

White Sox Second Sacker Leads AP 1959 All-Star Team Voting

Senators To Stay This Year

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Washington Senators won't move to Minneapolis this year.

Club owner Calvin Griffith announced Monday night his decision to remain in the capital, where the Senators have been since 1961.

His reason: He found out that some American League club owners refused to go along with the move. It would only take three no votes to blackball the transfer.

Griffith did a tightrope act last year too about moving to Minneapolis. The Minnesota city has been trying to attract the Senators for several years, and has offered sizeable guarantees.

Griffith said he agreed with his advisors that the latest Minneapolis offer "is for the best interests of all stockholders" of the club. Thus he decided to be leaving the door open for another try next year to shift the franchise.

Minneapolis, Griffith said, offered a minimum net profit of \$430,000 a year for five years, a total of \$2,150,000. Last year Senators drew \$15,000 fans here this year. Griffith said the club lost money.

Griffith had Lawyer C. Leo DeOrsey review the Minneapolis offer. DeOrsey's recommendation was to either sell the club or, if he intended to remain in baseball, accept the Minneapolis bid with certain amendments.

Griffith said in a statement: "I. My stock is not for sale. 2. I have every intention to remain in baseball." He is the majority stockholder. DeOrsey himself reportedly wanted to buy the stock if Griffith sold out.

Bobby Neill 3-1 Underdog

LONDON (AP) — Bobby Neill has fought against long odds ever since he was left crippled and unconscious in a road crash nine years ago.

So the news that he's a 3-1 underdog in tonight's non title fight against world featherweight champion Dave Moore at Wembley Stadium doesn't perturb him one bit. Neill steps into the ring for the 10 - rounder as British featherweight champion.

"Doctors told me I would never fight again after that crash in 1950," the quiet Scott said. "I lay in a plaster cast for 18 months. "But I recovered and fought again."

Neill, 26, boxing with one leg shorter than the other by about three quarters of an inch because of an accident, is a hard hitter who tries to soften his opponent with two-fisted punching. He's won 26 of his 29 fights.

Moore, from Springfield, Ohio, and his manager, Willie Ketchum, have promised Neill a crack at the title if the Scotsman pulls off an upset.

Bandits Prevail

LSU Tigers Maintain Top Collegiate Rank

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS — Powerful Louisiana State held its so far unshakable position atop the nation's college football teams today for the 14th consecutive week.

The Bengals from the Bayou compiled a whopping 1,238 votes from the sports writers and sportscasters voting in the weekly Associated Press poll. LSU has been in first place since early last season.

Coach Paul Dietzel's club drew 68 of the 144 first place votes.

Webfoots Seeking Bowl Bid

EUGENE (AP) — Unbeaten Oregon, ranked No. 11 in this week's Associated Press poll, hopes to advance farther Saturday toward its second Rose Bowl journey in three years.

But Oregon and its veteran coach, Len Casanova, are preparing for what they believe will be their toughest foe yet this year.

That is Washington, which was undefeated until it lost in the closing minutes to fifth-ranked Southern California, 22-15, last weekend.

"What worries me," said Casanova, "is their depth and size, two things we don't have. Our major problem, in addition to the first two, is keeping our offense moving against the strongest defense we'll see all season."

There's something other than the physical problem, too. Oregon has managed to defeat Washington only three times in the past 12 years. Even its 1957 Rose Bowl team lost to the Huskies, a lowly club that season.

Oregon received its high national ranking after ending Air Force's unbeaten 14-game record with a 20-3 victory last Saturday.

Air Force coach Ben Martin went back to Colorado talking sadly about his team's inability to cope with Oregon's backfield speed and versatility.

He had particular praise for Dave Grosz, 6-2, 196-pound quarterback who is as dangerous a runner as a passer.

Grosz, no fancy runner, surprised Air Force with a 63-yard scamper on a quick opener. Only a desperation tackle kept him from going all the way.

He also completed a 50-yard scoring pass.

6 spot, which represented a considerable jump from the No. 9 ranking the Salem team had last week.

North Salem got its boost after beating Roseburg 25-7. Last week's sixth-ranked team, Beaverton, sank to eighth after being tied 7-7 by Central Catholic.

St. Helens also rose a notch, following its 32-13 triumph over Newberg, and replaced South Eugene in seventh place. South Eugene, despite a 7-0 win over Springfield, dropped out of the top 10.

The first new face was North Bend, in ninth following a 39-12 triumph over North Eugene. South Salem also made the top ten, taking 10th place after dropping Lebanon 45-10.

Last week's 10th place team was Grants Pass, which dropped out of sight this week after being downed by Ashland 7-0.

