SF Fans Belittle Willie M.

Pity poor Willie Mays.

He's having a bad year. He's hitting under .300. His home run output is way below par. Even his fielding has been somewhat less than spectacular.

San Francisco fans can't understand all those raves that emanated from the East where Willie Mays was the pride of the Polo Grounds. Last year while Mays

was struggling to reach .350 and hit 30 home runs the finished with .347 and 29 homers. It was a rookie, Orlando Cepeda, who became the darling of the Seals Stadium.

This year Mays continued to be just a mirage, an over-rated player. The real thing, the new darling, has been another Willie—Willie McCovey.

McCovey captured the fancy of the fans by hitting four home runs in his first eight games as a Giant. He won game after game since his elevation from Phoenix of the Pacific Coast League late last month.

McCovey gave the Giants a much-needed shot in the arm with his prodigious hitting. But Willie Mays hasn't been exactly leading either during the past week.

Take last night, for instance. Shut out by Larry Jackson for eight innings, the Giants rallied for three runs in the ninth to defeat the St. Louis Cardinals 3-2. All Mays did was drive in the first Giants run with a single and score the winning run on a double by still another Willie—Willie Kirkland.

The victory, fifth in the last six games, extended the Giants' first place lead over the idle Los Angeles Dodgers to two games. Milwaukee, also idle, fell three games back. No other National League team was scheduled.

Giants 3, Cards 2

It was Mays who either scored or drove in the key run in each of the last five Giants victories. In the only game they've lost since Tuesday, Aug. 4, Mays sat on the bench with an injury.

Here's the rundown:

Aug. 5—San Francisco 4, Milwaukee 1. With the score tied at 1-1 in the eighth, Mays doubled home the winning run. McCovey followed with his second home run.

Aug. 6—San Francisco 7, Milwaukee 1. Mays got three hits including a home run, drove in a run and scored two.

Aug. 7—San Francisco 3, Cincinnati 2. Mays got three hits and singled in the winning run in the ninth after making a spectacular catch of Johnny Temple's bid for a three-bagger. Willie was injured crashing into the fence in making the catch.

Aug. 8—Cincinnati 9, San Francisco 6. The injury kept Mays out of the game.

Aug. 9—San Francisco 4, Cincinnati 3. Orlando Cepeda's 10th inning home run won the game but it was Mays' eighth inning single that made it possible. He scored on an infield out to give the Giants a temporary 3-2 lead.

Aug. 10—Pinch hitter Leon Wagner opened the winning ninth with a single and Jimmy Davenport followed with another single. Mays' hit drove in pinch runner Jose Pagan to cut the Cards' lead to 2-1. McCovey grounded to second and Davenport scored the tying run, beating Don Blasingame's throw to the plate. After Cepeda went out, Kirkland doubled to score Mays with the winning run.

The Cardinals threatened in their half of the ninth. With one out, singles by Gene Oliver and Alex Grammas and a wild pitch by Mike McCormick, third Giant pitcher, put runners on second and third. The young southpaw then fanned Dick Gray and got Ray Jablonski to ground out ending the game.

DUNSMUIR—The Yreka Indians clinched the 1959 Northern California League title here Sunday afternoon with a 10-inning, 5-4 victory over the Dunsmuir Merchants. At Scott Valley, the SV Stars jumped into a second place tie in the final league standings as they clubbed the Weed Sons, 8-5, behind the 11-strikeout pitching of Larry Evans.

The league champions scored the tie-breaking run in the 10th frame as Dave Hitchcock, who had three of the winner's 14 hits, rapped a single to right-center to score Daryl Severns from third base. Severns had gotten aboard via a single and moved around on a sacrifice by Gary Gresham and a walk to Lee Templeton.

Yreka had their bats booming all afternoon as starter Ron Curtis and reliever Al Smith, the victim of the Indians' game-winning rally, were in trouble almost every inning.

Winning pitcher Mike Branham was reached for only four safe-

ties, one a home run by Marv Cartwright.

Scott Valley took an early 3-0 lead, adding four runs in the fifth and one more in the seventh on Don Purdy's solo homer. Evans, while picking up his big strikeout total, walked seven and was reached for 11 Weed hits.

The losing pitcher was Norman Swan, the first of two Weed hurlers. Jim Lemos relieved Swan in the fifth frame, yielding three runs, including two in the ninth when the losers staged a futile rally.

Bob Zalunardo rapped a single, double and a triple in five trips to the plate and teammate Ed Frutza added three singles in four at-bats to lead the Weed crew at the plate. For the winners, Fred Gonzales had two doubles and a single while playing-manager Don Duncan drove in three runs with a pair of one-baggers.

In last week's action Mount Shasta handed Yreka and Branham, the young husky who recently had a tryout with the San Francisco Giants, a 9-1 drubbing while Weed was doing the same to Dunsmuir, 12-1.

