With the close of the season only six weeks away, fishing around the county is having its ups and downs. An early morning rain Wednesday at Rocky Point brought good results for catfish and perch, however, most of the other favorable spots for local anglers are beginning to tail off.

Dead Horse and Campbell lakes out past Bly have been good while Agency Lake is remaining about the same. The Williamson is letting up. Four Mile Lake is as good as it has been and both Lost River and Gerber are only fair.

Joe Green of Joe's Sporting Goods noted Wednesday that all anglers should be reminded of the lowness of Upper Klamath Lake and to be sure and watch out for rocks and snags.

Crater Lake has been producing good on silver wobbler bites but this information is only for those devout "fish lovers" who are able

to survive the long hike down to the lake.

Klamath River, which has been closed since June 15, will reopen September 30 while the rest of the county, with the exception of Lake of the Woods, closes October 31. The Klamath is closed at all times to angling from the Copco Big Bend Dam to the downstream side of the bridge at the flume crossing. October 18 is the closing date for Lake of the Woods.

In the interest of our California neighbors will be the news that the California Fish and Game Commission Wednesday turned aside an attempt to adopt a split duck season and agreed to a straight 94-day hunt, one day shorter than 1959.

Commissioner Carl Wente tried to talk fellow commissioners into a split season. The first season

was to be from October 1 to November 1, and the second from November 1 to December 1.

San Francisco, the National League leader, has lost five of its last seven games.

Over in the American League, the pace-setting White Sox have dropped three of their last four.

The second-place clubs are stumbling around just as badly. Los Angeles has won only four of its last 11 and Cleveland has lost four of its last five.

That brings us down to the third-place Braves, who lost six of their last nine. But at least they beat the Giants, 3-2, Wednesday night to climb within three games of the top.
