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# Plans, Zoning Interest Men At Convention

**CHILOQUIN** — Two Chiloquin city officials have returned from attending the annual League of Oregon Cities Convention which was held early this week in Portland. Making the trip were **Lloyd Peters**, city recorder, and **A. N. Starkey**, councilman.

Some of the special sections the men visited were the planning and zoning section which gave particular emphasis this year to the problems of trailer houses: small city problems which dealt with such items as water and sewer lines, paving streets, taxes and assessments. Other divisions visited were the city finance officers' meeting, community development and municipal judges' section.

Peters reports that the judges' section dealt with new uniform trial tickets, conduct of jury trials, and jury payments. One of these new ordinances has already been put into effect, the others will probably be voted in the near future.

Now if a defendant wants a jury trial in Chiloquin, he must post \$50. If he is acquitted, his money is returned.

One of the new ordinances adopted by some Oregon towns allows a six-man jury to return a verdict of five to one, rather than insisting on unanimous agreement.

# Bend Possible Site For Scout Encampment

# Three Council Posts On Slate In Chiloquin

**CHILOQUIN** — November 3 will be the date for the Chiloquin city election when three persons will be chosen to fill two-year terms on the city council.

Lloyd Peters, city recorder, lists the six names that will be on the ballot as follows: Bert Albert, Forrest Freid, Lester Hoback, Mrs. Leonard Norris, Luther Sherier and Mrs. Bill Wampler. Hoback and Mrs. Wampler are incumbents, the other councilman whose term is expiring is Warren Lough.

Election will be held from 8 a.m. until 8 p.m. at the city hall with Mrs. Walter Zimmerman as chairman of the election board and Mrs. Dwight Kircher, Mrs. Joseph Adamo, and Mrs. Roy Deffenbacher as clerks.

Nominees for city office are usually chosen at a city caucus, but the scheduled one this year failed to draw a quorum as it was planned for the time when the Williamson River forest fire was raging just north of town.

Petitions had to be circulated around town to get the names of the nominees placed on this year's ballot. There will be no other items on the ballot.

# Dozen Nations To Continue Antarctic Scientific Study

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The United States, the Soviet Union and 10 other nations have agreed that the scientific cooperation they began in the Antarctic more than two years ago should be continued under a proposed new treaty.

The agreement was announced in a communique issued Friday night by the 12-nation Conference on Antarctica. The conference opened Oct. 15 and the communique said that "satisfactory progress is being made."

The overall objective of the meeting is to produce a treaty which would commit all the participating countries to use the frozen wasteland around the South Pole for peaceful and scientific purposes and to avoid friction caused by pressing rival territorial claims.

Last Tuesday the conference announced it was agreed Antarctica should be used only for peaceful purposes and all military activity there should be prohibited.

Friday night's agreement on scientific cooperation means a second hurdle passed.

But at least one more big obstacle is in the way. This is the drafting of a provision by which all 12 countries would agree that pending territorial claims would be put into a "deep freeze," as President Eisenhower once expressed it.

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# Doctor Wins Suit, Loses His License

**PORTLAND (AP)** — A Prineville physician who recently won out in a \$203,814 damage suit against him Friday had his license revoked.

The state Board of Medical Examiners revoked Dr. Norman D. Coleman's license for "unprofessional and dishonorable conduct."

Mrs. Alton Mitchell, 25, had charged in a suit against the doctor that he acted negligently and carelessly in attempting to give her psychiatric help.

The board specified that the license was not revoked for malpractice, a charge in the suit by Mrs. Mitchell.

Mrs. Mitchell also alleged that Dr. Coleman, knowing she was mentally ill, assaulted and battered her by engaging in illicit sexual intercourse with her.

Dr. George H. Lage, board president, said a formal hearing on the charges against the 37-year-old physician was held at the July meeting.

"Testimony presented at that hearing made further investigation and consideration necessary. . . a statement by the board said.

"The report of the interim investigation was made to the board on the first day of its October meeting and after due consideration the board revoked Dr. Coleman's license."

Board Secretary Howard Bobbitt testified at Dr. Coleman's trial that Coleman had admitted in writing and orally to illicit sexual relations with Mrs. Mitchell.

"Malpractice," the board statement said, "may be a cause for a civil action, which is available to any person who believes that he has been treated negligently by a physician."

"The charge of unprofessional and dishonorable conduct is based upon a violation of the statutes of the state of Oregon and, while it may involve negligence on the part of the physician, it may also involve acts which require proof of different facts in order to substantiate the charge."

**FORCED AUTHORSHIP**  
JERSEY CITY, N.J. (UPI)—Juvenile Judge John J. Grossi Thursday threw a book at a teenager convicted of driving a motorcycle without a license.

Grossi ordered the 16-year-old youth to pay a \$25 fine and write a 1,500 word essay on the meaning of motor vehicle laws.

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