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Colavito Clouting Big Item

Rocky Colavito, the guy who must hit if the Indians are to win the American League pennant, is back on the beam and all Cleveland fans are breathing easier today.

In 25 games before Monday night, Colavito managed only 17 hits in 94 times at bat for a .181 average and the Indians dropped

from a first place tie with Chicago to three games in back of the league leading White Sox.

In five times at bat Monday Colavito, hammered a home run, a double and two singles. He drove in two runs and scored twice to take personal charge of the Indians 6-4 victory over Kansas City.

The triumph inched the Indians up to within 2½ games of the idle White Sox.

In the only other league scheduled game, the New York Yankees defeated the Boston Red Sox 7-4 in 10 innings for their fifth straight triumph.

Colavito's clouting moved him nearer to league leader Harmon Killebrew in the battle for the home run and runs batted in titles. Rocky hit his 33rd four-bagger in the fourth inning off loser Rip Coleman for Cleveland's first run. That put him two behind Killebrew. His two runs batted in boosted his total to 85, one under Killebrew's total.

Cal McLish was credited with the victory, his 14th, although he needed help from Jack Harshman in the eighth.

4 Schools Appoint Mentors

County School Superintendent Carrol B. Howe announced Monday that a number of changes in coaching personnel in four county schools had been made.

The schools involved include Henley, Merrill, Malin and Bly.

At Henley Len Weber was named head football and baseball coach. Weber, in the past, has worked in the baseball post, and was assistant football coach under Ted Ammerman. He was named to the two head jobs upon Ammerman's resignation recently.

Ammerman is taking a position at a small unnamed Colorado school.

Other changes at Henley include the appointment of Fred Hess, also an assistant under Ammerman, to the posts of head basketball and track coach.

A tentative selection for the wrestling job is Jerry Johnson, ex-KUHS athlete. The position will be Johnson's first in the coaching field.

At Malin Robert Graham is taking over the slot vacated by George Hanson who has moved into the Tulake system. Graham, who is completing an eight-year tour of duty with the United States Marines, is the former playing coach of the Pearl Harbor Marine football team. Prior to that Graham worked as a wrestling instructor in Missoula, Montana. A captain in the corps, Graham led his service team to titles in 1951-52.

Merrill has hired Al Fairchild, a former Henley football and basketball coach, as the replacement for Al Keck who resigned to accept a position at KUHS. Fairchild coached at St. Anthony, Potlatch, and Emmett, Idaho, prior to coming to Henley where he served from 1953-57.

Robert Kelter moves into the top job at Bly where he takes over for C. A. (Al) Samples who has been named principal at Chiloquin. Kelter comes to Klamath County from Glenham, North Dakota, where he coached and taught from 1957-59.

Steelers To Host Cleveland

The Pittsburgh Steelers, who would rather beat the Cleveland Browns than any other team, play host to the Browns Tuesday night in the first of five exhibition games this week involving National Football League teams.

The College All-Stars, made up of this year's leading NFL draft choices, tangle with the champions Baltimore Colts in Chicago Friday night in the 26th annual All-Star game.

Three night games are carded for Saturday. The New York Giants play the Philadelphia Eagles at Hershey, Pa.; the Detroit Lions play the Chicago Cardinals at Norman, Okla.; and the Green Bay Packers meet the Chicago Bears at Milwaukee.

The Steelers have high hopes this year in the Eastern Division race because they wound up the 1958 season as the hottest team in the NFL. Pittsburgh finally got rolling after obtaining Bobby Layne, winning six of its last seven games. The other wound up in a tie.

Cleveland is coming back from one of its most bitter disappointments. Just when the Browns appeared to have the Eastern title wrapped up, they dropped two in a row to the Giants, the last in a playoff.

The Browns are 16-2 in the league against the Steelers and 3-0 in exhibition play. They shut out the Steelers in their first exhibition game last year, 10-0.

HORSE EDGES "KIN" SARATOGA SPRINGS, N. Y. (UPI)—Weatherwise, a two-year-old son of Tom Fool, won the \$37,350 Sanford Stakes at Saratoga Monday, beating Tompon, another son of Tom Fool, by a neck. Weatherwise paid \$8.00 to win after going six furlongs in 1:12.4-3. It was his second victory in as many starts.

Champ Philosophical, Ready; Challenger Grim, Eyes Title

MONTREAL (AP)—Yvon Durelle vowed today that if he floors Archie Moore first again he's going to finish him off and grab the old master's light heavyweight crown.

"I'll go after him with all I've got," said the fighting fisherman from Baie Anne, N.B. "He won't get off my hook."

The rugged Canadian and British Empire 175-pound ruler gets a second crack at Moore's world title at the forum here Wednesday. He's a 3-1 underdog despite the facts he dumped the American four times, three times in the first round, before being knocked out in the 11th round last Dec. 10.

