



HARD-RUNNING ANTLER — Bonanza halfback Jim O'Conner, one of the County B League's smallest backs at 150 pounds, sparked his team to a 35-20 triumph of Tulelake in a league test Thursday night. The fiery O'Conner, a senior, broke loose for several spectacular ground gains despite a bad ankle.

Ryan, a senior transfer from Twin Falls, Idaho, averages 30 carries per game and is one of the county's leading yardage gainers.



MOST VALUABLE HONKER — Tulelake quarterback Bob Osborne gave his all for the Honkers in their 35-20 defeat by Bonanza Thursday night, but had to leave the game in the fourth quarter when he reinjured an already ailing ankle. Osborne shifted to the QB slot from end in mid-season when injuries to key backfield men prompted the move.

Dorris Athletes See First Written Code

DORRIS—The first written code for athletes in the history of Butte Valley High School has been instituted in Dorris by Principal Ken Cleland and Coach Dick Gaskell.

Copies of the full code, covering everything from scholastic requirements to standards of personal conduct were sent to parents of all players. Each athlete has signed the copy of the code to signify that he has read it and will abide by its terms.

Each athlete must maintain a C average for all subjects carried, and may not be failing in any subject.

An eligibility report must be filled out the day before each game.

Athletes must be in school on the day before and the day of a game. Permission to play when absent on either of these days is subject to the approval of the coach.

The coach must be notified in advance of any absence from practices and the only approved type of absence will be sudden illness, doctor or dentist appointments, illness or death in the family.

An unexcused absence from practice will bar the athlete from playing in any game or games that week. Two unexcused absences during a season will result in automatic dismissal from the team.

Training rules provide for no smoking or drinking during the year at any time on pain of immediate dismissal from all athletics for the school year. The decision will be made by the coach and athletic director on the basis of any reasonable evidence.

The code calls for athletes to be off the streets by 10 p.m. on each school night and any Friday previous to a game, with a weekend curfew of 12 midnight.

Principal Cleland says the most delicate and the hardest provision to enforce is the ban on "displays of affection" (holding hands) by any athlete toward girls during the season.

Any display of unsportsmanlike conduct in practice, or in a game, toward teammates, other players or officials will be cause for immediate dismissal from the team.

Athletes must do their best, at practices and during games, to win

in a sportsmanlike manner and as a member of the team, not as an individual.

Principal Cleland reports that athletes have, by signing the code, agreed to accept any judgments passed on them for violations and says so far there have been very few infractions of the code, and those minor, which has been in effect since the beginning of the school term.

Greater Ore. Loop Nearing Season End

With one "conference" weekend remaining on the 1959 schedule, three of the Western Division schools in the Greater Oregon Conference step outside the league this Friday for action slated at Lakeview, Heppner and Burns.

The league - leading Lakeview Honkers play host to the stubborn Alturas Modoc Braves Friday at 8 p.m. in Lakeview. John Day treks to Heppner and Burns welcomes the Melba (Idaho) eleven.

Madras has an open date.

Coach Howard Hopper's Lakeview eleven, with a 3-3 season record, has won both its league starts. To date they hold a 19-6 win over Henley, a 7-0 victory over John Day and a 27-0 conquest of Burns. The losses were 44-7 to Susanville, 36-6 to Redmond and 30-6 to Susanville. Each of the defeats came at the hands of much larger schools.

The Alturas eleven also bowed to Susanville by a 13-6 score.

Following the Alturas contest, the Honkers have one more league game remaining, a test with the White Buffalos at Madras on October 30.

A won or a tie with the Madras club will automatically give Lakeview a league championship. A defeat will plunge the division into a three-way tie for the top spot.

Should this happen the division representative in the sub playoff will be decided by the toss of a coin. In any event the winning Western Division school will host the playoff.

The Honkers enter the Alturas game short the services of regular tackle Berton Daron who was injured against Susanville. The lineup includes quarterback Mike Tooke, halfbacks Mike Deming and Jerry Parkinson, fullback Dennis Barry, ends Galvin Nelson, Bruce Merrill or Frank Eganhoff, tackles Jim Stewart and Don McPherson, guards Russ Harlan and Gary Reynolds and center Gary Scott.
