## Salem '9' Captures Tourney

MEDFORD, Ore. (AP)—Marge Hurley pitched and batted the Salem Shamrocks to an uphill, come-from-behind climb Sunday in the Oregon Southall Area women's tournament championship at nearby Camp White.

The Shamrocks, starting in the loser's bracket in the afternoon, won three straight games.

The Salem team, which had been dropped into the loser's bracket early in the tournament by Eugene, gained revenge by beating Eugene 1-0 and knocking them out of the double-elimination tourney.

Then the Shamrocks twice blanked the previously unbeaten Forest Grove Meadowlarks 2-0 and 1-0 in evening games.

Hurley pitched the distance in all three games. She yielded only two hits in each game and one run for all three, hurling shutouts in two of them.

In the final game against Forest Grove, Jape Lowell reached first on a bunt, advanced on a single by Dolores Hanson and came on home when the shortstop bobbled Hurley's grounder.

## Arizonan Captures Golf Title

PORTLAND (AP)—Dr. Ed Updegraff of Tucson, Ariz., captured his second Western Amateur golf championship Sunday with a sensational series of iron shots, defeating young Chuck Hunter Jr. of Tacoma, Wash., 7 and 5.

Updegraff, who first won the title at St. Louis, Mo., in 1957, repeatedly sent iron shots winging within inches of the cup and cut nine strokes off par as he downed the 20-year-old University of Oregon contender.

The spare 6-foot doctor clinched it with a 220-yard fairway shot that stopped 8 inches from the pin for an eagle that gave him the match on the 31st hole of Waverley Country Club, which has a par of 36-36-72.

Hunter could scarcely believe what was happening. A big hitter, he was driving straight and long. His irons were going true. In one string of 13 holes he was flawless from tee to green. He was one under par for the day. He played the first nine holes of the afternoon round without a 3 on his card. Yet he could not gain an inch against the Tucson physician.

Updegraff, whose putting also was almost flawless, took a 3-hole lead in the morning 18 holes, where he cut three strokes off par. He had four birdies and slipped over par only on the short ninth hole, where he took three shots from the edge of the green.

As the match went on he got better. He slipped over par only on the second hole of the afternoon, where his approach bounced over the green, and finished with two birdies, a par and an eagle on the last four holes.

It was a tribute to the physical condition of the 37-year-old Updegraff, who had to play 200 holes since the tournament opened last Monday. For that route he had 9 under par.

The younger Hunter went 197 holes in the grand and was 2 under par for the distance.

A field of 109 players started this 57th annual tournament, and Updegraff barely qualified. He was one of three players who tied at 292—four strokes over par—after 72 holes of qualifying play, and had to go into an extra hole playoff for one of two remaining match play positions. He was never again over par in the four 36-hole matches that followed.

SEATTLE (AP)—Betsy Rawls, from Spantburg, S. C., is the new Women's Western champion today and the new holder of the feminine record for money won at golf in a single season.

She cruised around the Rainier Country and Golf Club's 18 holes Sunday in 71 strokes, including 23 putts.

Her 1-under-par finish gave Betsy a total of 293 for the 72-hole 36th annual Western and a six-stroke bulge on previous champions, Patty Berg of Chicago and Western Amateur finalist Joanne Gunderson of Seattle.

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## Australia Aiming For Cup

BROOKLINE, Mass. (AP)—"We can win back the Davis Cup if our boys hold their present form," said Australia's Harry Hopman.

"I think it's 50-50," said Perry Jones of Los Angeles. "We are lucky. In Alex Olmedo, we have the best amateur player in the world."

These were the ringing statements of rival captains today as lines were drawn for the 16th straight Davis Cup challenge round meeting between Australia and the United States at Forest Hills Aug. 28-30.

The Aussies, who have won the cup eight times to America's seven since the two-nation monopoly took root in 1938, ended the long, hard climb to the challenge round Sunday by routing India 4-1.

