

Farm Group Plans Meet

Lawrence J. Horton, Klamath Falls, president, board of directors of Klamath-Lake National Farm Loan Association and W. Warren Maxwell, Lakeview, member of the board of directors will represent the Klamath-Lake National Farm Loan Association at the annual four-state conference of NFLA representatives in Spokane, November 3-4.

This conference, according to Bryant Williams, secretary-treasurer of the Klamath-Lake association, will attract two directors from each of 65 associations in Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington. The associations make and service long-term farm and ranch loans in this four-state area for the Federal Land Bank of Spokane.

Addresses by Dr. C. Clement French, president of Washington University, and Earl H. Brockman, chairman of the Federal Farm Credit Board, will highlight this year's conference program. Dr. French will discuss the Land-Grant University Program, and Brockman will review operations of the federal board—a 13 member, part-time, policy-making board charged with the direction of the operations of Farm Credit Administration, an independent agency of government. The Farm Credit Administration supervises the cooperative farm credit system which is made up of national farm loan associations, federal land banks, production credit associations, federal intermediate credit banks and banks for cooperatives.

Williams said conference delegates will study problems incident to the rising cost of money and will review recent federal legislation which pertains to land bank and association operations. The delegates also will elect representatives to the 12th District NFLA Advisory Committee.

The Klamath-Lake association makes and services land bank loans in Klamath and Lake counties. Directors, in addition to Horton and Maxwell, are Roy Gooding of Klamath Falls, William F. Jinnette of Merrill, Vancil Withers and Fred Peat of Lakeview.

Star's Widow Takes Spouse

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Tyrone Power's widow, Deborah Minardos Power, was married Monday to film producer Arthur Loew Jr.

It was the third marriage for Mrs. Power, 27, and the first for Loew, 33, often termed Hollywood's most eligible bachelor.

Power died of a heart attack in Spain Nov. 15, 1958. A son was born to his widow two months later.

The new Mrs. Loew said she had known Loew six months and that they became engaged last August. Few Hollywood friends knew of the romance.

The couple plans to honeymoon at a resort hotel here for several days, return briefly to Los Angeles, and then move to New York to make their permanent home.

The ceremony was performed by a justice of the peace at the El Rancho Hotel, with owner Belton Katerman as best man.

Foreign Relations Group Seeks Secret Info On Viet

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Senate Foreign Relations subcommittee is trying to force the administration to give it confidential reports on foreign aid to South Viet Nam.

The subcommittee has a new law, passed by the last session of Congress, to back up its demand. Congress wrote this into the foreign aid money bill. It provides that money for economic aid would be shut off within 35 days for any country or project on which the International Cooperation Administration withholds information from Congress, unless the President personally forbids the disclosure.

In that case, the President would have to certify that he had forbidden disclosure and give his reasons.

Sen. Mike Mansfield (D-Mont.), who heads the subcommittee that has been looking into foreign aid operations in the Asian country, confirmed Monday night that he has invoked the new law.

Mansfield said that two weeks ago he wrote Leonard J. Saccio, acting director of ICA, asking again for ICA's own evaluation of the work in South Viet Nam.

Mansfield said Saccio replied a

week later that he would give the request further consideration.

If Saccio refuses to give the subcommittee this information, Mansfield said, it would be up to President Eisenhower to act to prevent the halting of funds to South Viet Nam—or explain why the information was withheld.

The subcommittee's hearings on South Viet Nam grew out of a series of Scripps-Howard newspaper articles that said the foreign aid program in that country amounted to a scandal.

Out of the demolished car stepped Estelle L. Finger, 62, a Millbrae housewife—without a scratch.

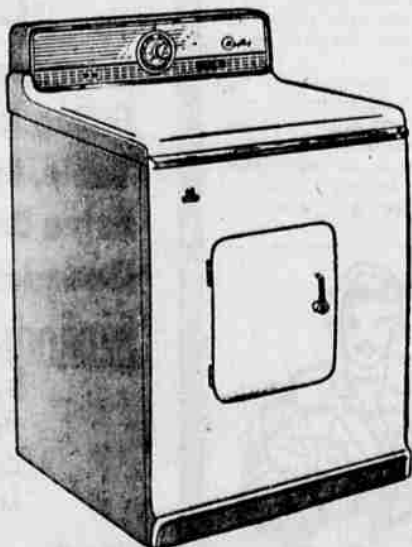
Last July 31 transfers, trash and taunts got too much for her. So she stopped watering her lawn and started on the bus.