LA Bums Entirely By-Passed

NEW YORK (AP) — Nellie Fox, peppery second baseman of the American League White Sox, received the most votes for the 1959 Associated Press major league all-star team named today.

Fox was selected on 165 of the 173 ballots cast by members of the Baseball Writers Assn. of America participating in the annual poll. Two White Sox teammates, catcher Sherm Lollar and right-handed pitcher Early Wynn, also were voted on the team.

Fox was one of four holdovers from last season's all-star squad. The other repeaters were short-

almost as many as the other schools combined. The points are tallied on the basis of 10 for first place, 9 for second and so on down the line.

Louisiana State barely beat Kentucky, 9-0, last Saturday, but the voters still gave the Tigers a comfortable margin over second-place Northwestern, which collected 1,171 points.

The Wildcats turned back Michigan, 20-7, last Saturday. They managed 23 first place votes in holding down their second place spot.

Texas completed the big three—the same order as a week ago—by drawing 1,010 points. The Longhorns, who edged Arkansas, 13-12, in their last effort, were the only other team to crack the 1,000 mark.

Rounding out the top 10 were Mississippi, Southern California, Syracuse, Auburn, Penn State, Georgia Tech and Arkansas in that order.

Syracuse Boasting Sizeable 7

By OSCAR FRALEY — SYRACUSE is out today to ride a nickname up the gridiron glory road in the manner successful from the days of the "Four Horsemen" to the "Chinese Bandits."

There is a theory that the modern college athlete is a blasé young man who refuses to be driven to inspired heights by the "corny" melodramatics of the "pep talk." Yet, somehow, an appealing nickname gets them to "put out" on their own.

The "Four Horsemen" of Notre Dame are even greater in memory, instead of remembered merely as another fine Irish team, because of the tag which the late Grantland Rice hung on them. And down at LSU, Paul Dietzel transformed an ordinary defensive unit into a battling band which fought with the ferocity of the "Chinese Bandits."

The "Sizeable Seven" — The designation isn't as phonetic or colorful, but Syracuse is shooting for the football heights with a massive and muscular line which has become known as the "Sizeable Seven."

They are sizeable, averaging 6 feet, 3 inches and 216 pounds—an average dissipated considerably by one "midget" of a mere 191 pounds. But through the tackle - to - tackle middle the weights read like this: 228, 202, 230, 230 and 226.

The remainder of the team included first baseman Orlando Cepeda of San Francisco, third baseman Eddie Mathews of Milwaukee, Detroit Tigers and left-handed pitcher Johnny Antonelli of San Francisco.

Aaron was the second highest vote-getter with 163 followed by Wynn with 125. Then came Mathews with 119, Mays 118, Lollar 112, Banks, 88, Antonelli 86 and Cepeda and Kaline 72 each.

The balloting for shortstop produced the closest race. Banks drew three more votes than Luis Aparicio of the White Sox, who polled 85.

The most one-sided voting was for second base. Johnny Temple of the Cincinnati Reds was named on four ballots and trailed Fox by 161.

Those besides Aparicio and Temple selected to the second team were: First base — Frank Robinson, Reds (38); third base — Ken Boyer, Cardinals (24); outfield — Harvey Kuenn, Tigers (44); Rocky Colavito, Indians (40); and Vada Pinson, Reds (12); catcher — Del Crandall, Braves (28); left-handed pitcher — Warren Spahn, Braves (78) and right-handed pitcher — Sam Jones, Giants (28).

Portland Heavy Gets Suspension

PORTLAND (AP) — Willie Richardson, a young Portland heavyweight, was suspended by the Portland Boxing Commission Monday for "conduct unbecoming a boxer."

Benny Harris said the commission decided on the suspension after Richardson was arrested on a charge of assault and battery.

The charge stemmed from a fight in front of a Portland high school recently in which a policeman was knocked down.

NFL Eager For Expansion; Will Change By-Laws To Suit

CHICAGO (AP) — The National Football League is so eager to expand by 1960 that it will even change its by-laws to suit the purpose.

George Halas, owner-coach of the Chicago Bears and chairman of the NFL expansion committee, Monday announced plans to boost the league from 12 to 14 teams by next fall.

"We know we can't get a unanimous vote to expand in our January meeting," said Halas. "Therefore, we will change the by-laws that stipulate this and we know we can get the 10 required votes to do this."

Holding back unanimous approval for expansion is George Preston Marshall, owner of the Washington Redskins. Marshall said in Washington "expansion is impractical, hasty, and definitely would hurt college football."

Halas said that he and Acting Commissioner Austin H. Guseh held separate polls and learned that 11 of 12 owners are in favor of immediate expansion. Halas said the owners also favored considering expansion to 16 teams by 1961 or 1962.