Neale Fraser, playing at his peak, shattered India's dreams of an upset by outclassing the sensational Ramanathan Krishnan in the first of two last day singles matches 6-2, 6-3, 6-4. Rod Laver, 21-year-old Queenslander, beat Premjit Lall, 18-year-old Calcutta student, 6-2, 10-8, 6-4.

Hopman, normally a dour taskmaster, could not hide his elation over his team's impressive wind-up.

Hopman said he probably would use his left-handers, Fraser and Laver in singles and his Wimbledon champions Fraser and Roy Emerson, in doubles.

Earlier, Hopman told a Boston press conference that he thought America was lucky in the Davis Cup matches a year ago and that he thought he had three players—Fraser, Laver and Emerson—who could beat Olmedo.

Jones, 71-year-old California executive, laughed off this statement.

"You know Harry—he's just talking to raise the confidence of his team," Jones said. "Nobody is going to beat Olmedo. He is the established, bona fide amateur champion of the world. He has proved it by coming through in big matches and he will prove it in the Davis Cup."

Jones said the Peruvian Olmedo and big Barry MacKay of Dayton, Ohio, had the inside track for singles assignments in the challenge round and that his doubles lineup will be Olmedo and Earl Buchholz—having a complete collapse of the tandem in the national doubles championships here this week.

Jones said he had to concede that on paper Australia had the edge in doubles.

"But Olmedo should take both his singles and, on the way he played at Merion, MacKay should take at least one of his matches," the U.S. captain added. "But we're conceding nothing."

## Next Win Important For Indian's Wynn

NEW YORK (UPI)—The next time Early Wynn pitches a victory for the Chicago White Sox it will put him in a tie with Bob Feller and ancient Eppa Rixey as the 16th winningest pitcher in baseball history—while at the same time making him an outstanding candidate for most valuable player honors.

If the White Sox win the American League pennant, as they well may, the burly six footer from Alabama has to be one of the prime candidates for the award. The danger is that the votes may be split among him and such teammates as Nellie Fox and Luis Aparicio to let such as Washington's Harmon Killebrew or Cleveland's Rocky Colavito move in and take over.

As of the moment, the 210-pound Wynn has won 16 games against seven defeats for the White Sox and, as further indications of his effectiveness, in 12 of those games he has gone the distance while posting five shutouts.

PASSED HUBBELL, OTHERS

Those 16 victories, however, have moved him this season past such ranking all-time winners as Carl Hubbell, Red Faber, Ted Lyons, Amos Rusie and Ted Weyhing. One more will match the total of 266 victories posted

by Feller and the fabled Rixey. Before the year is out, he could catch Burleigh Grimes at 270.

After that, his targets would be Red Ruffing's 273 and Tony Mullane at 282—with Lefty Grove's even 300 wins within reach to make Wynn the 13th 300-game winner of all time.

Don't think he may not do it, either. Because Wynn is a man who covets each victory with an avarice which has produced for him a reputation as a "mean" pitcher. That's because he talks a tough, brushback game.

"You've got to regard the hitter as your enemy," he growls. "You've got to brush him back and not let him get a toehold. You must make him realize you mean business."

MATTER OF BUSINESS

With Wynn it is, quite simply, a matter of business.

"Every time they beat me," he explains, "it costs me \$1,000 the next time I go in to talk contract. There's that much difference between winning and losing."

Wynn, like wine, may be getting better with age but he isn't getting more mellow. Nor has he lost the fast ball which swept him into the major leagues 20 years ago. He "mixes 'em up," but he still can fog that fast one through when the occasion demands.

## Group Suspends Licenses

NEW YORK (AP)—The State Athletic Commission today suspended the promoter's license of Rosenzohn Enterprises, Inc., and the matchmaker's license of Bill Rosenzohn.

Rosenzohn promoted the June 26 heavyweight title fight at Yankee Stadium in which Sweden's Ingemar Johansson won the world heavyweight title by stopping defender Floyd Patterson.

The commission and Dist. Atty. Frank Hogan's office both are investigating the promotional background of the fight.
