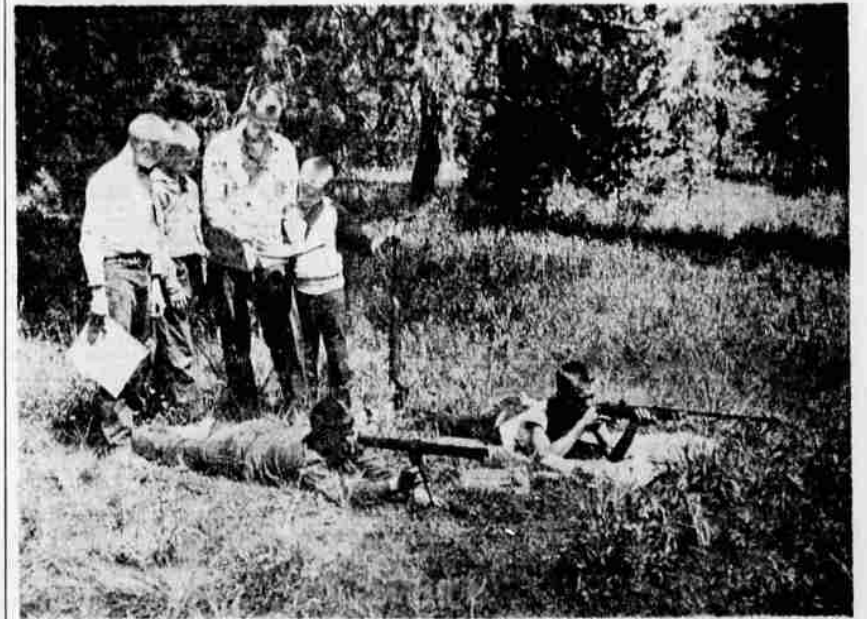

End Of Schedule Reached By Lassen Park Journey

Hardest hit by August doldrums or "dog days" in Klamath Falls are young boys. Many are bracing grimly for school's opening and trying sadly to forget days of carefree adventure at summer camp.

The YMCA schedule reached the end of its tether over the weekend when Merland Phelps, a local teacher and Y camp director returned with four youngsters from a "travel trip" to Lassen National Park.

Of course many probably will participate in the Y-sponsored family camp at Lake of the Woods over the Labor Day weekend. But it won't be the same as summer camp.

There at the Y camp on Diamond Lake, the youngsters were on their own for eight days except for presence of an ample supply of counselors and guides who put them through some good workouts.

Some climbed Mt. Thielson, a towering, decaying volcano with a needle nose more than 9,000 feet high. Others camped on the slopes of Mt. Baker on the other side of the lake. For some it was the first night they'd ever spent camping in the woods.

They swam, canoed, sailed, played games, fashioned trinkets in arts and crafts classes, sang and horseshoed together. In the evening when chores were done they gathered around a council fire and counselors played instruments, told stories or otherwise entertained.

Despite reports of ferocious looking bears sighted on campouts only one boy was a casualty. He got homesick and had to be sent home. The YMCA instituted its travel trips this summer. Two were planned—one to Lassen and one to the California-Oregon Coast, but the latter was canceled.

With its new panel-sided bus, though, the organization believes the travel trips will become a popular feature next summer and after. It's an inexpensive way of traveling, and comfortable, too.

Hundreds of Boy Scouts learned skills and worked toward higher rank and merit badges at their fine camp on Crescent Lake this summer.

Participating scouts from each council unit spent a week there.

UO Med Professor, Wife Rescued From High Ledge

WESTCLIFFE, Colo. (AP)—Rescuers plucked a University of Oregon Medical School professor and his wife from a mountain ledge high in the Colorado Rockies where they had been marooned 24 hours.

Dr. and Mrs. Charles T. Dotter of Portland were on a ledge near the peak of 14,191-foot Crestone Needle. They were in good condition when they returned to this Southern Colorado town.

The couple became stranded when their rope became lodged in a rock crevice Sunday afternoon.

They spent the night without food on a narrow shelf about 275 feet below the summit of the



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Newlyweds See Suicide

NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y. (AP)—A woman crawled to the brink of Niagara Falls late Tuesday night and dropped over head first as 200 honeymooners and tourists watched in horror.

Minutes later, a policeman lowered himself from Prospect Point with ropes. He said her body was on a ledge about 30 feet below the brink.

The pounding waters washed her to the bottom of the 167-foot American falls before rescuers with special equipment could reach her.

She was identified from papers in a purse left on Prospect Point as Helen Gorski, 49, of Buffalo. Police said she had been in ill health.

Some of the tourists told police that just as the last of a battery of floodlights was going off at 11:15 p.m., they saw the woman crawling on her hands and knees toward the brink.

They said she looked back over her shoulder at them once and then went over the edge.

Police said it apparently was a well-planned suicide. "She knew what she was doing," they said. "It was a one-way ticket."

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—From now on, if Marlon Brando wants to see his baby son he'll have to notify his ex-wife in advance, says actress Anna Kashfi.

Miss Kashfi said Brando has been showing up unannounced at her home and "causing trouble generally." She will seek a court order to prevent the actor from visiting at unscheduled hours. The divorce settlement requires the actor to make advance arrangements before coming to Miss Kashfi's home to visit the baby.

Brando, 35, has agreed to pay her 24-year-old ex-wife more than half a million dollars in future earnings under terms of the settlement. He also is paying \$1,000 monthly support for their

son, Christian, who was a year old in May.
