Death Cause Under Probe

DOWNIEVILLE, Calif. (AP)—Experts are seeking the cause of the death of Pearl Ada Putney, 72, whose bones were found scattered in a wooded foothill area of the Sierras a year after she vanished.

The wealthy widow last was seen Aug. 15, 1958 in Marysville, Calif., six weeks after she left her home in Washington, D.C. with an ex-convict on what she called "a last fling." The bones, found Sunday, were identified Tuesday.

Sheriff W. D. Johnson said he understood the FBI had begun a search for the ex-convict, Larry Lord Motherwell.

Goal Of Computer Cited By Army

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Computers could do a wonderful job as military planners if only they could learn, the director of an Army study project said today.

Machines capable of learning are on the way, he added.

"The goal, of course, is to make the computer behave more like the human planner," Julius Brick told the Western Electronics Show and Convention.

"This is the direction in which computer designers will be heading for some time," he declared in a paper before a military electronics section.

Brick, computer specialist with W. L. Maxson Corp. of New York, reported on a study of computer planning of artillery fire for the Army's Field Artillery School at Ft. Sill, Okla.

He said the Ft. Sill study, carried out with a commercially

available computer, showed that "in one aspect our computer is vastly superior to the human planner, and that is in its ability to consider all the details a thorough planning job requires."

"However, the machine is totally impotent when it comes to making even the minutest variation in its procedures for deriving a fire plan."

"It is in this area that the next major advances in computer art must come," Brick declared.

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Charge Names Local Grocer

Frank G. Sutton, operator of a Summers Lane Grocery, was arrested Tuesday on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of his own daughter.

An information of felony was signed by Sutton's wife, Mary Jane Sutton.

Sutton appeared before District Judge D. E. Van Vactor Tuesday and asked for time to advise the court whether he wished a preliminary hearing. Time for his appearance was set for 9:30 a.m. Friday, and Sutton was returned to county jail in lieu of \$5,000 bond.

The judge had raised the bond from \$2,500.

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
