Kidney Donor Recovered

PORTLAND (AP)—A girl who gave a kidney to her 12-year-old twin is back at her Dallas, Ore., home, recovered from the Oct. 9 surgery at the University of Oregon Medical School hospital here. A school spokesman said before the girl, Charlotte Hamilton, left Saturday that both she and her sister, Charlene, are in fine condition. Less than 20 such kidney transplants are on medical record. The spokesman said that the transplanted kidney functions normally and will do the work of two within four months. Charlene will undergo surgery again this week for removal of her own two kidneys, which have been damaged by chronic inflammatory Bright's Disease.

Physicians expect to be able to send Charlene home within three weeks.

Local J.C. Penney Store Plans '60 Charge Accounts

Fran Hales announced today that his store has been selected as one of 410 additional Penney stores which will have customer charge accounts in 1960. This new customer service is expected to start here during the month of April.

The store manager said the credit plan will be the newest type of charge account, called the Planned Payment Account.

This is a 30-day charge account which makes it possible for a customer to pay her account in full within 30 days of billing date without a service charge. This plan also provides an option for customers who wish to spread payments over a longer period. Each month a bill is received the customer can pay it in full, without service charge, or if desired pay a designated minimum amount and extend the balance over a longer period. A service charge of 1½ per cent is added to the balance after payment is credited. Minimum amounts vary from one-fourth to one-sixth of the total bill.

The Penney Time Payment Account is designed for higher-priced apparel with a unit price of at least \$49. For these accounts the minimum payment will be \$10 per month and the account may extend to a maximum of 10 months. Home furnishings items with a minimum unit price of \$30 may also be purchased on a Time Payment Account. For these accounts minimum payments will be \$5 and accounts may run to a maximum of 15 months.

Hales emphasized that the credit plan will in no way change the company's long-standing, low mark-up policy for customers who wish to continue to make their purchases on a cash-and-carry basis.

The number of Penney stores offering charge accounts in 1960 will total 600.

Exchange Slate Mulled

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The United States and Russia were reported near agreement today on a plan to extend and build up the cultural and scientific exchange program.

State Department sources said a team of four negotiators would go to Moscow shortly to put the finishing touches on the new program. The present two-year exchange expires Jan. 27, 1960. Officials said both the United States and Russia had advanced new proposals which considerably narrowed points of difference between the two nations.

As a result, they said, the new plan probably would provide for a greater variety of exchanges and involve more people than the expiring program.

The current program calls for the United States to send 1,733 persons to the Soviet Union under 129 separate projects. Russia would have sent 1,391 to the United States under 121 projects. Details of the new proposals were not made public.
