Stocks WALL STREET NEW YORK (AP) - The stock market took its worst loss of the year today and closed with prices above their lows. The ticker tape was lit. Industrials were particularly hard hit while rails and utilities had more limited losses. Space age issues declined sharply. Volume for the day was estimated at 4,800,000 shares compared with 4,500,000 Friday. Most key stocks fell from fractions to 1 or 2 points with high-priced Du Pont down more than 11. Electronics and other speculative issues which have had big gains this year were down from 4 to around 10 points. The market was down badly from the start as sell orders piled up in the wake of Wall Street advisories to the effect that a "correction" was due. The business and economic news was routine. Reynolds Metals was down more than 10 points in late trading and Texas Instruments more than 8. Zenith, Motorola and Litan Industries dropped more than 7 apiece. Polaroid was down 5. Losses of about 4 were taken by Thinkal, Youngstown Sheet, Armco Steel, General Tire and Good-year.

State VFW Leader Dies

Wife's Death Said Accident

SAN RAFAEL (UPI) - Robert Rogers, 37, charged with the murder of his attractive 35-year-old wife, has admitted the slaying but claims it was an accident. The San Gabriel contractor surrendered to San Rafael police Monday, accompanied by his lawyer, Charles Holloper, Pasadena. The body of Mrs. Rogers was found by police Sunday night at the home of her mother here. The body was in an "execution position" - kneeling, as though she had been forced to kneel or fell to her knees. She was shot through the back of the head. Rogers claimed he accidentally shot her as she advanced toward him during a heated argument over another man Friday night. He admitted loading a .30-30 Winchester rifle and threatening her. Rogers' attorney claimed there was no premeditation. Mrs. Rogers came here to care for the home of her mother, who had been hospitalized. Her husband came Thursday from San Gabriel with her 4-year-old and 10-year-old sons and 17-year-old daughter. Police said they were called to break up a quarrel between Rogers and his wife during the same morning of the day she was shot. Rogers told police she wanted to leave him and the children for another man.

Death Date Set For Chessman

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Caryl Chessman, still dodger of San Quentin prison's gas chamber, is sentenced to die Oct. 21. His attorneys plan another appeal because the convict-author wasn't present when Superior Judge Herbert V. Walker set the death date Monday. Chessman had written from San Quentin's death row that he wanted to be present to challenge the court's jurisdiction. Chessman's legal maneuvering has delayed his execution 11 years. He was convicted in 1948 of a series of robberies, kidnappings and sex crimes. Dr. Paul D. White, famous heart specialist, says that most patients have but one attack and then live for years.

Cons Capture Ends Manhunt

SAN DIEGO (UPI) - Police Monday recaptured an escaped San Quentin convict after one of the largest manhunts in San Diego history. Charles Stephen Dickens, 31, recently escaped from a firefighting crew in the Yosemite area. He was discovered concealed in brush under a tree in a brickyard in Mission Valley here. Police said he admitted holding up a National City market, stealing two cars and firing at pursuers in two high-speed chases. The night of search began when police saw a stolen Cadillac after the market robbery. The police patrol unit moved up behind Dickens' car on U.S. 95 and was fired on by the convict who leaned a rifle over the back seat and fired through the rear window. Dickens lost the police, abandoned the car and stole another. The chase and shooting continued until the convict left the second car and took to the brushy, reedy floor of the Mission Valley river bottom. Seventy officers, some carrying submachine guns, centered the search in that area, with house to house searches and helicopters standing from above. Dickens told officers he got the rifle in a burglary in Northern California. He had been sentenced to San Quentin for armed robbery in the Bay Area, Dickens said.

