Morse Backs Adlai As Chief

PORTLAND (AP)—Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore) may be a presidential candidate in more than one state.

Morse said this himself Sunday, adding that his name would be on the ballot only over his protest.

Morse has filed a statement intended to keep the secretary of state from putting his name on the Oregon ballot, but it could get on the ballot anyway if a nominating petition is filed with 1,000 signatures.

Such a petition is being circulated. Morse said that if it is filed, he will decide then whether to campaign for votes.

He added that his personal preference for the Democratic nomination is Adlai Stevenson. He said "I will campaign for him if he is nominated."

International Monetary Fund Pressures Europe, Japan

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Japan and Western Europe came under new pressure today to quit discriminating against American exports and help the United States check the outflow of its gold and dollars.

The pressure came from the International Monetary Fund. It said in a formal statement Sunday that other countries should "lift restrictions on dollar imports with all feasible speed."

The fund policy declaration followed concerted U.S. criticism of countries which have not yet dropped post-war curbs on their citizens' purchases of goods which must be paid for with dollars.

A rise in U.S. exports would bring back to this country some of the billions of dollars paid out each year for imports, foreign aid and overseas investment by business. An excess of these outpayments over receipt is called a deficit in the U.S. balance of international payments.

U.S. officials have launched a broad attack on the problem. One thrust is criticism of "dollar discrimination."

Only last week the government made a major revision in its foreign economic aid program. It decreed that loans to other countries must normally be spent in this country, not in other nations.

This, too, is expected to bring home many of the millions of dollars the government pours in to foreign aid each year. Since the end of World War II, the United States has loaned and given away about 67 billion dollars of economic and military aid. Still other efforts include pres-

ures—public and diplomatic—to the burden of helping less developed nations bolster production and living standards.
