

Portlanders Beaten But Remain In First

There were only two games in the Pacific Coast League Monday night, but oh what a difference they made.

Salt Lake City whacked league-leading Portland 3-1 to climb within one percentage point of the standings' topmost rung.

The defeat for Portland boosted Vancouver, which didn't even play, into a tie for first.

Sacramento meanwhile shel-

lacked Spokane, 5-1.

R. C. Stevens was the star batsman for the Bees in the game at Portland. The Beavers went ahead 1-0 in the first inning, Milt Grati scoring on a single by Len Tuck-

er. Stevens doubled this advantage with a double in the seventh inning, scoring Chuck Harmon, who had also doubled.

Then in the ninth, with two men out, Stevens homered. Once more, Harmon was on base. That did it. Stevens also had another double and a single in five trips to the plate.

Salt Lake's league-leading pitcher, Dick Hall, gave up only six hits in posting his 13th win against four losses. Portland's Ken Johnson, recording his 13th victory against six lost games, scattered 13 hits.

Sacramento's Carl Greene recorded his 11th win at Spokane, holding the Indians to two hits. Greene has lost eight. Connie Grob took the loss, giving him an 11-11 record.

Steve Bilko's homer in the fourth, his 23rd of the season, gave Spokane its only run. Bilko leads the league in homers.

The game was scoreless for the first three innings. The Solons scored three times in the fourth. Milt Smith started the inning off with a triple. He scored later when Dick Phillips singled to left. Phillips was thrown out trying to steal. Then Jack Dittmer singled to center and Bob Perry sent him home with a two-run homer.

Clay Dalrymple scored on Al Heist's single in the Sacramento seventh and Phillips completed the Sacramento scoring with a homer in the eighth.

Gillman will go with three quar-

Bevo Vice President Blames ML's Greed

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Short-sighted major league greed for a "quick buck" is blamed by Clyde A. Perkins for the present plight of minor league baseball.

And the executive vice president of the Portland club of the Pacific Coast League, and president of the recently organized Independent Baseball Club Assn., is determined to do something about it.

Perkins charged baseball is gradually "dying on the vine" since "in the last 10 years it has passed from owners who were sports-minded into the hands of syndicates who are money mad—and it is now fast developing into

a situation where it is losing its sporting value and becoming a racket."

He continued: "I am certain from what I've learned from senators and congressmen and others in high places that baseball will be declared in violation of the anti-trust laws. If this happens they will have no one to blame but themselves."

"They have created an aroused public from the grass roots all over the nation and my advice to them would be to start cleaning house immediately and to get rid of the weak leadership that they have in many top positions."

"That leadership does not have a dime in baseball and is interested in one thing—the salary and expense account."

Perkins said he wants to work within the present minor league structure if he terms the unwarranted invasions by the majors.

Ingemar Gets Several Offers

GOTEBORG, Sweden (UPI) —

Ingemar Johansson believes the suspension of the promoter's license of Rosenzohn Enterprises Inc. in New York frees him from his return bout now with Floyd Patterson, so that "all new offers are welcome."

Johansson, who leaves today for Copenhagen for an exhibition, said, "I understand it will mean I am released from my contract and the return fight."

"But," he added, "that doesn't mean I don't want to give Floyd a new match. He would get a fair chance to regain the title, but first we have to wait until the negotiations are over."

The champion actually began training Monday but he believes it now is "impossible" to hold a return bout with Patterson on Sept. 22 as originally planned by Bill Rosenzohn, former head of Rosenzohn Enterprises.

"All new offers are welcome," said Johansson, "and I've gotten several lately."

U.S. Netters Show Strength

BROOKLINE, Mass. (AP) — Alex Olmedo and Earl Buchholz Jr. have some hard work ahead of them this week in their Davis Cup prep but already they show strong teamwork around the net.

Olmedo, the Peruvian master who led the U.S. to victory over Australia last December, and his agile 18-year-old partner from St. Louis, won their opening round men's match Monday in the 79th U.S. National Doubles Tournament.

The scores were 7-5, 6-6, 6-4 over 1958 Davis Cup squadman Don Kierbow of Los Angeles and Ivo Pimental, No. 1 Venezuelan player.

