"I don't know about the West team but we are better than last year, we can give them a real ball game," commented coach Al Keck, the man in charge of the East Shrine All-Star eleven which tangles with the West in the Annual Shrine Benefit game set for Pendleton Saturday night. *Game time is 8:15 following a huge colorful pageant.

Keck, who guided Merrill to a State B football championship last fall, named both his offensive and defensive units for the Saturday test at the completion of a pair of workouts held in the rain at La Grande Wednesday.

Of the five Klamath County stars picked to the East roster, four have earned definite starting berths, while the fifth will see a lot of action as the game progresses.

On the offensive roster are Merrill's Bud Maupin and John Haskins, teamed at halfback slots as they were on the Husky championship club, and Larry Jackson, the hard working center from Klamath Falls Sacred Heart Academy.

Set for work on the defensive unit are Haskins, a linebacker, and Charles Roler, also of Merrill, who will perform at safety.

Bonanza's Tom Ellis, who lost out to Jackson in the fight for the center slot, is guaranteed work throughout the game.

According to Keck, all contact work has been discontinued for the balance of the week. Today the eleven ran through a light hour long workout in the morning followed by specially drilled under the lights this evening. On Friday the squad will wrap it up with a short drill in the afternoon.

A slight injury to the knee of Marc McGowan, the rugged 172 Pilot Rock defensive end, put the only blemish on the Wednesday work. However, it is figured that the incident will not keep McGowan out of action.

A scrimmage between the divided team Wednesday ended 20-15 for the half led by Haskins and Dick Ruhl, a 187 pound end from Heppner.

Making up the full offensive list are left-end Ruhl, right-end, Dave Hockett, Joseph (168), tackles Carl Banker, Stanfield (198) and Ron Robinson, Union (193), guards Greg Johnson, Wallowa (182) and Dave Schrieber, Maupin (212) and center Jackson, SHA (178).

Working in the backfield with Maupin (175) and Haskins (178) are Culver's Bill Ransom (165) at quarter and Umatilla's Bob Loranee (195) at full.

The defensive include Hockett and McGowan at ends, Robinson and Gordon Elder, Athena (219) at guards, Johnson and Chuck Myers, Echo (166) at linebacking posts, with Ruhl and Haskins at halfback slots, supported by Roler (158) in the safety position.

Davey Moore Stops Bassey, Eyes Becerra Or Joe Brown

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A title fight with Lightweight Champion Joe Brown may be in the works for World Featherweight Champion Davey Moore, who Wednesday night stopped Hogan (Kid) Bassey in 11 rounds.

Moore's manager, Willie Ketchum, said the Brown fight was fine with him "providing the money is right."

Moore, who bombed out Bassey, said he isn't trying to invade other divisions. But he added:

"Frankly, I'd like to meet (World Bantamweight Champion) Joe Becerra for my featherweight championship. But, I'm in this business for the money and I'll fight anybody if the price is right."

Matchmaker George Parnassus, who masterminded the Moore-Bassey title fight, said a Moore-Brown battle for the lightweight title would be a natural.

"It took Moore seven times on the scale to make the 126-pound limit for Bassey," Parnassus said. "He could easily come in at 132 or 133." Moore finally weighed in at 126, a pound more than Bassey.

A Moore-Becerra featherweight title scrap would be a natural too, especially in Los Angeles, where the large Mexican population idolizes the little 118-pound champ from Mexico. But Becerra is committed for an October rematch with Alphonse Halimi of France, from whom he won the title last month.

Moore stopped Bassey so convincingly at the Olympic Auditorium that the little battler from British West Africa was asked to retire by his manager, George Biddies.

Bassey, who appeared at a press party with dark glasses hiding a swollen right eye and a bandage over a badly bruised right hand, said:

"This is not a decision I can make in a moment. I must think it over."

Sharp-shooting Moore, who took the title from Bassey last March, counter-punched Bassey into a tottering derelict at the end of the 10th round.

Bassey sprawled on his stool and refused to come out for the 11th round.

When Referee Frankie Van asked if he was all right, Bassey

peered up with a partly-closed right eye and said:

"No, I don't wish to go out."

A second shouted "go, go" and tried to put the mouthpiece into Bassey's mouth. But the battered Nigerian merely shook his head.

By this time the bell had sounded for round 11. Moore had rushed

across the ring and was jiggling happily in front of the anxious knot before Bassey's corner when Referee Van yelled and raised Moore's arm in victory.

A crowd of 7,450 paid a gross rate of \$47,100.40 to watch the scrap, which was televised nationally over the ABC network. TV receipts totaled \$40,000. Each fighter got 30 per cent of all revenue.

Bassey knew that, as challenger, he had to take the title from Moore, who hails from Springfield, Ohio. He tried gallantly to nail Moore, but the champion played a waiting game and picked Bassey apart with savage counter-punches.

When Bassey decided not to continue he was losing on all cards by three to seven points.

Tom Hamilton Meets 'Big 5'

MONTEREY, Calif. (UPI) — Coaches and faculty representatives of the newly formed "Big Five," and their new executive director, Tom Hamilton, began a two-day informal meeting here Wednesday.

The Big Five, formally known as the Athletic Association of Western Universities (AAWU), is comprised of USC, UCLA, California, Washington and Stanford.

Hamilton said the meeting was strictly a friendly, get-acquainted affair, and no business would take place.

