Ike Orders Cheese Probe

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower ordered an investigation Tuesday to determine whether or not additional cheese of certain kinds could be imported without material impact on the dairy price support program.

The inquiry will be conducted by the Tariff Commission. The types of cheese are chiefly Dutch and Italian.

In a letter to Joseph E. Talbot, the commission chairman, Eisenhower noted that present import quotas on these types of cheese were fixed in 1953.

"There has been some improvement in the dairy market situation both in the United States and abroad," Eisenhower wrote.

"Surplus stocks of cheese held by the Commodity Credit Corp. have moderated and foreign prices have risen so that the gap between prices of foreign and domestic cheeses has narrowed."

The President added he was requesting a Tariff Commission investigation in the light of these changed circumstances.

The cheeses involved are Edam and Gouda, and Italian type cheeses made from cow's milk in original leaves.

Eisenhower asked the commission to report to him as soon as practicable.

Roman Catholic Cleric Has Kind Words For Peron

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, (AP) — The Most Rev. Antonio Plaza, Roman Catholic archbishop of La Plata, has raised a political flurry in Argentina with kind words for exiled Juan D. Peron.

He says the ex-dictator, ousted four years ago, should be allowed to return to Argentina from his refuge in the Dominican Republic.

"The church cannot want any of its sons to suffer, and it is to be supposed that an Argentine exiled from his country lives in suffering," he said in a broadcast.

There is a report from a labor leader—never denied by the archbishop or his assistants—that Msgr. Plaza once described Peron as "the second son of God."

These and similar remarks in the last three weeks have made the stocky, 49-year-old archbishop a target of criticism by lay politicians and a subject of concern in Argentine hierarchy of the church.

The armed forces have declared that no attempt to whitewash "the fugitive tyrant" will be allowed.

Antonio Cardinal Caggiano, archbishop of Buenos Aires, said the problem is out of his province, that it could be dealt with only by Pope John XXIII. But the cardinal has discouraged any idea that Peron may return.

Msgr. Plaza started the argument when he launched a series of meetings with labor representatives in and around La Plata, capital of Buenos Aires province. Portraits of Peron and his late wife Eva were reported hoisted in some of these meetings.

The archbishop said he is only trying to attract a large part of the dissatisfied labor masses—once the supporters of Peron's dictatorship—into a sound knowledge of the church's social doctrine and prevent them from turning to communism.

Catholic leaders were in the forefront of the revolution that deposed Peron in September 1955. The arrests of several priests and nuns had preceded the incendiary campaign against the churches.

Msgr. Plaza was outspoken in that period against Peron. Commenting in 1956 on an Argentine

polio epidemic, he said it was "God's scourge on a people that allowed the Peronist movement to survive for so many years."
