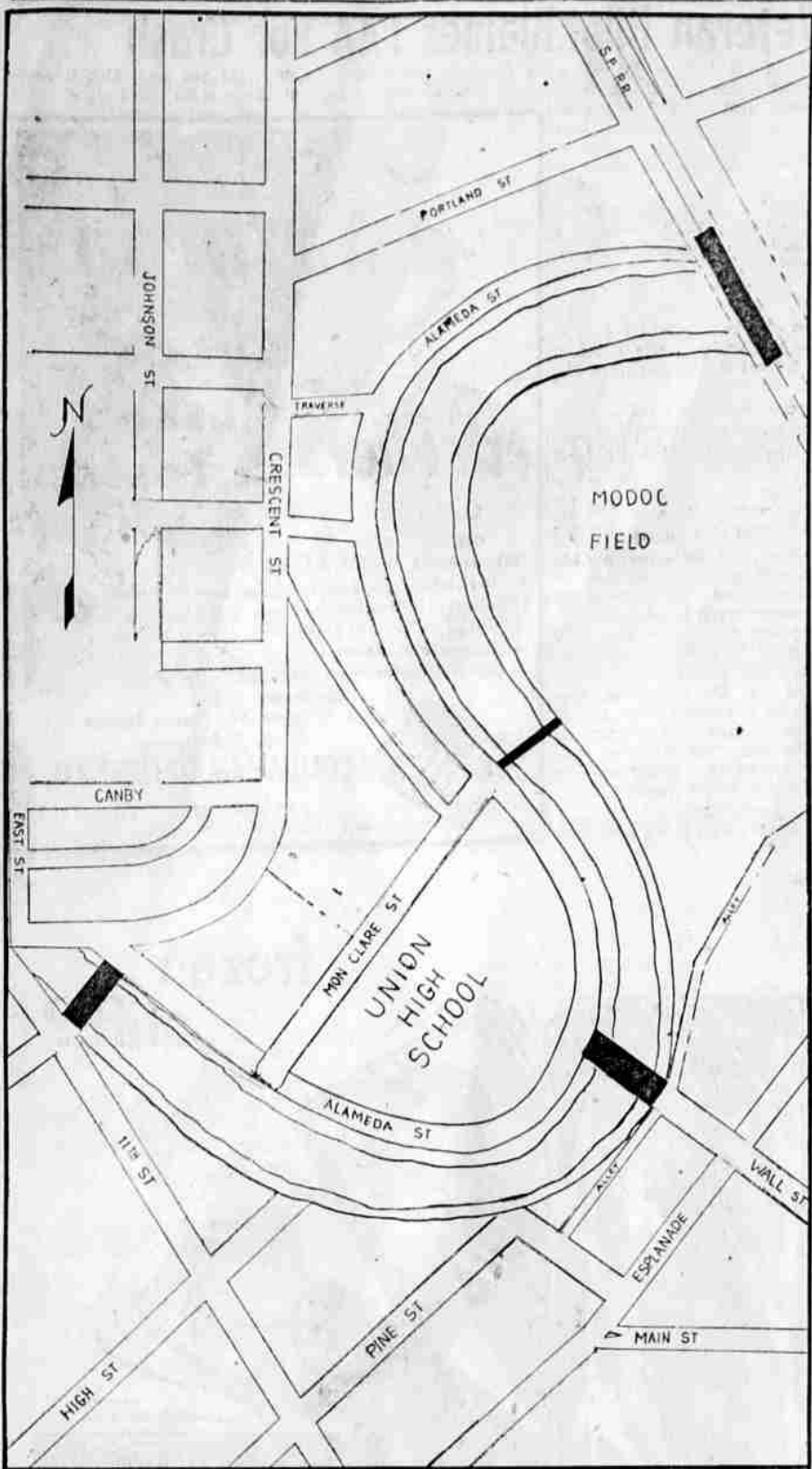

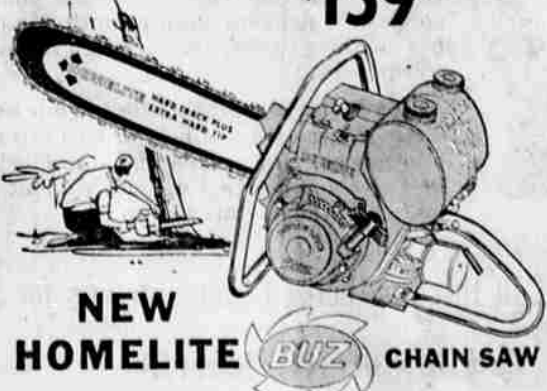

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Aid Figures Given By SA

In addition to the many services offered here daily to those who seek help from the Salvation Army, Capt. Lewis M. Kendall, has released figures on the assistance given during the big Williamson River fire north of Chiloquin in September.

Food sent to the firefighters included 692 sandwiches, 15 gallons of coffee, 36 dozen doughnuts, five gallons of split pea soup. Twelve volunteer workers gave 28 hours of time on the canteen fire lines. Donations included three, 10 gallon milk cans from the Crater Lake Dairy, and five gallons of soup from the Pastime Cafe. Army expenditures on the fire totaled \$86.50.

As a result of the disaster service at the fire, a disaster unit was organized among army persons to be available at future times. The work also gave an idea, Captain Kendall said of the time needed to get a canteen into field action. The fire put the volunteer crew in the field in two hours.

Total cost of expenses for September which included the use of cash for many welfare purposes totaled \$308.50.

Thief Faces Rape Charge

TROY, Mo. (AP)—A car thief is scheduled to go on trial in Circuit Court Dec. 14 on a charge of raping an 8-year-old girl. He is accused of luring the girl away from a church picnic Sunday with a promise of candy.

Ronald Lee Wolfe of Mobile, Ala., waived preliminary hearing in magistrate's court Monday and was ordered held without bond.

Lincoln County Sheriff Melvin Starkey said Wolfe signed a statement admitting the attack on the girl. Wolfe was released from the Federal Penitentiary at Atlanta, Ga., last Thursday after serving 3 1/2 years for car theft.

"Irish coffee is a mixture of coffee and whisky," Magistrate Comerford looked pleased and said "not guilty."

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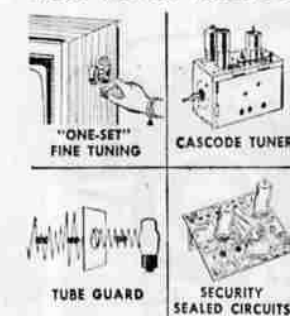
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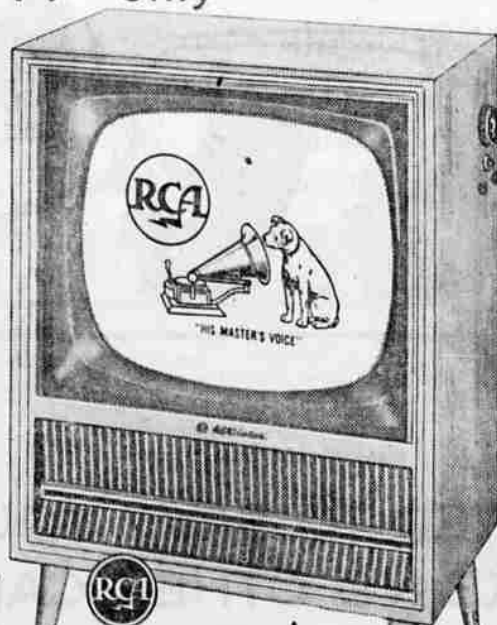
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