"We plan to encourage a different philosophy," he said. "It will be based on mutual trust and confidence. The member schools will police themselves rather than be checked by conference officials. I am no policeman."

The AAWU was officially formed earlier this year after the death of the old Pacific Coast Conference. Hamilton said the past bitterness that marked the old PCC would be forgotten—and that emphasis would be on the future.

At Tulare, George Hanson, who is making the change from Malin where he was head football and baseball coach, is the head of all three of the school's sports.

Hanson noted that uniforms will be distributed Monday morning at 8 o'clock and practice will get under way immediately following if time allows.

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Beavers Overtime Winners

If Portland's Tommy Heath landed in the worried-wrecks ward of the hospital today, you couldn't really express surprise.

Round Tommy lives and dies with the antics of his league-leading Portland Beavers. The Beavers were in a first place tie with Spokane, but they had lost five of their last eight games. Some were real heartbreakers.

The Beavers held a steady 7-3 margin going into the ninth inning against the hard-hitting Indians. Then . . . the Indians rallied for four runs to tie the game. A loss could mean bye-bye baby to Tommy's first pennant since 1950.

But the Beavers managed to pull it out with a single run in the 10th to win, 8-7. They now hold a half-game margin over Salt Lake and are a game and a half ahead of Vancouver, which was beaten again by the white-hot Seattle Rainiers, 6-0. San Diego beat Phoenix, 1-0, in the only other game. Sacramento's game at Salt Lake was rained out.

Jack Bloomfield beat out an infield hit for the Beavers in the 10th and he scored when Len Tucker singled. Frank Howard smashed a three-run double for Spokane in their big ninth inning rally. He also homered in the first inning.

Chuck Seccrest hit a three-run homer for the Beavers in the third and Jim Greengrass swatted a solo homer in the sixth. Bloomfield tagged a two-run inside the park homer for the Beavers in the eighth.

Seattle's win over Vancouver was the Rainiers' 14th victory in their last 15 starts. It was the second straight shutout over the Mounties. Claude Osteen scattered seven Vancouver hits as he won his eighth against nine losses. Lou Skizas led the Rainier attack with a three-run homer in the sixth.

Larry Doby drove home the only run of the game in the 10th inning as the Padres handed Phoenix its 13th straight defeat. Jake Striker went all the way for the Padres and gave up only one hit. He retired 27 men in a row, beginning in the second inning. Don Choate, who worked the first seven innings for the Giants was relieved by Marcelino Solis who was charged with the loss.

Apostoli Predicting Pier 6er

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Fred Apostoli, top middleweight 20 years ago, is certain the Gene Fulmer-Carmen Basilio Aug. 28 NBA middleweight title fight will be a donnybrook worthy of any championship.

He's also certain things can't be as confusing in the 160-pound division as they were when he wore at least a chunk of the crown in 1938-39.

"To this day I don't know what the title was," Apostoli said. "It was fouled up from the time Mickey Walker retired in 1931 until Tony Zale cleared it up by beating George Adams 10 years later."

Now the situation is again muddled. The National Boxing Assn. stripped Ray Robinson of the world title and sanctioned the Basilio-Fulmer Cow Palace 15-rounder.

The winner will be recognized as champion in NBA territory, everywhere in the U.S. but New York and Massachusetts.

After watching Basilio and Fulmer, both former world champions in a non-disputed era, Apostoli enthusiastically predicted their fight would equal any mid-weight brawl.

He refused to pick a winner, but predicted a knockout within 10 rounds.

Continental Blasted By George Trautman

NEW YORK (AP) — George Trautman, head of the minor leagues, today charged the newly organized Continental League with completely ignoring the minors in its efforts to gain major league status.

Trautman's accusation came after chiefs of top individual minor circuits said they would demand heavy damages, totaling around \$3,000,000 from the proposed circuit for invasion of their territories.

"I keep reading about a number of our cities being considered for inclusion in this new league," said Trautman, "but never once have we been approached by these people. I think it would be a sort of courteous thing if we were considered. There have been numerous conferences but we've never been invited to attend any of them."

Trautman made it plain he was not opposed to minor league cities advancing to major league status. "We've never resisted any of our cities that desired to become major," he said. "But we've got a structure that must be preserved. I'm sure a man like Branch Rickey (president of the Continental League) is aware of this as well as I am, and he knows that any league affected must be consulted."

"After all, there are human beings and peoples' livelihoods they are dealing with. You don't just pick up baseball clubs as you would a bunch of bananas."

"Our leagues cannot be destroyed by a mere wave of the hand without being adequately compensated and getting other cities as replacements. We've got to find cities and towns, realign, get the players and we can't do it by waving a wand."

"We want to help this new league and we can but at the same time we don't want them to destroy us. All we want to do is survive."

Ed Doherty, president of the American Association, said Wednesday he already has demanded a million dollars indemnity for each of the cities taken by the Continental League.

The AA may lose six of its 10 franchises: Houston, Denver and the twin-cities of Minneapolis-St. Paul are among the five founders of the new league. The Dallas-Fort Worth area also is being eyed by the new organization.

President Frank Shaughnessy of the International League said he also would ask for approximately a million dollars for the loss of Toronto and any other cities. Toronto is among the five charter members and Montreal and Buffalo are being mentioned as possible members.
