Anne Saboe Onstad became the bride of Richard Odell Sondgroth of Chico at 11 o'clock the morning of August 8 at All Saints Episcopal Church in Redding where the bride's father is rector.

The bridal party was received at the chancel by the Rev. Paul R. Palmer, uncle of the bride from Duncan, Oklahoma, who officiated during the betrothal ceremony. The Rev. Galen Onstad gave his daughter in marriage after which he preceded the couple to the altar where they repeated their wedding vows before him and received Holy Communion.

Escorted down the aisle by her father, the bride wore a ballet length white embroidered tulle gown in princess style with sweetheart neckline, and a soft pleated skirt with scalloped embroidered hemline. A short veil was attached to a real lace cap, once belonging to the bride's great great grandmother. She carried a white Book of Common Prayer, carried by her mother 24 years earlier.

Laughter is the best medicine for whatever ails you, says Gladys Workman, who has been making jokes out of calamities all her life.

A broken back? Merely amusing. Temporary blindness and deafness? Nothing to cry about. A broken leg? Exciting. Cuts, bruises, abrasions and fractured bones? Hilarious.

Out in Oregon's Umpqua River Valley Gladys' hearty laughter can be heard all the way up and down the 23-party line, and recently it's been heard by TV network coast to coast, following publication of her best-seller, "Only When I Laugh."

Gladys took to the Oregon woods with her husband, Pappy, when the doctors gave him only a few months to live. If that was the case, said she, he might as well enjoy what life was left, and get in some good fishing and hunting. Now, 12 years later, Pappy is hale and hearty, raising daffodils and eating bear steaks, while Gladys has brought fame to the valley.

Today, despite all the disasters that have beset her since childhood, Workman is the picture of health, tall, vital, white-haired and breezy—and having the time of her life.

"I've got to get back to the Umpqua for our annual barbecue," she said, during a hectic book-launching visit to New York. "Just before I left I rounded up the elk, bear, venison and salmon we always serve. The girl at the packing house got on the party line and said, 'Gladys needs bear,' and within an hour I had four bear, a dozen elk and offers of all the venison and salmon we could use."

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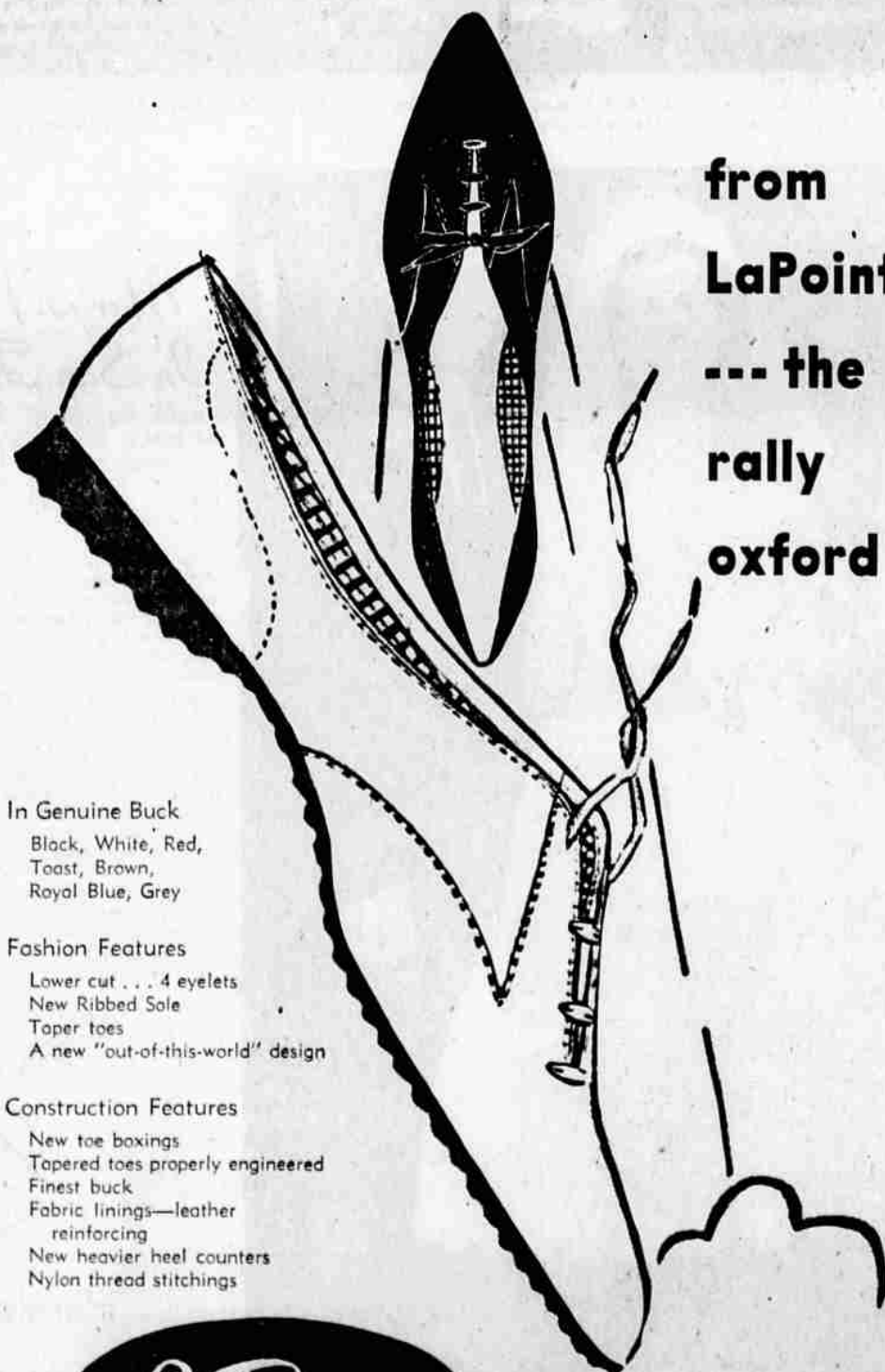
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