Opposition To Dictators May Be Told By Herter

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) - Secretary of State Christian A. Herter, flying here today for the Inter-American Conference of Foreign Ministers, was reported considering making a strong declaration of U.S. opposition to dictatorships. Herter was due late this afternoon in the Chilean capital after a night's stopover in Puerto Rico. Leaving Washington, he said the conference should take a candid look at troubles plaguing the Caribbean area and adopt measures to deal with them. Puerto Rico's Gov. Luis Munoz Marin, who talked with Herter in Washington Sunday, said the secretary likely would make clear that the United States does not coddle dictators. Numerous Latin Americans have accused the United States of showing open favoritism to such dictators as former President Fulgencio Batista of Cuba, Marcos Perez Jimenez of Venezuela, now an exile in Florida, the Dominican Republic's Rafael Trujillo and Nicaragua's Luis Somoza. Presumably any U.S. declaration will be worded in general terms with no names called. Both Trujillo and Somoza are still in office, and any direct attack on them would bring accusations of U.S. interference in domestic affairs of other nations, as well as unperilous relations between Washington and the Dominican and Nicaraguan governments. One potential source of fireworks at the conference was removed Monday night. Cuba's ambassador announced that Prime Minister Fidel Castro would not attend. Apparently Castro is too busy at home, where his government claims it has just smashed a major plot by counter-revolutionaries. The meeting was called after a series of invasions by political exiles trying to overthrow the Trujillo and Somoza regimes and the Panamanian government. Herter, first U.S. secretary of state ever to visit Chile, was expected to swing soon after his arrival into private talks with various foreign ministers on the pre-

Cop Killer Charges Filed

SAN MATEO (UPI) - Alexander Robillard, 19, has been formally charged with the murder of a Hillsborough police officer who stopped a car on the automobile's license plates. Robillard, captured in a Salt Lake City hotel Saturday, appeared pale and trembling Monday when the murder complaint was read in Municipal Court. Officers said he was "near a complete breakdown." The stolen plates which led to the death of patrolman Eugene Doran were found by a skin diver off Pier 36 on the San Francisco waterfront Monday. Robillard, who originally told police he threw the plates off Pier 40, was taken to the waterfront after his court appearance. "I was mistaken," he said. "It was Pier 36." The plates were recovered 36 minutes later. Robillard admitted driving the car Doran stopped, but said he took no part in the shooting. His mother, Mrs. Mary Robillard, said after the arraignment that she was going back to her home in Redding to "get my boy an attorney."

Toll Takers Took Fortune, Police Find

ROCK ISLAND, Ill. (AP) - Operators of the Centennial Bridge over the Mississippi River between Rock Island and Davenport, Iowa, have suspended all 13 toll collectors, after disclosing a shortage in toll funds up to \$750,000. Acting on information supplied by state authorities and the FBI, the bridge commission Sunday suspended the collectors. City policemen took over their jobs in the emergency. Bernard J. Moran, Rock Island County state's attorney, said a wholesale frothing of tolls probably started soon after the bridge, owned by the city, was opened in 1940. The bridge is used by an average of 10,000 autos and 2,000 trucks daily. Davenport's population is 51,000; Rock Island's about 50,000 and nearby Moline, Ill., 41,000. The commission decided Sunday, at a hastily called meeting, to install automatic toll-collecting equipment on the bridge immediately. Franklin Wingard of Rock Island, chairman of the commission, said thefts were made possible by defective design of a treadle system which automatically counted vehicles passing over the bridge and helped compute what each owed. Moran said the treadle would be turned off at certain periods, and collectors would pocket the coins taken in during those times. Last April 20, a toll collector refused to participate in the scheme and told Moran about it. The informer said the daily loot ran from \$7.50 to \$40 a day. Moran said the toll collector then pretended to engage in the looking and turned over his daily take to Moran. Fifteen FBI agents moved in on May 25. They set up headquarters in a hotel at the foot of the bridge on the Iowa side and used electric equipment to count the vehicles crossing the bridge. Two other methods of theft were used, he said. Many bridge crossings in which auto tolls were collected were entered as free passages by police and other public officials for which 60 passes were outstanding. The third gimmick was recording a passenger car-and-trailer toll after collecting the higher three-axle rate fixed for commercial truck-trailer rigs. Tolls on the bridge are 10 cents for an auto; 15 cents for a car pulling a one-axle trailer; 35 cents for a commercial and semitrailer; 25 cents for two-axle truck, and up to 60 cents for four- and five-axle truck-trailer combinations. Thus trucks counted as passenger cars netted 15 cents for the dishonest collector; five-axle truck rigs counted as two cars and one trailer netted 35 cents.
