## Reunions Prompt Long Motor Trip

In Worthington, Minnesota, they visited with a brother and sister, Oscar Kunzman and Mrs. George Pfeil, whom they have seldom seen since their youth.

While in Worthington, George Kunzman also attended the reunion of his high school class of 1909. At the class picnic two teachers were among the 85 persons attending who represented, with the exception of four years, each class between 1896 and 1914. A banquet for graduates was held the following day with 60 persons present.

Leaving Minnesota the travelers drove to Sandwich, Illinois, where Mrs. Thurber and her brother met with two sisters whom they hadn't seen in 52 years.

On the return trip several stops were made in Missouri and Kansas where the three were guests of relatives of Mrs. Kunzman's.

George Kunzman worked as a young man on several newspapers including the Worthington Daily Globe and a German publication in Mountain Lake, Minnesota. Later he bought a newspaper in Brewster. In 1911 he came west to visit a sister who had moved to Medford. Liking what he saw in that area, he discarded his idea of enrolling in the journalism school at Iowa College and instead purchased a job print shop in Medford. He remained there until he bought another shop in Klamath Falls which he has owned and operated since 1940.

## Earring Collection Circles Globe And Spans 20 Years

VALDOSTA, Ga. (AP)—Tibet and Nepal have something unusual in common.

They are the only two countries in the world not represented in an earring collection owned by Mrs. Alice Lindsey, wife of an Air Force colonel.

Mrs. Lindsey says her collection consists of more than 2,000 pairs, most of them gifts from friends who travel. Several sets were contributed by governments who wanted to be represented.

In her 20 years of collecting earrings, Mrs. Lindsey says she lost only one pair—one of her most precious. They were made from a pair of onyx rings given to Mrs. Lindsey by her mother, Mrs. H. S. Young of Nashville, Georgia.

The earring collection is mounted on four boards five feet long and two and one half feet wide. She uses one for each season to decorate her bedroom wall.

In her collection is a pair of tiny compasses set in silver. They came from the Sahara desert where such earrings were worn singly by women of the Bedouin Tribe as a wedding gift from their nomad husbands.

From the princess of the Taos Indian Tribe came a pair of tiny silver bell earrings. They are presented by the daughter-in-law to her mother-in-law and warn when the mother-in-law is coming. A pair of small ermine mice earrings was contributed by Lich-

enstein, smallest country in Europe. When worn by women of that country, they signify that the husband is away, carrying out the old proverb, "When the cat is away the mice will play."

Mrs. Lindsey's collection contains a pair of rice bell earrings from Latvia. The clear crystal balls are set in gold and contain grains of rice. When worn they denote that wedding vows have been taken.

One of the loveliest pairs came from Formosa. Legend has it that when the engagement of a daughter is announced, the most talented member of the groom's family carves in pearl the image of the groom-to-be. The earrings are given to the bride by her parents to be worn on their wedding day. Some represent typical international and American holidays—clocks for the New Year and hearts for Valentine's Day.
