Ottawa (AP) — Prime Minister John Diefenbaker and President Adolfo Lopez Mateos of Mexico held a 45-minute discussion Friday dealing mainly with trade. The President told newsmen he and Diefenbaker contemplate an expansion of Mexican - Canadian trade. Mexico's main import from Canada is paper. Canada's chief import from Mexico is cotton.

The President, speaking through an interpreter, said he invited Diefenbaker to visit Mexico. Diefenbaker replied that he would try to accept the invitation when he has time. Lopez Mateos also said Mexico and Canada plan to enlarge a scholarship program whereby students may study in each other's country.

Closed Circuit TV Will Unite Stockholders

NEW YORK (UPI) — General Mills, Inc., plans a unique stockholders' meeting to be held simultaneously in seven cities across the nation hooked together by closed circuit television.

Stockholders of the corporation in the New York City area will meet at noon (pst) on Thursday Oct. 29, at the Waldorf-Astoria. At the same time, groups in Boston meet at the Statler Hilton; and Buffalo, N.Y., at the Statler Hilton.

It will be 1 p.m. (pst) in Chicago and the General Mills shareholders of that area will meet at the Conrad Hilton while at Minneapolis, headquarters of the company, they will meet at the company's auditorium.

Two Pacific Coast cities—San Francisco and Los Angeles—will go into the same session at 1 p.m. (pst), the first at the St. Francis Hotel and the Los Angeles group at the Biltmore.

This series in one meeting is an innovation that replaces the regional meetings held individually in various cities over the years dating back to 1939.

Chairman of the board, G. S. Kennedy will open the 1959 meeting from New York. President Charles H. Bell will speak from Minneapolis.

The telecast will present reports on the company's business from the chief officers. It also will include a television visit to the new Betty Crocker kitchens in Minneapolis and to the company's flour mill in Buffalo, reportedly the largest flour mill in the world.

After showing of an animated film on the company's all-time record report for the fiscal year ended May 31, the meeting will be open for questions from stockholders at all of the seven cities hooked up by the television circuit and two-way audio contact.

This series of regional meetings hooked up into one meeting follows closely the annual meeting of the corporation which was held in Minneapolis on Aug. 18.

Last year, General Mills held regional meetings separately in Los Angeles, San Francisco, Chicago, Buffalo, Boston, New York, Washington and Minneapolis. Also it held simulated meetings at the University of Wisconsin at Madison, and at Dartmouth in Hanover, N. H.

The idea of taking meetings to university campuses was inaugurated in 1947 when education and industry teamed up for the first time in this manner at the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor, the company said.

The objective of these campus sessions, officials explained, is to contribute to student understanding of industry and its business procedures.

Martin Family Rites Scheduled

PORTLAND (AP) — A memorial service will be held at the Rose City Park Methodist Church here Sunday afternoon for the missing Ken Martin family.

Martin, his wife, and their three young daughters vanished last Dec. 7, after leaving their home in the family automobile for a trip up the Columbia River Gorge to pick Christmas greens.

Police believe the automobile plunged into the Columbia. The bodies of two of the daughters were found in the river last spring. But no trace has been found of Mr. and Mrs. Martin and their other daughter.

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