Pressure Increases On Wynn

CHICAGO (AP) — At an age when most men get sore arms just tossing peanuts to the elephants, Early Wynn and his durable right hand American League batters eating out of his hand.

The 39-year-old pitcher for the league-leading Chicago White Sox will try for his 17th victory of the season tonight against the Baltimore Orioles. He has lost 7.

In his last two outings he has hurled three-hit shutouts, topping the circuit with five for the campaign as well as leading in number of triumphs.

Wynn, in his 19th major league season, is baseball's top active winner with 265. Thirty-five more victories and he will become the first pitcher to win 300 major league games since Lefty Grove.

Wynn also is seeking the league's strikeout title for the third straight year. He knocked off 184 in 1957, 179 in 1958 and is tied with Cleveland's Herb Score so far this season with 139.

"I do a lot of running," said Wynn. "An athlete's legs are the first to go. So far my legs feel strong and my arm just follows along."

Manager Al Lopez says Wynn does more running than any player he ever has seen.

"After pitching a game, Wynn will run a little and throw a few the next day to loosen up," says Lopez. "The next two days he will be running and running. He likes to take his turn every fourth day. If he has to wait longer between starts, you can find him in the bullpen throwing real hard."

The fast ball and curve still are Wynn's meal-and-potatoes pitches. "He has good breaking stuff, and he knows when to come in with that fast one when the batters aren't expecting it," says catcher Sherm Lollar. "He has a world of confidence—he knows how to pitch, he knows the batters."

Coach Ray Berres says Wynn is "sneaky fast."

"He has a smooth delivery and a slow windup. There is a sudden snap when he comes through with his arm and this makes it hard for the batter to follow him," Berres says.

