As to your hair, brush it vigorously each day to increase its luster and vitality, and shampoo it whenever it seems to need it. Frequent shampooing will not hurt your hair.

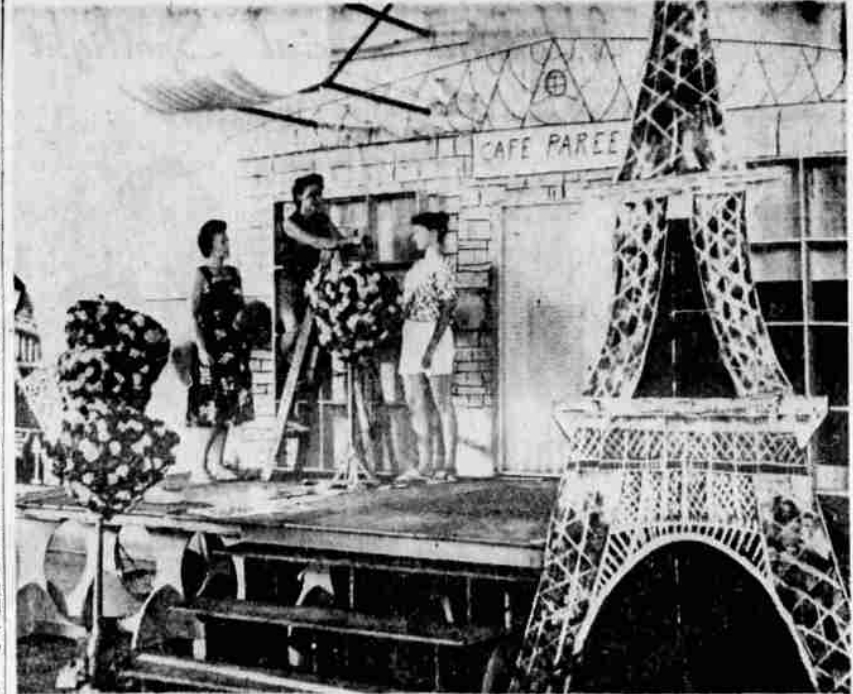

Stamps In The News

A special set of stamps honoring the 1959 New Year Festival will be issued in September by Israel. The Festival is part of the High Holy Days observed by Jewry throughout the world.

Three of the main agricultural products of Israel — pomegranates, olives and dates — are featured on the set.

The 60-pruta purple and red depicts the pomegranate, the 200-pruta green the olives and the 350-pruta brown and orange illustrates the dates.

The three values described combined with last year's four Festival stamps complete the showing of all seven agricultural products mentioned in Deut. 8:8. The first Festival stamps were issued in 1948.

Iceland has issued two new air-mail stamps to commemorate the 40th anniversary of flight in that country. The 3.50-kr blue shows the first Icelandic plane and a new model transport. The 4.05-kr

red also depicts an old and a new plane. The dates 1919-1959 appear on each stamp.

Here's an indication of a United States stamp spiral. There were 225,869 first day covers cancelled on June 6 when the 12-cent Benjamin Harrison regular postage stamp was first placed on sale at Oxford, Ohio. This is almost a 400 per cent increase over the 225,869 first day covers canceled Sept. 14, 1938, when the 12-cent Presidential regular postage stamp was first issued.

Word from Czechoslovakia has it that six new stamps have been issued to commemorate the anniversaries of outstanding ancient Czech cultural personalities. Honored are Frantisek Benda composer; Vaclav Klicperka, founder of the Czech drama; Aurel Stodola, technician; Karol Vaclav Rais, author; and Antonin Slavicek, painter. Also honored are Petr Bezruc, Dr. Max Svabinsky and Karol Svobinsky.
