PARTY CIRCLES

CHICAGO (UPI)—Circled water-stained table tops—the usual "day-after" evidence of partying—can be easily avoided. All you have to do is rub the surface of your table with a good grade cleaning wax before the party begins. The best kind is a wax made especially for hardwood floors.

Put these to use, and one has a fine table—a tribute to ancestors or one's own good taste. Imaginative table settings serve as prototypes for gracious entertaining in the home, and with that in mind Interior Design Magazine corralled 12 table settings designed by members of the New York chapter of the American Institute of Decorators and put them on display at the National Design Center to illustrate what could happen if one embarked on a festive table setting.

HIGH PROTEIN SALAD

NEW YORK (UPI)—Cream pickle eggs make a high-protein salad. For six servings, halve six hard-cooked eggs and remove yolks. Combine yolks with 1 1/2 cup of sweet pickle relish, drained, one cup of sour cream, and salt and pepper to taste. Mix well. Fill egg whites with yolk mixture, sprinkle with paprika and serve on a bed of lettuce.

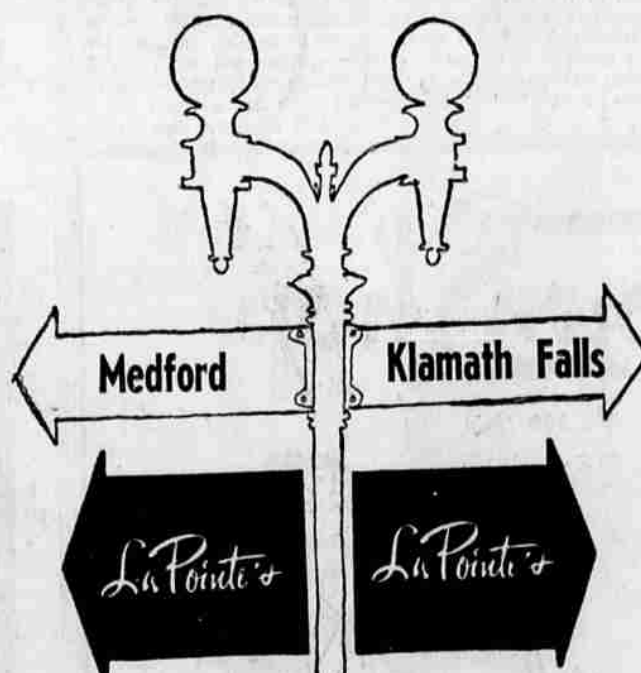
