SF, Bums Both Win; Indians Sinking Fast

CHICAGO (AP) — Right-hander Jack Sanford and the League-leading San Francisco Giants halted the Chicago Cubs 6-4 Saturday in a game called after 7½ innings because of rain.

A violent rain and thunderstorm sent a crowd of 24,070 scurrying for shelter as the Cubs came up to bat in the home half of the eighth.

Sanford, who yielded only three hits, was helped by solo homers by Willie Mays, Daryl Spencer and Willie McCovey. Two other San Francisco runs resulted from one of three errors committed by the Cubs.

Sanford upped his record to 12-9 but was in trouble most of the way because of wildness. He hit one batter and walked six. He also struck out seven, many of which came when needed. The loss snapped Chicago's four-game winning streak.

The Giants took a 1-0 lead in the first on a walk and singles by Mays and Orlando Cepeda. The Cubs tied it in their half of the inning on a walk, a hit batsman and a single by Dale Long.

The hit batsman was Cub shortstop Ernie Banks who was forced to retire from the game in the seventh when his right shoulder siffened up as a result of being hit.

CHICAGO (AP) — "I sure picked a heck of a time to get knocked out the first time in my football career."

That's what halfback Don Brown of Houston told The Associated Press Saturday at a hospital where he is recovering from an injury which jolted fans and players alike in Friday night's 29-0 All-Star loss to the Baltimore Colts.

Brown was unconscious for 15 minutes after being hit in the face in a first-quarter play. He swallowed his tongue. Head All-Star Coach Otto Graham said Brown "actually died on the field and stopped breathing."

The Houston player, tabbed to play pro ball with the Chicago Cardinals, was pronounced in good condition Saturday. Dr. William Rothman, chief physician for the Chicago Tribune Golden Gloves, said Brown had a slight concussion but probably would be released from the hospital Sunday.
