

Deadline For Entries Near In All-Breed Dog Exhibit

Ever see a dog that doesn't bark, or a dog that hunts lions, or a dog that pulls milk carts? It's very likely that these—and dozens of other breeds—may be seen at the All-Breed Dog Show sponsored by Klamath Dog Fanciers next month.

The show will be held in Klamath County Fairgrounds September 5. Entries close August 24—next Monday.

Mrs. Kathy McDonald, president of Klamath Dog Fanciers Inc., said the show is expected to attract entries from many parts of the United States and some foreign countries.

But a special emphasis is being placed on local entries. Mrs. McDonald, who operates Kay-Mac Kennels on the OTI Road, said entry blanks are available from her or from Mrs. Betty Allen, 3630 Laverne Avenue, the club secretary-treasurer.

Both women are available to help owners fill entry blanks, and will advise on grooming and training problems.

Last year, Mrs. McDonald said, the show attracted 416 entries from as far away as the East Coast and South America.

Three qualified judges have been selected. The judges, and the classes they are to judge, are:

Mrs. Frances O. Holland, Oswego — Working breeds, terrier breeds, variety groups three and four, Best dog in show.

A. J. Schoendorf, Sacramento—Hound breeds, non-sporting breeds, variety groups two and five.

Earl C. Kruger, Glendale, California—Sporting breeds, toy breeds, miscellaneous and variety groups one and six.

Sun-gold trophies will be awarded for the best of breed or best of variety of breed in every breed or variety where four or more dogs are entered.

These other trophies have been donated:

Best of breed in rough collies, donated by Dr. and Mrs. Raymond Tice; best of breed in Samoyeds, donated by Mr. and Mrs. Howard R. Perrin; best of breed in St. Bernards and best of variety in wire fox terriers, donated by Mrs. Mary Grigsby; best of breed in miniature Schnauzers, donated by Lee Hendricks.

Klamath Dog Fanciers offer 50 breed trophies (where four or more dogs are entered), six group trophies, one best of show trophy, and one trophy for best local dog in show.

Mrs. McDonald emphasized that entries close August 24. Dogs may be entered in field trials up to the date before trials, but entries for shows must be made two weeks previously.

About these unusual dogs? The dog that doesn't bark is a Basenjis, an Egyptian animal. But it does howl. The Rhodesian Ridgeback is a breed used to hunt lions, and the Keeshonden, a dog

from Holland, is of the type used to pull milk carts. These and other unusual breeds were entered in last year's show.

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Eruption Of Feud Seen

EDGEWOOD, Md. (AP) — The long-standing feud between the Army and its enlisted scientists threatened to break into the open again today.

Some 400 young enlisted scientific and professional personnel at the Army chemical center here were ordered to fall out at 1 p.m. — in civilian clothes.

The lineup was called to help civilian witnesses identify some of the 60 or so men who celebrated at a beer party here last Thursday night.

Military authorities said they received complaints that obscene songs and statements uncomplimentary about the Army emanated from the festivities.

Just 11 months ago a similar party resulted in the court-martial of 11 men, mostly college graduates with degrees in engineering, mathematics, or the natural sciences.

Although the charges were drunk and disorderly conduct, the basic issue at the court-martial was the young scientists' rebellion against age-old military discipline.

Through their civilian lawyer and in press interviews, they complained they received little recognition for their work in Army laboratories and are taken out of the labs for KP duty and routine military training.

Like the earlier party, last Thursday's was held on civilian property near the post.

Lab Results Report Acid

WASHINGTON (UPI) — An FBI laboratory check showed today that sulfuric acid was used in an attack on Rep. Frank Thompson (D-N.J.).

Thompson was squirted with the acid from a passing truck while driving to work Tuesday. No arrests have been made and police were at a loss today to explain the incident.

Thompson said a passenger in the truck shot the fluid at him from a syringe. A drop or so struck his arm and some landed on the side of his automobile. At the request of police, the FBI late Wednesday ran a laboratory check on the congressman's shirt and scraping from the car.

Thompson threw his arm up to protect his face. He noted later that the fluid had burned a hole in his shirt and left red marks on his arm.

The test showed the liquid was sulfuric acid of about the concentration used in auto batteries, according to Lt. J. Y. Chennault of the Washington police.

"ENLIGHTENING" EXHIBIT
