Installation Of Pastor Set By Church

On Sunday evening, October 25, at 7:30 p.m., the Rev. Laing W. Sibbet will be officially installed as pastor of the Peace Memorial Presbyterian Church. Elder William Kurtz, moderator of the Presbytery of Southwest Oregon, will preside. The women's association and wives of the church elders will give a reception in honor of the new minister and his wife following the ceremonies.

The Rev. Andrew Jarvis, pastor of Mt. Laki Presbyterian Church, will preach the installation sermon. The Rev. Robert C. Groves, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, Klamath Falls, will give the charge to the pastor. The Rev. Frank L. Raney of the Presbytery of the Redwoods, will give the charge to the people.

Others participating in the service, will be the Rev. Wilbur Brumbaugh, pastor of the Church of the Brethren, and secretary of the Klamath Falls Ministerial Association; the Rev. Wayne Wattman, pastor of the Tulake Presbyterian Church; Elder Ross Ragland, president of the Klamath Council of Churches; and Elder Ewing Ferguson, clerk of session at Peace Memorial Church.

In addition his congregation built, almost entirely by volunteer labor, a new sanctuary of pumice brick, and remodeled their old

Blonde Had Later Dates With Rape Case Defendant

A 22-year-old blonde testified for almost an hour in district court Thursday to support a rape charge she had brought against a casual acquaintance.

The testimony was offered by Sharon Hipke, 1830 Fremont Street, who maintains she was raped last May 17 by William Seaberry, 23, 1606 Nimitz Street, after the two had left a dance together. Miss Hipke said she had met Seaberry at the dance and that he had forced her to submit to him on a dirt road off Washburn Way. But she admitted she had at least two subsequent dates with him.

The testimony developed at a preliminary hearing on the charge, a felony. At the close of the hearing, Judge D. E. Van Vactor ruled that Seaberry should be held for the county grand jury, scheduled to meet October 29.

Miss Hipke, a quiet, neat young woman who retained her composure throughout the unusually long hearing, was the only witness.

She said she and two girl friends had gone to a dance at the Red Barn near Dorris May 16. There she met Seaberry, danced with him, and accepted his offer of a ride home. Seaberry had another couple in the car and promised to take her home first, she said.

Instead, she said in answer to questions by District Attorney Arthur Beddoe, Seaberry delivered the other couple and took her down Washburn Way. There, despite her protests, he parked on a dirt road and "got fresh." She said she grabbed his throat in an effort to resist his advances, but he opened the car door behind her, pushed her on the ground, and assaulted her.

She said he then took her home, but persisted in calling her. She went out with him three nights later, and again the next Sunday, she said, but Seaberry did not force his attentions on her again.

Beddoe, Defense Attorney P. K. Puckett, and Judge Van Vactor each questioned Miss Hipke why she dated Seaberry again. She said, "I was afraid he'd start talking and ruin my name and embarrass my parents."

She said she confirmed earlier this month that she was five-months pregnant. It was shortly afterward that she brought her complaint to the district attorney.

Beddoe said the case was the first rape case brought to prosecution since he has been in office. Seaberry was returned to the county jail in lieu of \$5,000 bond.

Jay M. Wauchope, 77, resident of Klamath Falls from 1932 to 1948, died in a Longview, Washington, nursing home October 21. He had been in failing health for several years.
