Challenger Figures Rematch To Be Short

MONTREAL (AP) — Light Heavyweight Champion Archie Moore and challenger Yvon Durelle of Canada clash tonight at the Forum in a return title bout scheduled for 15 rounds that probably won't go more than 10.

"It won't go as long as the first one," said Durelle, the Canadian and British Empire champion. "He goes down or I go down. And I won't be hard to find. I'm coming right after him. If I get him on the floor first again, I'm going to give it all I've got. This time it's do or die."

The 29-year-old fighting fisherman from Baie Ste. Anne, N.B., realizes he blew the opportunity of a lifetime in his losing fight with Moore last Dec. 10. Yvon had the old gladiator down three times in the first round and once in the fifth before he was stowed away in the 11th round himself.

"He won't if I can help it," said Moore, the 42-year-old champion from San Diego. "I got hit by a sucker punch (a right hand lead to the jaw in the first round) and it's not going to happen again. He's tough and strong and I know what I have to face."

The odds favor Moore at 3-1. That's the same price as for their thrilling, eight-knockdown first fight.

On the basis of that contest, Durelle's hopes appear to rest again on catching Archie cold. One punch—like in the Ingemar Johansson-Floyd Patterson heavyweight title upset—could determine the issue, Yvon has to land that big right.

The pick here is Archie within 10 rounds.

Moore can do anything Yvon can do and lots more. And he showed in the first bout that he had the better chin and stronger heart. Of course at the ripe old age of 42 plus, Archie can come apart at the seams any moment.

Moore is getting a \$175,000 guarantee for his eighth defense of the 175-pound crown he won from Joey Maxim nearly seven years ago. Durelle will receive \$15,000 plus \$5,000 for extra expenses in this twice-postponed scrap.

The bout will be telecast over the ABC network in the United States, starting at 9 p.m. (EST). It will not be telecast in Canada. There will be a radio broadcast to Canada's maritime provinces. The \$100,000 TV fee will pay the fat part of Moore's guarantee.

Promoter Eddie Quinn hoped that a last day sale will lure 15,000 fans and \$250,000 through the turnstiles. More realistic figures probably would be 12,000 and \$160,000.

All-Star '11' 3 Touchdown Underdog

CHICAGO (AP)—Get ready, set and throw. That's the pattern the College All-Stars will employ against the Baltimore Colts Friday night in Soldier Field.

If it is successful, the collegians could upset the champions of the National Football League. But the oddsmakers call Baltimore a two-to-three touchdown favorite.

Only one thing is certain. The All-Stars will not gain yardage by trying to run the ends or through the line.

Last year, the Stars defeated Detroit, 35-19. Yet, they netted an unbelievable three yards rushing. But their passing, with Jim Ninowski throwing and Bobby Mitchell on the receiving end, clicked and that was the story.

Head coach Otto Graham who mastered the victory over the Lions, has not revealed who he'll start at quarterback. He has some dandies from which to choose.

In a scrimmage last week, the Stars defeated the Chicago Bears, 7-6. Grosscup engineered the touchdown drive and topped it off with a 33-yard pass to Buddy Dial of Rice. Lee kept the 99-yard march alive with several key completions.

And the Bears, like the Colts, are no slouches on defense.

But aside from defense, Baltimore has speed, size and power plus the wonderful passing of Johnny Unitas. The Colts could become one of the greatest pro teams ever assembled.

Pittsburgh Steelers Open Year With 34-20 Defeat Of Browns

The Pittsburgh Steelers, packing a goal-line punch, are set to renew the 1958 surge that made them the hottest team in the National Football League at the tail-end of the season.

Pittsburgh opened its exhibition swing Tuesday night by scoring four touchdowns from inside the 10-yard line, two with less than two minutes remaining, to defeat the Cleveland Browns, 34-20.

The Steelers, undefeated in their final seven games last season, broke the game apart when halfback Ray Mathews cut over from right guard from the eight-yard line to put Pittsburgh in front, 27-20. With six seconds to go, linebacker Vic Lasse intercepted Kim Ninowski's pass and ran to the one, where rookie halfback Jim Smith scored.

Jim Krutko, former West Virginia star, went over from the two in the first period to open the scoring. Cleveland tied it at 7-7 on Jimmy Brown's 74-yard run and went ahead, 10-7, on a 37-yard field goal by Lou Groza.

Bobby Layne culminated a 75-yard march with a touchdown sneak from the one-yard line to make it 14-10 at the half, but Brown sent Cleveland ahead again with a seven-yard plunge in the third period. Tom Miner found the range with a 23-yard field goal to tie the game and put Pittsburgh ahead 20-17 with one from the 14 at the start of the final period.

Groza retaliated with a 21-yard boot which set the stage for Ma-

thews' game winning score and coach Buddy Parker's first victory over Cleveland as a Steeler coach.

The game was the first of five exhibitions to be played this week. The Baltimore Colts meet the College All-Stars Friday night while three Saturday night clashes find the New York Giants playing the Philadelphia Eagles at Hershey, Pa., the Detroit Lions meeting the Chicago Cardinals at Norman, Okla., and the Green Bay Packers playing the Chicago Bears at Milwaukee.

Stadium Prepared For WS

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The Giants are in first place in the National League, but don't ask about World Series seats in their unfinished Candlestick Stadium.

Although they hope to play the World Series there, it's anybody's guess as to seating capacity.

Charley Harney, the builder, promises:

34,200 seats.

Possibly 4,300 more.

A slight possibility of 1,500 more.

And, if somebody wants to put 'em up, emergency bleachers to seat up to 15,000.

A potential total of 55,000 if every possibility materializes.

Harney, feuding with city officials and architect John Bolles, says he's not about to finance any additional bleachers.

Harney reiterated today what he insisted Tuesday:

The stadium, though not finished, will be available for the World Series. The classic opens Sept. 30 in the American League city for two games. If the Giants win the NL bunting, San Francisco would host the Series games of Oct. 2 and 3 and if needed Oct. 4.

Only three of four ramps leading into the pear-shaped stadium will be finished and the upper deck in left field won't be in.

But the playing field is in good condition.
