Labor Bills Compared

WASHINGTON (AP) — Here's how the Senate's Kennedy-Ervin labor bill and the House's Landrum-Griffin measure compare on eight main provisions:

UNION MEMBER RIGHTS Both bills guarantee freedom of speech and assembly; protection against arbitrary dues, initiation fees and assessments; equal rights for all members, the right to sue a union or its officers for violation of rights, and safeguards against improper disciplinary action.

The Senate bill would punish infringement of those rights by up to two years in prison and \$10,000 fine. As amended Thursday, the Landrum-Griffin bill would scale that to a maximum of a year in jail and a \$1,000 fine.

REPORTING FINANCES Labor organizations and employers would be required to report periodically to the secretary of labor on their finances, the finances of union officials and their families, payments made by and to employers and labor consultants, loans by unions, and related financial dealings involving conflicts of interest.

The Senate bill would authorize the secretary of labor to exempt from reporting unions having fewer than 200 members and gross receipts of less than \$20,000 a year. The Landrum-Griffin bill allows no exemption.

UNION ELECTIONS Differing somewhat in detail, both bills would require all unions to hold elections within specific periods by secret ballot, would bar union funds from being used to promote the candidacy of any person, would set up regulations governing availability of union men-

bership lists to union candidates, would provide for removal of union officers guilty of misconduct, bar criminals and Communists from office, and prescribe procedures for obtaining new elections in event of irregularities.

FIDUCIARY RESPONSIBILITY Both bills would make it a crime punishable by imprisonment or fine for any union official to embezzle or illegally convert union funds. Both would require union officials to be bonded.

"NO MAN'S LAND" CASES These are labor disputes the National Labor Relations Board refuses to handle and which the states are barred from handling. Both the Senate and Landrum-Griffin bills would authorize the states or their agencies to handle disputes, essentially local in character, over which the NLRB declines jurisdiction.

HOT CARGO AGREEMENTS These are clauses in labor contracts binding carriers in advance not to handle the products of an employer engaged in a labor dispute.

The Senate bill would ban some forms of hot cargo agreements, under the Interstate Commerce Act. This would apply generally to truckers. The Landrum-Griffin bill would outlaw all forms of hot cargo agreements.

SECONDARY BOYCOTTS The Senate bill deals with secondary boycotts only as they involve hot cargo agreements. The Landrum-Griffin bill would ban all forms of secondary boycotts—those aimed at a firm not directly involved in a labor dispute.

RICKETING Both bills would ban extortion or "shakedown" picketing.

They deal differently with picketing used by some unions to force recognition from an employer.

The Senate bill would prohibit such picketing where (1) an employer already has recognized another union and the NLRB bans a new union from challenging the recognized union, or (2) an election has been held within the preceding nine months and the union has been rejected by the employer.

The Landrum-Griffin bill would prohibit such picketing where (1) a valid election has been held within the preceding 12 months, (2) another union has been recognized, and (3) the picketing union cannot show it speaks for enough employees to warrant an election.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Nora T. Foley, 47, alleges she suffered back injuries when she fell out of a full-sized bed in her apartment. She is suing her former landlord, A. Hartford, for \$10,000, charging he was negligent in putting a three-quarter mattress on the bed.

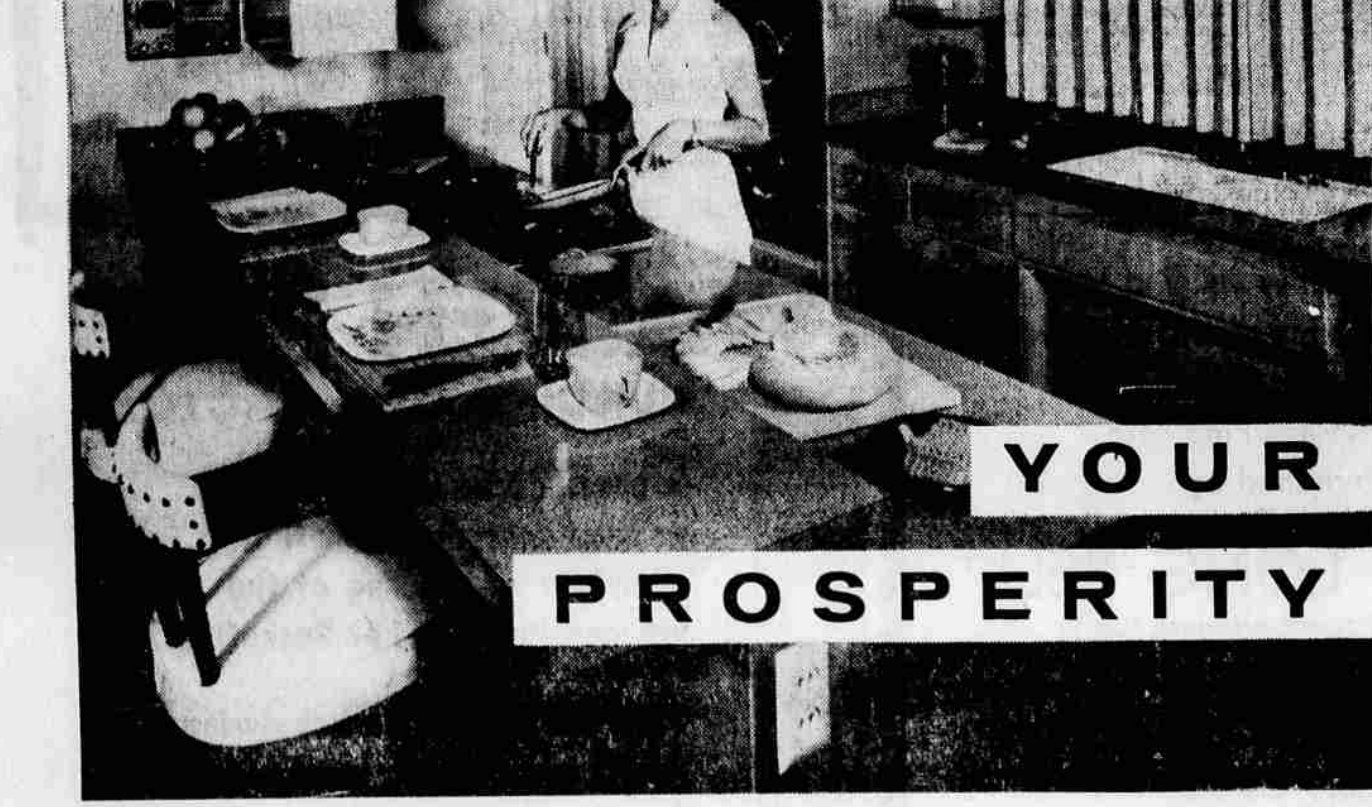
Troops Avert New Invasion

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica (AP) — Costa Rican troops spread out along their country's northwestern frontier to prevent another invasion of Nicaragua by opponents of President Luis Somoza.

Reinforcements were sent to Tortuguero region Thursday night after newspapers reported that National Assembly Deputies Frank Marshall and Mariano Aguflux had tried to buy two fighter

planes in Cuba to lead the invasion. The two men have been mentioned as leaders of past attempts to invade Nicaragua from Costa Rica.

The civil guard, which includes both army and police in Costa Rica, said its forces in the Guana-caste region had encountered rebel groups trying to cross into Nicaragua. The guard said 10 men were captured without resistance.



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
