Man Chases Stubborn Car

SHELTON, Conn. (AP) — Everything was fine on Tuxedo Avenue Thursday until a car went by.

Got Thrill From Killing, Ex-Felon Tells Police

ISLIP, N. Y. (AP) — A husky former convict who told police he derived pleasure from killing was held today in three brutal robbery-slayings in which he got about \$400.

"If I had had more bullets I would have shot more people," 27-year-old Francis H. Bloeth was quoted as saying.

Bloeth has a psychiatric record dating back to early childhood.

He loved to strangle cats even as a child, it was said.

The director of a correctional institution for youngsters, in which Bloeth once had been confined, said: "It was impossible to do anything with him. He once told us 'I get a thrill out of killing. I love to strangle.'"

Suffolk County Dist. Atty. John P. Cobalan said Bloeth nonchalantly admitted gunning down three persons within eight days in this Long Island area.

Bloeth's attorney, Sidney R. Siben, said his client had shown no remorse in admitting the killings.

Siben said Bloeth told him he threw the murder weapons — a .32-caliber revolver and a .32-caliber automatic — into Lake Ronkonkoma and into a ditch alongside a

county road. Cobalan ordered an immediate search for the weapons.

Ballistics tests show two of the killings were committed with a revolver and the other with an automatic.

Robert Walsh, 21, an ex-convict pal, put the finger on Bloeth early this week. Walsh said he sold the revolver to Bloeth six months ago and the automatic to him only four hours before the third slaying — that of Mrs. Irene Currier, 50, of West Yaphank, slain Aug. 8 in a diner she operated at Westhampton.

Bloeth had steadfastly denied the slayings. Both Bloeth and Walsh took lie detector tests, but the results were not announced.

In all three slayings the victims were alone late at night. The first murder occurred July 31 with the shooting of Islip grocer Hans Hachman, 54. The other victim was counterwoman Lawrence Kirchner, 53, slain Aug. 5 in a Smithtown diner.

The holdup killings netted less than \$400. Bloeth had been picked up and held without bail on charges of robbing a tavern of \$60 July 22 — a crime not connected with the slayings.

Walsh, who has served time for burglary and an attack on a policeman, was charged with violation of the Sullivan (antiweapons) law after admitting having owned the two guns used in the murders. Authorities said Bloeth's confes-

sion first was gained from him by his wife Jane, mother of their 7-month-old daughter.

Bloeth has been described as a psychopath who strangled cats and loved to tell lies. He was an inmate in the State Training School for Boys in Warwick, N.Y., from November 1946 to May 1947.

A. Alired Cohen, director of the school, said of Bloeth: "It was impossible to do anything with him. He once told us 'I get a thrill out of killing. I love to strangle.'"

Cohen said Bloeth escaped twice from the institution, and before being returned, burglarized restaurants.

Bloeth's wife and his mother

Mrs. Mary Bloeth has said that Bloeth suffered head injuries from a fall during boyhood and that he frequently blacked out.
