PORTLAND (AP) — Grandmother Gatewood, who took several pokes at photographers along her 2,100-mile walk from Independence, Mo. to the Oregon Centennial Exposition, would like some pictures now.

Aged Woman Loses Leg

DURHAM, N.C. (AP)—A Negro woman, born into slavery on a South Carolina plantation before the Civil War, had a foot amputated at a hospital here Monday.

She is Maggie Wilson Sams of Hoffman. Her age is guessed at between 115 and 118.

Mrs. Sams doesn't hear well but is still mentally alert, and talked to newsmen before and after the operation. She told of Civil War days, but said she saw no fighting.

She's still active too. She said she hoed cotton shortly before a traffic accident which caused the foot to become infected.

Idaho Cowboy Garners Honors

Bob A. Robinson, a cowboy from Rockland, Idaho, won all-around cowboy honors at the Prineville Rodeo over the weekend, and the first round of the Big Triangle Trophy contest.

The award was presented by Charley Read of Klamath Falls. Robinson will have his name inscribed on the cup. His will be the first, since the trophy made its debut this year.

If he wins the trophy three times, he will receive a big cash award. Each of the Big Triangle rodeo associations, Prineville, Klamath Falls and Eugene, adds \$100 to the purse each year.

Passenger Service Drops, Reports Commerce Survey

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The nation's railroads are dropping unprofitable passenger trains as fast as they can.

An Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC) survey showed today that the railroads have discontinued 41 passenger trains since an administrative short cut was approved by Congress one year ago.

In addition, the lines have started proceedings to eliminate 60 more interstate passenger runs and 40 interstate trains.

The ICC also gave railroads permission to abandon 4,664 miles of track from 1954 to the start of this year.

The trend appeared to bear out a warning by ICC examiner Howard Hosmer that inter-city passenger train service would be dead by 1970 if railroads continued their current practices.

The flood of discontinued trains followed approval of the 1958 Transportation Act which eliminated the previous regulatory red tape surrounding route abandonments.

Under the act, a railroad must give 30-days notice of plans to abandon passenger trains. The ICC then has 20 days to block the proposal by suspending the discontinuance for four months pending an investigation.

Previously, proposals to abandon passenger train service were handled by less sympathetic state regulatory commissions. Now, if a state commission fails to act or denies a discontinuance, the railroad is free to petition the ICC.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Extension of air service from Boise, Idaho and Salt Lake City to Las Vegas, Nev. was sought by West Coast Airlines in a route application filed with the Civil Aeronautics Board Monday.

The company seeks permission for flights from Boise via Elko and Ely, Nev. to Las Vegas and from Salt Lake via Provo, Utah and Ely to the resort city. The flights would provide the first direct service from Inland Empire cities to Las Vegas. Daily round-trip schedules are planned with 40-passenger F27 propjet transports.
