the cup because she made the run 13.3 seconds faster than did Miss Thriftway. A Washington, D. C., entry, Nitrogen, placed third with 714 points and Wahoo of Seattle was fourth with 709.

Fourteen boats were entered and—because of a rule permitting only seven to run at one time—each of the race's first two 30 mile heats was split into two divisions. The winner of each got 400 points and also a rans a lesser total. Two—the Breathless II of Lake Tahoe and Thriftway Too of Seattle—failed to finish a heat and earned no points at all.

Miss Spokane was fifth with 691, followed by Miss Pay 'N' Save, Seattle, 616; Gale VI, Detroit, 499; Miss U. S. I., Detroit, 400; Miss Seattle, 352; Hawaii Kai III, the defending champion, 300; Gale V, Detroit, 240; and KOL-Roy, Seattle, 127.

Muncey pushed Stead to a record 104.003 miles per hour average speed and himself beat the 103.481 mark set last year by the Kai. Wahoo cracked its own 1958 record for a 3-mile lap, making one trip around the Lake Washington oval at 113.924 miles per hour.

Wahoo won the first section of the first heat, with Maverick second and Miss Thriftway third. Miss U. S. I. captured the second section, but both these winners failed to finish in the second heat.

Thriftway won Heat 2-A and Maverick Heat 2-B to give them a wide edge on the field as the seven leading boats went into the final heat. Lightning fast on the straightaways, Maverick was cranky on the turns and once in the last heat Stead had to circle back around a missed buoy.

He was badly pocketed at the start and ran fourth most of the way behind Wahoo, Miss Spokane and Thriftway. Part of the post-race delay came while officials scanned motion pictures of the start and then ruled Miss Spokane had jumped the starting gun. It dropped her to fifth place in the heat.

That disqualification gave Maverick third place in the heat and points enough for the tie with Thriftway. Muncey, who won this race in 1956 and '57, lost it in 1955 to Gale V much as he lost it Sunday—finishing in front in the final heat only to learn his total time was slower than the Gale's.

Berra Smashes 300 HR Sunday

NEW YORK (UPI)—Yogi Berra is the first catcher and 16th player in major league history to join the 300-homer club.

Berra hit the 300th homer of his career with two out in the ninth inning of Sunday's nightcap with Kansas City to send the game into overtime.

Other active major leaguers who have hit 300 homers are Ted Williams, Stan Musial, Duke Snider and Gil Hodges.

Babe Ruth leads the all-time parade with 714—not counting 15 in World Series competition.
