American Coaches' Group Announces Film Of Grid Story

CHICAGO (UPI) — The American Football Coaches Association announced today that it will produce a half hour film, adaptable for television, of its 1959 All-America football team.

"It will carry, in pictures, the story of American football to all corners of the nation," said Wally Butts, head football coach at the University of Georgia and president of the coaches association, in disclosing the new project.

At the same time, Butts announced that the coaches' 1959 team would be selected for General Mills and that the team would be distributed as an exclusive feature of United Press International.

Selection of the team will be supervised by an 11-man board of the coaches association. The board will weigh recommendations of the other coaches and scouts and movies of all games and players before making its final selections.

The personnel of the team will be announced for afternoon newspapers of Wednesday, Nov. 25. United Press International News-pictures will carry a picture layout of the team.

Promote College Football — The film, which will run 26 1/2 minutes on 16 mm sound, will feature the All-Americans in action, plus campus and practice field sequences, with leading coaches among those doing the commentary.

Nor-Cal Dragsters To Meet

REDDING—Northern California drag racers vie for the final time of the season here today. Time trials will be conducted in the morning and the eliminations will take place in the afternoon. Site of the races will be the Redding municipal airport.

Officials of the Shasta Roadsters, Inc., the race's sponsors, said a good turnout of contestants is expected to make this one of season's largest events.

Trophies will go to all class winners, for top time of the meet and to the top eliminator. Officials stated that other special awards will be given at this season-end meet.

Tulelake Trounces Bieber Hi

TULELAKE — A "coming" squad of Honkers from Tulelake evened its season record at three wins, three losses with a 32-6 trouncing of Big Valley High, Bieber, California, at Fairgrounds Stadium here Friday night.

Coach George Hanson's Honkers, a member of the County B League, scored a pair of touchdowns in each of the first two quarters and one more in the final period. They had three more called back because of penalties.

Hanson, who cleared his bench in the landslide win, said following the non-league encounter, "I sure feels good to win. The kids did a good job and I feel they are really coming along."

Honker halfback Bill Oehlerich got the Tulelake crew on the road as he romped 65 yards to paydirt on the second play from scrimmage. Fullback Cliff Wooten hit the scoreboard still in the opening period when he scampered 72 yards off tackle to put the score at 12-0.

Halfback Butch King, transplanted Tulelake quarterback, grabbed a three-yard pass from QB Bob Osborne and Joe Rogers added the point after on a kick for the Honkers' first TD in the second frame. The other Tulelake first half six-pointer resulted when Osborne, a senior, rolled around end on a 33-yard option play.

Rogers added the last Tulelake TD in the final quarter on a 12-yard sprint around end. Oehlerich plunged for the PAT.

The lone Big Valley TD came in the third when Jim Faulkner nabbed a nine-yard screen pass from quarterback Joe Kresse.

"I must certainly give credit to Bob Osborne at QB for doing a real good job for us," smiled Hanson, who is in his "rookie" year at Tulelake after serving as head coach at Malin for one year.

Rudy Migay appears on his way to another banner season in the American Hockey League.

The veteran center, who notched 82 points for the Rochester Americans last year, scored one goal and assisted on two others to lead the Americans to a 5-2 triumph over Providence in the only league action Friday night at Rochester.

Migay, Pat Hannigan and Guy Rousseau each tallied in the first period to give Rochester a lead which it never relinquished. Cecil Hoekstra and Dick Van Impe added third period markers for the Americans.

The coaches selected their team for General Mills in 1957 after Collier's magazine, for which the team formerly had been chosen, discontinued publication. The UPI distributed the selection of the team.

"We are pleased indeed to become associated again with the American Football Coaches Association in this All-America project," said Charles A. Bell, president of General Mills.

"Because of our long time interest in American sports, the management of General Mills is glad to become a part of perpetuating the great tradition of the coaches All-America football team."

Butts said the personnel of the 11-man board which will select the team will be announced shortly through UPI. He added that arrangements have been made to have the players selected for the team appear on the Ed Sullivan CBS television program on Sunday, Nov. 29.

Packers Believe LA Rough

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (UPI)—

The Green Bay Packers take their undefeated record against the Los Angeles Rams in County Stadium in what is expected to be a test of which team can take the most advantage of the opposition's injury-caused weaknesses.

The Packers, on top of the Western Division with three straight wins, probably will throw plenty of passes to try to break through the Los Angeles secondary, where safeties Bill Sherman and Don Burroughs are expected to be missing.

Los Angeles stands as a three point favorite despite its 1-2 record on the basis of its explosive attack and the fact that the law of averages is now working against Green Bay, which has surprised everyone in winning three straight.

The Packers also will be missing two key men in fullback Jim Taylor and defensive end Nate Borden, in addition to the fragile condition of halfbacks Paul Hornung and Don McIlhenny.

Coach Vince Lombardi—who has made over what was pro football's worst team last year, said the Packers face "Probably our toughest game so far" in the Ram contest.

Rams coach Sid Gillman said he might use offensive end Del Shorner to patch up the holes left by Sherman and Burroughs. Lombardi will probably send three ends into the game, one as a flanker, to give his ailing backs a rest.

How to please the critics?

Many words have been printed about "the wrath of the alumni" or "the pressure from the downtown quarterbacks" on college coaches throughout the land. Just what is the situation — from the coaches' side of the fence?

Five years ago, when I was a new head coach, I perhaps was too aware of some of the overt comments that I heard about town and from the stands.

My first few years, the comment was, "Why don't we have those fine, break-away plays such as the Army has or like Georgia Tech uses?"

That was fairly simple — we needed some of those break-away runners! We just didn't have any "Scooter" Thompson's or Pat Uebel's.

George Halas, owner-coach of the NFL Expansion Committee took a moderate view of Anderson's pronouncement.

"We will have something definite to say about the league expanding next week," Halas said Friday. "Anderson's statement is premature. We can't say anything yet."

George Preston Marshall, owner of the Washington Redskins, wasn't so tolerant, however.

"I note that Mr. Anderson's name has been mentioned in connection with the commissioner-ship," the fiery Redskins boss said vehemently. "But I think he is a little premature in making statements about the league in general. He should wait until he is elected."

At least 17 valuable race horses, valued at "well over \$100,000," were destroyed in a general alarm fire which swept the showcase farm of manufacturer William J. Beattie early Saturday.

A former Canadian national champion and Buckeye Handicap winner, Park Dandy, was among the horses destroyed in the raging fire.

Only three of 20 horses in the huge barn escaped death, but all three were injured and authorities feared they might have to be destroyed.

Beattie, a prominent lace manufacturer, told authorities the flames broke out shortly before 5 a.m. when a watchman went to investigate the sound of a barking dog.

A member of the Beattie household said, "The whole barn was in flames, we couldn't do anything for those wonderful horses. It was the best crop of horses we had ever had. There were some wonderful 3-year-olds and those darling colts. It was terrible."