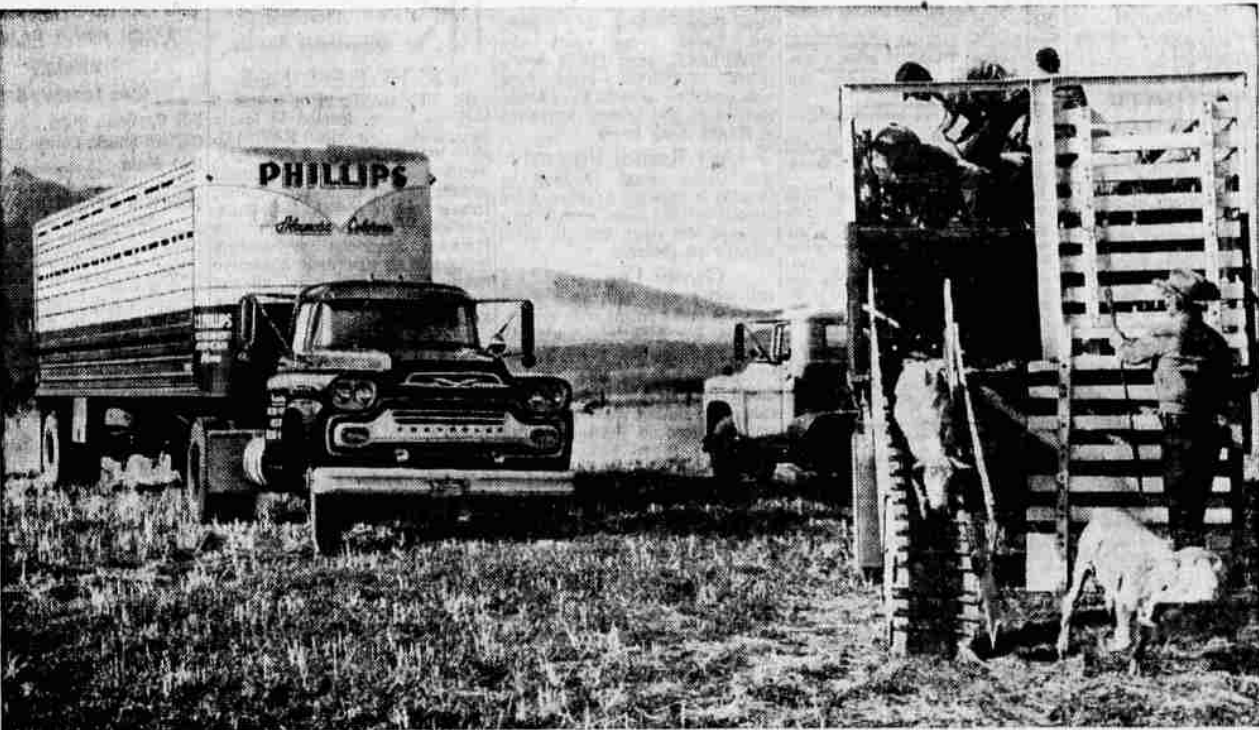

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Hunting Season Set Forth

PORTLAND (AP) — Duck hunting, curtailed throughout the nation as a conservation measure by the Interior Department, will suffer less in Oregon than other states.

The State Game Commission Monday announced a 94-day waterfowl hunting season, running from noon Oct. 7, 1959 through Jan. 8, 1960. Shooting time will start at sunrise each day after that.

The federal agency also stepped in to limit bag limits, as it listed its most severe hunting restrictions since 1947.

Duck hunters will be limited to 5 ducks daily and 10 in hand at any one time, the same as last year. But pintails and widgeon, once permitted bonus birds, will not be allowed this season.

The commission also said the limit will be two of a kind for canvasbacks, redheads or ruddy-ducks.

The Brant season will be Nov. 19 through Jan. 8, and jacksnipe Oct. 31 through Nov. 29.

The limits: coot, 25 daily or in possession; geese, 3 daily or in possession, plus 3 snow geese; Brant, 3 daily or in possession; jacksnipe 8 daily or in possession; and American and red-breasted Mergansers, 5 daily and 10 in possession.

Area regulations listed by the commission:

Summer Lake, season open from Oct. 7 through Jan. 8; Sauvie Island, open from Oct. 8 through Oct. 31 and Jan. 1 through 8 on even days, November and December on odd-numbered days; Malheur Refuge closed because of low water.

On the Atlantic, Mississippi and Central flyways, stringent regulations to cut the kill of wild ducks by one-third to one-half will go into effect.

They include a reduction in the duck hunting season length and shooting hours, and a drastic limit on the legal take of diving species.

Redhead Finds Return Tough

MILWAUKEE (AP) — The 1959 season is running out on Red Schoendienst but the Milwaukee Braves' veteran second baseman is looking ahead to next year.

Schoendienst battling back from a bout with tuberculosis, is finding it tougher than he expected to get into condition.

"The doctor won't allow me to run much, and running is baseball," the 36-year-old redhead said. "You have to be in shape to play this game and you can't get into shape without running."

Schoendienst rejoined the Braves and donned his No. 4 uniform Monday for his first appearance in Milwaukee County Stadium since the World Series last fall.

"I feel good — very good," he said with a big grin. "But, heck, I'm not ready yet. Hitting the ball in batting practice isn't the same as going up there in a game."

Often called the sparkplug of Milwaukee's National League champions the past two years, Schoendienst still is hopeful of being able to help the Braves in September. But it appears doubtful.

Opponents Fit For Title Fight

LOS ANGELES (AP) — World featherweight champion Davey Moore is in one of his moods, and you know what the means.

He's spoiling for a fight. "It's best not to try to talk to Davey before the fight," said his manager, Willie Ketchum. "Davey gets worked up, he don't like to talk to anybody."

Ex-champ Hogan (Kid) Bassey, too, was in seclusion today.

Both camps report the scrappy 126-pound battlers are as fit as well-tuned fiddles for their title fight Wednesday night.

The bout, a rematch of their bloody meeting last March, is billed for 15 rounds, or less. A crowd of 10,000 is expected to watch at the Olympic Auditorium, as well as a nationwide television audience.

The fight will be telecast beginning at 7 p. m. PDT over the ABC network.

Bad eye cuts forced Bassey to bow out of the March battle after 12 sizzling rounds. But the cuts are healed and the brows as good as ever, says the little Nigerian's manager, George Biddies.
