ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP)—A Negro alderman and two companions were arrested Sunday night in a north St. Louis restaurant which refused to serve them.

When Alderman William L. Clay and his friends refused to leave, the hostess at the Howard Johnson restaurant, Miss Dorothy Congleton, 52, called police.

Booked with Clay on charges of disturbing the peace were Ray Howard of St. Louis and Robert L. Schwerdtmann of suburban Richmond Heights. Schwerdtmann is white.

The three men filed a peace disturbance charge against Miss Congleton and she also was booked. The four were released on bonds of \$500 each and are scheduled to appear today in city court.

Clay, a Democrat, is chairman of an aldermanic committee which has scheduled hearings next month on charges of racial discrimination in city construction projects.

**German Girl Will Enroll At Lakeview**

LAKEVIEW — Lakeview High School's American Field Service foreign exchange student for the coming school year is Ursel Schlemmer, 17, of Hofheim, Germany. She will arrive in New York August 17 on the SS Waterman. Ursel will make her home with Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Pollard and their two children, Cinda and Herbert Jr., Lakeview.

The organizations sponsoring the foreign exchange program in Lakeview are the Rotary Club, Associated Students of Lakeview High School, Lions Club, American Association of University Women, Business and Professional Women, Soroptimist Club, Knights of Columbus, Elks Lodge and Job's Daughters.

Delbert Millholland, principal of Lakeview High School, is in charge of the American Field Service Chapter since the transfer of Jay Sorseth to Albany. Sorseth was manager until recently of the J. C. Penney store in Lakeview and president of the local AFS chapter.

This year's AFS exchange is being financed by a \$600 check from Crown-Zellerbach and receipts from a public dinner held earlier in the year.

Mike Tooke, son of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley J. Tooke of Lakeview, is in Germany on the summer exchange sponsored by American Field Service.

**Economy Still Strong Despite Steel Strike**

CLEVELAND (UPI)—The nationwide steel strike, which has resulted in a direct loss of \$1,400,000,000 in 27 days, has thus far failed to materially slow down the economy, according to Steel Magazine.

The metalworking weekly said much of the slack has been taken up by other industries and steelworkers have not yet suffered severely. They are living on savings and final pay checks received in late July. It is not expected they will feel the squeeze until Labor Day.

The trade weekly estimated that workers have lost \$270,800,000 in wages. Company losses were estimated at \$798,000,000 in sales and \$152,000,000 in overhead, depreciation and salaries of nonproduction employees, the loss to the government in taxes was estimated at \$180,000,000.

A heavy inventory of steel, adequate for at least three more weeks of near-normal operations, is keeping industrial activity high. Trouble will come when stocks get out of balance—perhaps within a few days in isolated cases.

Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's impending visit on Sept. 15 prompted speculation that more government pressure will be brought to end the strike. The magazine said some observers believe President Eisenhower will either exert enough pressure from behind the scenes to force a settlement or will call for the 90-day cooling off period provided in the Taft-Hartley Act.

Steelmaking operations last week slipped to 12 per cent of capacity, off 0.2 per cent from

the preceding week's revised rate. Production was about 340,000 in 207 tons. July output was only 5,500,000 tons.

Steel's scrap price composite dropped 34 cents to \$35.33 a gross ton. The trade consensus is that the market will move up as soon as mills resume normal operations.

Metalworking companies will spend \$474,000,000 for metal cutting machine tools this year compared to \$233,000 last year—an increase of more than 100 per cent. This means an investment of \$86 in machine tools for each production worker in the industry.

The trade weekly also reported a new kind of porous metal product on the way. Fiber metallurgy,

a process developed by the Armour Research Foundation, is expected to make possible a whole new series of products with diverse applications, including composite materials such as plastics, ceramics and soft metals reinforced by fiber metal networks.
