

Reception Honors Grand Commander

Elvin E. Phillips, grand commander, of the Grand Commandery Knights Templar of Oregon, was honored at a reception in the Masonic Temple Saturday, September 19, by Calvary Commandery No. 16 and Naomi Shrine No. 5, Order of the White Shrine of Jerusalem.

Ruth Rodenburger, worthy high priestess of Naomi Shrine No. 5, and Willis Glidden, commander of Calvary Commandery No. 16, were in charge of the reception and welcomed many guests and members from the east. The temple was colorful with arrangements of yellow and white flowers among white emblems of the order.

Master of ceremonies was Sanford Selby, worshipful master of Klamath Lodge No. 77, who first invited Vida Phillips, wife of Elvin Phillips, to be escorted by Joe Lake to the east. Commander Willis Glidden welcomed her and presented her with an arm bouquet of red roses.