Dallas and Houston are the cities being wooed. Houston, however, must come up with a new stadium. If not, the franchise will go elsewhere, probably to Minneapolis-St. Paul.

Halas said the plans for expansion are "a culmination of five years of planning."

"Our intent," said Halas, "was to expand when competition among our clubs began to equalize itself on an extremely high level. We now have reached that plateau."

"Conditions for expansion never will be more ideal," the pro football pioneer continued, "every team in the league is strong. There now is a sufficient backlog of experienced players available for the team in the new franchise city."

Halas went so far as to introduce the prospective owners of the proposed Dallas franchise at his press conference Monday. They are oilman Clint Murchison Jr. and attorney Bedford Wynne. Halas also revealed the man behind Houston interests is Craig Cullinan who deals in oil investments.

Murchison said he felt Dallas is ready for pro football after having had years of it on television. In 1952, the Dallas Texans operated for one year and folded after losing something like \$200,000.

The NFL's plan to move immediately into Dallas and Houston clash with those of the American Football League which plans to begin operations next year with the two Texas cities as key bases.

Lamar Hunt, Dallas oilman who is organizing the new league, said the NFL's plans do not "change our plans in the least."

In a report from Dallas, Hunt said "the NFL is making a serious mistake in bringing a club here—the competition is likely to cause both to lose money whereas one club here could operate profitably."

Hunt called the NFL's proposed move "sabotage."

"If you don't think it is sabotage," he said.

Techmen Warned By Coach

"We're all happy about beating SOC—and we're all really anxious for the OCE game—but let's not forget that we've got a big one coming up this weekend and we've got to get by them first," said Oregon Tech grid coach Rex Hunsaker to an exuberant group of Owl Hoots that met Monday night.

Hunsaker was referring to the McClellan Air Force "Jets," a helty service eleven that comes to town Saturday night boasting a 5-0, 1-loss record to date. The Jets and the Owls tangle on Modoc Field Saturday night in a non-conference football game.

Despite the note of warning, the "Hoots" welcomed warmly a quartet of Owl drinkers honored as guests for the dinner. Quarterback Roy Johnson, end Allan Leach, linebacker Earl Kessler and defensive end Norm Hooper were introduced and gave brief talks.

The players echoed Hooper's words. "This OCE has got to go—down."

Hunsaker complimented his assistants, George Miller and Jim Cordial for the fine job they have done with the Owl. Miller was especially praised for the manner in which he solved the Red Raider offense last week, and was credited both by coaches and players for the Owl win.

Owl Hoot President Estin Kiger noted that in the future an attempt would be made to seat all Owl rooters in one section at all games away from home.

Hunsaker summed up the affair by saying of the coming OCE clash, "Don't sell McArthur (OCE coach) short. He's the only man in the conference that can lose six games in a season and still be pointing for one—namely us. But before we get to OCE we have to beat this McClellan bunch and that isn't going to be easy."

The battle at Convention Hall here Monday night was sensational to say the least. The two bitter North Philadelphia rivals slammed each other with every punch in the book, a disappointing crowd of 4,930—a gross gate of \$23,340 — screamed with delight from the opening bell.

PHILADELPHIA (A) — Charley Scott, a Johnny-come-lately to welterweight ranking, is ready for champion Don Jordan, but the big question is whether Jordan is ready for Scott.

The 23-year-old Scott, who was ready to give up boxing a year or so ago, earned a shot at the title here Monday night with a technical knockout victory over Garnet "Sugar" Hart. Scott got the job done in 28 seconds of the ninth round of a scheduled 12 rounder.

Promoter Herman Taylor twice has telegraphed a \$75,000 offer to Don Neseb, manager of Jordan. He has yet to get an answer. Al Klein, of the Pennsylvania State Athletic Commission, says he'll plead Scott's case before a Nov. 7 meeting of the National Boxing Association's executive committee.

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Tornado Still No. 1, Pelicans Get Votes

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS — There were a couple of new faces today in the Associated Press Poll of Oregon prep football teams, but an old favorite—Medford—still was at the top of the select ten.

After crushing Klamath Falls 44-7 over the weekend, Medford picked up additional strength from the 14 sports reporters and sportscasters participating in the season's sixth poll.

Medford accumulated 13 first place votes, and a point total of 139.

Last week, Medford had a bulge of 12 points over second-place Jefferson of Portland.

Jefferson today was second again, but further back with 120 points. Jefferson got the other first-place vote after another victory, 26-7 over Benson, in Portland League play.

There was a new third-place team today—Pendleton. The Eastern Oregon squad got 107 points, and swapped places with Marshfield, third last week, but in fourth today with 94 points.

Like Medford and Jefferson, Pendleton is undefeated after six games this season. Pendleton's latest triumph: 20-7 over Redmond.

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
