**Son Of Wall Street Broker Indicted On Murder Count**

WHITE PLAINS, N.Y. (AP)—The 20-year-old son of a Wall Street broker has been indicted on a first degree murder charge for killing a boy bicyclist with a small truck while trying to scare him. Conviction could mean death in the electric chair for Jonathan McJain Young of Bedford Village, N. Y., a son of John Young. The youth was indicted Tuesday under a rarely-used section of the New York Penal Code.

Young told police he was driving his pickup truck July 1 when he saw two boys on bicycles ahead of him. He said he headed his truck at them "just to scare them and not to hurt them, but I misjudged the distance."

The two boys were on a camping trip. They were 13-year-old Richard Sullivan and 15-year-old Michael Dill, both of Mount Vernon, N. Y. Dill suffered a brain concussion and has recovered. Young Sullivan died on the way to a hospital. The accident took place on Route 22 in Bedford Village, a New York City suburb.

Dist. Atty. Joseph F. Gagliardi of Westchester County said Young did not stop but drove on after the accident. Later he returned to the scene and questioned officers. Still later in the day he walked into the Bedford Village police station and questioned officers there about the accident. When they questioned him he admitted he was the truck driver.

Gagliardi said the murder charge was based on a part of the state law which allows it as a result of "an act imminently dangerous to others and evincing a depraved mind regardless of human life although without a pre-meditated design to effect the death of any individual."

Young is now in Grasslands Hospital, Valhalla, N. Y., for observation and determination of his sanity.

**Group Hits Volume Cut**

NEWARK, N.J. (AP)—Like whisky and wine, you don't often find a school board, a church group and tavern owners mixed together.

But the New Jersey Council of Churches, the Teaneck School Board and the State United Tavern Owners Assn. all said Tuesday they are opposed to reducing the minimum size of liquor bottles.

The Alcoholic Beverage Control Board is hearing a proposal to reduce the minimum from 12.8 ounces to 8 ounces for distilled spirits.

The tavern owners claimed smaller bottles would mean more home drinking and less bar business. The school board and the church council said smaller bottles would encourage drinking and would be easier for teenagers to obtain.

**Woman Knifed By Attacker**

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Mary Gonzales had saved \$200 to pay for the birth of her ninth child. Tuesday she almost lost her life protecting it.

Mrs. Gonzales, 40, is in General Hospital with knife slashes across her chest and stomach.

She told police that a man disguised as a woman beggar came to her home, forced his way in and demanded that she open a suitcase in which the money was hidden. When she said she didn't have the key, he attacked her. She screamed and he fled.