"I got bad advice from my seconds that night," Yvon said bitterly. "After I had Moore down three times in the first round they told me to box in the second round. Me box? I don't know how to box. I should have gone right after him. I would have had the championship if I did."

The 29-year-old challenger is grim compared to his happy-go-lucky attitude before the first fight. He said his fishing boats have been losing money lately and he's turning over his \$15,000 guarantee for the fight, a puny sum compared to Moore's \$175,000 guarantee.

Just talking about the figures got him so upset Monday that he staged short-lived revolt against signing a return bout contract. This pact calls for each fighter to get 30 per cent of the receipts for another fight if Durelle should beat Moore Wednesday.

After telling newsmen that he would toss the return contract out of the window, he changed his attitude following talks with Manager Chris Shaban and Truman Gibson, president of the National Boxing Enterprises of Chicago. The NBC paid \$100,000 for the U.S. television rights. The fight will be seen on the ABC network starting at 9 p.m. (EST) but will not be shown in Canada and some U.S. border cities.

Both Durelle and Moore wind up their training today with light limbering exercises.

"I weighed 175 (the division limit) Sunday and won't have any trouble with the scales," said the 42-year-old Moore. "I feel real good. It should be a real interesting fight. I hope the difference this time is that I won't get nailed. I don't intend to."

NEW YORK (UPI)—The new head of Rosenzohn Enterprises Inc. wants heavyweight champion Ingemar Johansson to come here "immediately" to complete a deal for a Sept. 22 return bout against Floyd Patterson, but Johansson seems in no rush to accept.

"There is no reason for me to go there," said Johansson at Goteborg, Sweden. "I am the world champion, and they have to come here if they want anything."

Johansson's statement was made Monday just before Vincent Velella, new president of Rosenzohn Enterprises, disclosed he has called the champion an invitation to come here expense-free to "close the deal immediately."

Velella wired Johansson that a decision must be made now concerning "three possible locations, two of which offer large guarantees." Velella told the champion that these "firm cash guarantees" and assurance of large closed circuit television make it certain the bout can be held as originally planned on Sept. 22, but warned that present doubt about Johansson's intentions are "seriously hurting the promotion."

Whether Velella's wire would move Johansson to come here remained to be seen, but the champion was emphatic Monday in stating that he isn't planning a trip now.

Johansson said he was willing to fight Patterson Sept. 22 "if everything is in order," but added that he is "very disappointed over the American conditions."

Fullmer and Carmen Basilio fight Aug. 28 at the Cow Palace for the National Boxing Assn. middleweight title. The NBA took the crown from Sugar Ray Robinson for lack of activity. Both contenders are former champions who lost to Robinson.

Fullmer's manager, Marv Jensen, started the bat routine. He painted a bag with basebats and told his son Ray, 13, to swing away in their West Jordan, Utah, gym. Marv thought it would help the lad learn to keep his eye on the ball.

Then the manager decided it would be good for his fighter. Jensen claims and Fullmer agree that whapping the bat, into the bag strengthens the shoulder muscles, wrists and hands and improves timing.

Forest Grove and Klamath Falls will open the tourney at 7:15 p.m. Thursday while the Dairy Maids and Hillsboro meet at 8:45 p.m.

Games are scheduled for Friday at 1:30, 7:15 and 8:45 p.m. Saturday games will be at 10:30 a.m. and 7:15 and 8:45 p.m. Final games will be Sunday at 1:30 and 7:15 p.m. and at 8:45 p.m. if a third game is necessary to determine the championship.

No advance ticket sale is scheduled. The Memorial Stadium is located about 10 miles north of Medford on the Crater Lake Highway. A large crowd is anticipated for the event, which is expected to be one of the most exciting sports features of the valley this Centennial year.

Anglers Arrested By Police

ASTORIA, Ore. (AP)—Defense attorneys for eight fishermen accused of angling in Oregon waters without Oregon licenses have been ordered to meet with Dist. Atty. T. E. Brownhill to set early trial dates.

Municipal Judge Charles Johnson issued that order Monday after granting a defense request for a postponement of the trials.

Six sports anglers and two commercial fishermen were arrested by Oregon State Police in the weekend crackdown at the mouth of the Columbia River.

Those arrested were Lenta Porter, Portland; Norman Tidd, Longview, Wash.; Joe Harper, E. W. Pourier and Victor Ingle, all Kelso, Wash.; Jack Nelson, Washougal, Wash.; and Walter Kramer and LeRoy Bobst, both Vancouver, Wash.

Astoria Mayor Harry Steibeck called Gov. Mark Hatfield Monday after a group on the Washington side of the river threatened to boycott Astoria businesses.

The mayor said Hatfield told him the law would have to be enforced, and state policemen said they will continue to patrol the area and arrest fishermen violating the law.

One target will be boats which carry Oregon fishermen but operate with a Washington state charter.
