

Steel Men Views Told

MORRISVILLE, Pa. (AP)—Take it from bartender Tom Kane, most of his steelworker customers aren't too happy about the prospects of going back to work under Taft-Hartley injunction. And they're 100 per cent behind United Steelworkers President David J. McDonald.

"It's like a hammer over their head," Kane declared today. "They're eager to go back to work but not under the Taft-Hartley law. They'll follow their leader, McDonald, and if he says go back to work they'll go back."

Kane said that about 80 per cent of his customers at the Morrisville Gardens are steelworkers from the Fairless Hills Plant of U.S. Steel Corp. here. The long strike has idled some 7,000 employees of the plant.

One of the customers, Harry Lykens, 33, said that he felt very bitter about the situation.

"The steelworkers that I've talked to," Lykens said, "are opposed to the Taft-Hartley injunction. And they're very bitter. Even the ones with eight or nine kids who are really hurting."

"The people who never have seen the inside of a steel plant and the conditions we work under don't know how bitter the steelworkers are today."

"We sacrificed this much and now it turns out this way with nothing solved. If industry defeats labor we're on our way back to the dark ages."

"I'll bet you ten dollars to a nickel we'll be out on strike again at the end of the 90-day period if the Taft-Hartley is invoked. That's not going to help the country."

Campaign Scheduled

Medford Jones, evangelist in Christian churches, will conduct an evangelistic campaign in the First Christian Church. He will fill the church pulpit Sunday, October 25, to open a series of meetings planned for during the last four months.

Talk Given By Cleric

MOUNT SHASTA — The Rev. James G. Kennedy, presiding minister of the Mount Shasta Congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses, spoke out today in favor of good organization as a must in religion as it is in secular activities.

These remarks were in reference to the coming circuit convention of the Witnesses to be held in the Mount Shasta Armory November 6-8. All the conventions, including this one, will be handled by volunteer workers who belong to the organization. "To arrange all details, including lodging, and meals for more than 1,000 people each day is no small task," Reverend Kennedy stated.

The minister stated that while the social side of the seminar was beneficial, and rewarding, the main object was to better prepare each one to carry his message to all the people, as is his obligation.

The Mount Shasta meeting will be carried out exactly as was the one in New York in 1958 when more than a quarter million people convened in Yankee Stadium, and the Polo Grounds. This is an all-time attendance record.

Attendance, spokesmen for the organization state, will in no way compare to the New York meeting, but the teachings will be identical. Convention highlights are a color film at 7 p.m., November 7; and the lecture "When will the divine will be done on earth?" on Sunday at 3 p.m.

All meetings are open to the public. No admissions. No collections.

Experts Eye Using Puppets As Workers In Outer Space

WASHINGTON (UPI)—It looks as though the space scientists, eminent doctors all, are trying to do the space working man out of a job.

If they succeed, it will be a case of technological unemployment claiming a victim before the victim ever had a chance to get on the payroll.

Dr. Fred L. Whipple, director of the Smithsonian Institution's Astrophysical Observatory at Cambridge, Mass., says "telepuppets" will build the first space platforms from which to launch expeditions to the moon and planets.

As described by Whipple in a report to the Office of Naval Research, telepuppets are remotely

controlled robots, with television eyes.

They would bear little resemblance to the popular image of a pressure-suited construction worker, with a couple of siphon bottles on his back, getting about the job of assembling platforms in space.

Whipple rejects the idea of human workers in space on the ground that their suits would be awkward, inefficient, and "probably very dangerous." All it would take to end such a worker's career would be one little meteor traveling fast enough to puncture his pressure suit.

The Russians also appear to prefer mechanical to flesh and blood men for space labor. A Soviet scientific article recently cir-

culated here suggests that moon robots controlled from the earth stations will be built by tank-like by radio.

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Flu Cases Hit Record

PORTLAND (AP) — The state Board of Health said Tuesday that Oregon had more recorded cases of influenza in the first nine months of this year than in any year of its history.

When the most recent statistics were compiled Oct. 3, the total was 51,200 cases. The previous high was 46,290 two years ago.

In the same nine-month period of 1958, there were only 7,699.

Dr. Gordon Edwards, head of the board's preventive medical service division, said no widespread epidemic is expected. But he warned that localized outbreaks may come in the next several months, with the Asian type of flu the most common.

Dr. Edwards said certain groups should get inoculations of anti-flu vaccine. He recommended shots for:

Pregnant women, the chronically ill over 35, persons with heart or lung conditions.

Persons charged with caring for the sick, and those in essential public services.

The doctors said there is one type of vaccine that gives 70 per cent protection against the major flu strains, including the Asian.
