

'Newk' Whips San Francisco; White Sox Gain Largest Lead

Ex-Bum Helping Dodgers

Don Newcombe is back in business helping the Dodgers along in a National League pennant scrap, even though his paycheck now comes from the Cincinnati Reds.

Big Newk, the big guy of the Dodgers' staff before he was washed up because of arm and back trouble, pitched an eight-hit shutout for the Reds Tuesday night, whipping San Francisco 7-0 and trimming the Giants' lead over second-place Los Angeles to two games.

The Dodgers, winning two in a row for the first time in more than two weeks, closed in with a 7-6 victory over third-place Milwaukee in 13 innings, beating southpaw ace Warren Spahn the Braves' seventh pitcher, for the fifth time this season.

That left the Braves four games behind the Giants, who open a two-game series in Milwaukee tonight while the Dodgers start a two-game set at Cincinnati against the sixth-place Reds.

Philadelphia defeated St. Louis 2-1 in the only other NL game.

Reds 7, Giants 0

Newcombe (11-6), winless for almost a month, walked none and struck out four while beating the Giants for the fifth time in six decisions this season.

The Reds won it quick, skidding the Giants to their fifth defeat in the last seven games by scoring six runs in the first three innings. Gus Bell drove in half of them with a double and home run, his 19th, off loser Ed Fisher (2-4).

Bums 7, Braves 6

The Dodgers, booting away what was left of a 5-1 lead when the Braves scored an unearned run in the ninth, put it away when Wally Moon tripled and Rip Repulski singled off Spahn (16-12). It was Spahn's third relief chore of the year — and he has lost 'em all, dropping two to the Dodgers, who have a 30-14 edge over the lefty veteran.

Rookie Larry Sherry (4-2) won it, blanking the Braves without a hit for 2-3 innings in relief of Don Drysdale after Hank Aaron's second home run of the game, his 33rd, had deadlocked it 6-6 in the 11th. The Dodgers had scored off Spahn in the 11th on a walk, Repulski's pinch-hitter and a sacrifice fly by pinch-hitter Gil Hodges.

Duke Snider hit a two-run homer for the Dodgers, his 20th, and tied Ralph Kiner for third on the all-time NL list with 351 behind Mel Ott (511) and Stan Musial (409). Wes Covington also homered (No. 7) for the Braves, who caught the Dodgers in the ninth when Billy Bruton scampered home from first as Don Demeter dropped Aaron's fly to short center with two out.

Reliever Standout In Victory

Time was when folks knew Gerry Staley as the starting pitcher who always just missed being a 20-game winner in the National League. Now, as a reliever, he has become the Chicago White Sox' lock-up guy in their run for the American League pennant.

The 6-foot right-hander, two days shy of 39, helped push the White Sox into the largest lead of the year in the tight AL race Tuesday night, giving up just one hit in three shutout innings of relief for a 6-4 comeback victory over Baltimore and a 4 1/2-game bulge over Cleveland.

Staley scored the winning run for the White Sox, breaking a 4-all tie on Nellie Fox's two-out double in the eighth inning. That hoisted the White Sox six games ahead of Cleveland in the lost column after the second place Indians had been clubbed to their fourth straight defeat, 11-4, by Washington.

The New York Yankees, 12 1/2 games behind, broke a tie for third with Baltimore by beating Detroit 5-3. Boston tied Kansas City for sixth by defeating the A's 5-4.

Chicago 6, Birds 4

Staley, who won 19 for the St. Louis Cardinals in 1951, 17 in '52 and 18 in '53 before being peddled first to Cincinnati, then the Yankees and finally the White Sox, now has a 6-3 record with a 1.48 earned run average for his 85 innings in 49 games.

And while he's paired with Truk Lowm as a two-man relief crew that hasn't been beaten in two months, Staley has become the No. 1 clutch guy of late. He has put away a 4-0 record, plus four saves, and allowed only two earned runs during a 28-10 drive by the White Sox that began July 5, when they were second, two games behind the Indians.

Staley came on in the seventh Tuesday night with the White Sox, who had blown a 2-0 lead behind Early Wynn, trailing 4-3. A single by Luis Aparicio, Jim Landis' double and a sacrifice fly by Sherm Lollar squared it 4-all against losing reliever Jack Fisher (4-0).

Techmen Welcome Cordial

Jim Cordial, formerly head football coach of the St. Helens Lions, arrived in Klamath Falls Monday to take over in his new position, that of backfield coach for the Oregon Tech Owls.

