WEED—A June wedding was recently solemnized in the Weed Community Presbyterian Church uniting Linda Mooney and Lt. James G. Adams. The bride is the daughter of Mrs. Paul Painter and the bridegroom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Elwin G. Adams.

White candelabras flanked the altar which was banked with tall baskets of white gladioli and stock. The white tapers were lighted for the early afternoon ceremony by Lani Gaynor and Mrs. J. F. Harris Jr.

The Rev. Harold Foster of the Weed church performed the double ring ceremony in the presence of nearly 300 guests who during the ceremony repeated the Lord's Prayer in unison.

Traditional wedding music was played by Mrs. William Davis, organist, who also accompanied Mrs. Edwin Hickey who sang "Oh Perfect Love" and "I Love Thee."

White satin bows tied fern sprays at each pew and lined the white carpeted aisle down which the bride was escorted and given in marriage by her stepfather, Paul Painter. Her bridal gown was of chamilly lace, fashioned with a fitted bodice, vee neckline and long sleeves that tapered at the wrists.

The full skirt was accented with tiers of lace ruffles in the back panel that graduated into a chapel train. A scalloped coronet of pearls and crystal teardrops held her fingertip illusion net veil. Two phalaenopsis orchids centered her circular bouquet of stephanotis. She carried a century old white lace and linen handkerchief, a keepsake of her family.

For travel, the new Mrs. Adams wore a pink morning glory print ensemble with red slippers and a red straw hat. The orchid from her bouquet was her corsage. The bridegroom was presented a lei of feathered carnations, a gift flown in from Hawaii from one of his trainees at Fort Ord, to be worn on his wedding trip as is the Hawaiian custom.

FORT BIDWELL—The little rural Church at Fort Bidwell was the appropriate setting for the wedding of Jane Ann Bucher and Nurlie Allen Jamar of Alturas. The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Reuel Alvin Bucher, members of pioneer families. The wedding was the first in 61 years to be held in the attractive church built by early settlers of the community.

Green draperies hung at the back of the chancel made an effective background for the golden cross and large baskets of white chrysanthemums, flanked by candelabra holding white tapers. Fan shaped plaques of greenery, tied with white bows, decorated the window embrasures.

Pastor Nathaniel Meserve performed the double ring ceremony after which the couple knelt on a white satin pillow to receive Holy Communion.

The bridegroom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Allen Jamar of Alturas.

The wedding party came down the aisle which was covered with a white runner and marked at each pew with a single candle tied with a white satin bow.
