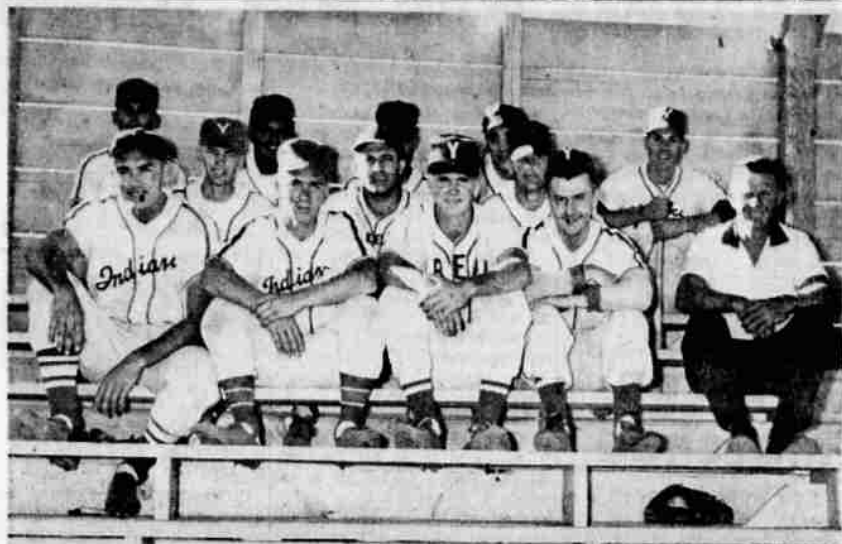

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The comedy of Candlestick Cove, new home-to-be of the San Francisco Giants, is getting a lot of laughs these days.

From everybody that is, except Horace Stoneham, who should cash in on a World Series — but could end up being lucky to break even.

Horace, being a true sportsman, wants to win the pennant this year with his Giants, even if it doesn't make any money, it says here.

"We just want the park completed so that more fans can get a chance to see the series," says Horace.

Well, the Giants aren't "in" yet as the National League champions, but a lot of worrying is being done about the new stadium.

CAPACITY LESSENED

As things stand now, Candlestick Park will seat about 34,000 for a World Series game. When completely finished, it could seat 42,500. But there's no chance for that, despite the fact that there was some talk when the Giants first moved here that the park would be ready for the start of the 1959 campaign.

That was before politics entered the case.

Among the problems to be ironed out before World Series time (if the Giants should happen to win) are:

—Who is going to build the screen (for \$45,000) behind home plate?

—This little item has been left out of the appropriations.

—Who is going to pay for putting in the foul lines (This costs money)?

—Who is going to put the numbers on the seats? "Not me," says Horace. "It's not my job."

"If the stadium is finished in all respects, you will get your release," said Harrington. "If you don't perform, you will not get a release."

"You'll get no ball park," shot back Harney.

Meanwhile, the American League teams are rooting for the Los Angeles Dodgers to win — so they can pack that 100,000 seat Los Angeles Coliseum.

The announcement that Musial would see only occasional pinch-hitting duty or perhaps get a starting assignment now and then came just before Thursday night's game with Los Angeles.

Redbird General Manager Bing Devine told reporters: "In an effort to use more of our younger players, Musial will not see much action for the remainder of the season."

Musial and Devine said the benching many believe may presage the end of one of baseball's most brilliant careers was "a mutual agreement."

It also was a tacit admission by the Cardinals that the club is going nowhere this year and now is as good a time as any to get a line on their young ballplayers.

"Stan can play as long as he can or wants to," Devine said. "Right now, though, 1960 is the year in question. He'll be back next season no matter what his batting average is this year."

Only two have done it and they rank among the three or four greatest pitchers even in baseball. Cy Young won 20 when he was 41 and Grover Alexander won 21 at 40.

Wynn won his 16th Thursday night in pitching the league-leading Chicago White Sox to a 9-0 victory over Detroit. He not only is the biggest winner in the league but he leads with five shutouts.