Cordial, his wife, and five youngsters were greeted by Rex Hunsaker, OTI athletic director and head football coach, and George Miller, Owl line coach.

In addition to his football assignment, Cordial, a genial 6 foot, 180 pound ex-Oregon State College griddier, steps into the post of head baseball coach at the Mile High campus and will also fill a vacancy on the Allied Arts teaching staff.

His appointment fills the vacancy created upon the resignation of Ralph Carr last spring. Immediately previous to moving to Klamath Falls Cordial spent two years at St. Helens High School where he replaced Andy Knudsen in the football job. Knudsen completed the circle when he returned to St. Helens recently to replace Cordial.

Before moving to St. Helens Cordial directed the football talent at Miles City, Montana, High School. A 1953 graduate from OSC, Cordial spent three years on the Beaver varsity as a defensive end, serving as a teammate of Carr and Bob Redkey. Carr was a defensive halfback while Redkey was defensive linebacker.

Upon leaving OSC with a bachelor of science degree Cordial reported to the professional Chicago Cardinals in 1954 but he was "too light for the heavy work." Cordial weighed 165 at the time.

Questioned concerning his reaction upon arriving in Klamath Falls and his pre-season talks with Hunsaker, Cordial observed, "From what I know of this squad we should have another good season. And I'm very happy to be able to start a new job with such material. I don't know how to refer to it—Mythical Championship—or what, but I have a hunch the club will successfully defend their position."

Cordial returned to Oregon State this summer and completed work on his masters degree in Health Education and Administration.

He, his wife Dorothy, and youngsters Tim, 10, Gary, 7, Debbie, 4, Craig, 1 1/2, and Jamie, only 11 days old, will reside on the OTI campus for the immediate future.

Rickey Confident

Continental Vow Full Steam Ahead

NEW YORK (AP) — Leaders of the Continental League vowed today to move full steam ahead to organize their embryo circuit with eight teams and acquire the necessary players to operate as a major league by 1961.

Greatly encouraged by the support given by baseball's top brass at Tuesday's day-long meeting, Continental League President Branch Rickey and organizer William A. Shea said they will go to work adding three cities to their current five-team circuit. The founding cities are New York, Toronto, Houston, Denver and Minneapolis-St. Paul. Then they will huddle with American and National League Presidents Joe Cronin and Warren Giles to work

out a system for acquiring players. We expect no difficulty acquiring the territory and players."

Acceptance is subject to the newly-formed league complying with requirements, including minimum stadium capacity, financial requirements, population of franchise cities, and a pension plan for the players.

Shea, who admitted entering the meeting with some misgivings, was elated with the outcome. Commissioner Ford Frick and his major league committee promised baseball's full support provided the new league met specified requirements.

"There never was any problem in regards to our complying with all of baseball's rules and regulations," Shea said. "We're fully aware of the problems concern-

ing territorial rights and players. We expect no difficulty acquiring the territory and players."

Rickey, named president Tuesday morning, termed the results of the meeting with his former associates as "splendid."

"I'm convinced more than ever now that we will operate as a third major league in 1961," he said. "Furthermore, I have high hopes that the Continental League will participate in the World Series by the fall of 1963."

The 77-year-old Rickey, who relinquished his stock in the Pittsburgh Pirates as well as the chairmanship of its board of directors to accept his new post at a \$50,000 a year salary, foresaw no problem at all in acquiring players.

"I have always maintained, and I have given testimony to that effect, that while it is impossible to get 30 players for a ninth and tenth place club, it is easy to get 200 players for a new league," said Rickey.

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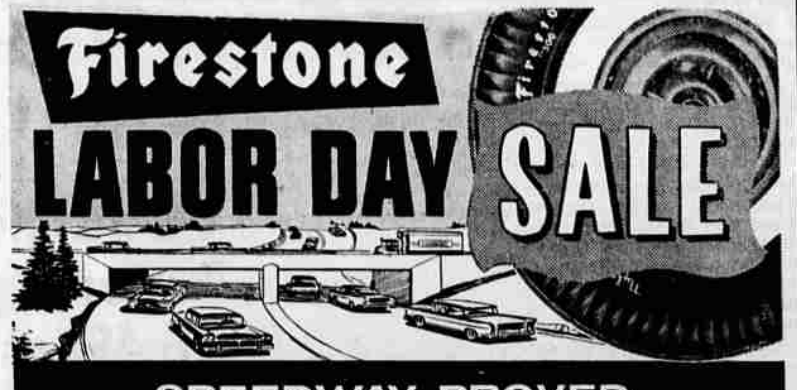
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
