5. Shed all worry about time-of-the-month. Tuck a box of Tampax in the side pocket of your grip.

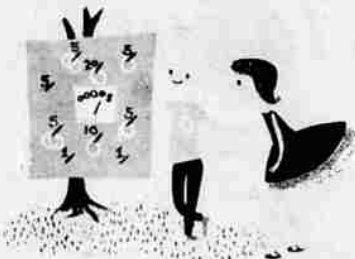

Eye Foozers

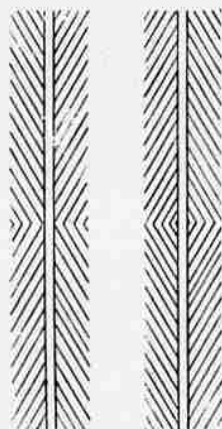

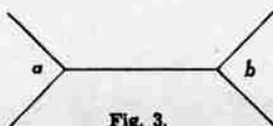

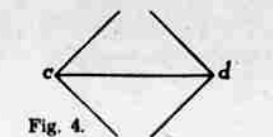

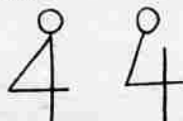
Tongue Twister

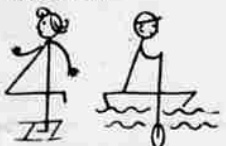
In these two fours perhaps you'll find Some figures of a different kind.
